10 young women in competition for role of queen at '63 Crooked River Round-Up

(Editor's Note: These are the first three of ten interviews with the Crooked River Round-Up Court. One of the girls will reign over this weekend's activities.)

One of 10 princesses will be crowned Sunday as queen of the 1963 Crooked River Round-Up. This is the largest court in recent history of the event.

The girls will be judged Thursday morning on poise, beauty and personality. That afternoon, they will be judged on their horsemanship at the fairsgrounds.

Twenty-year-old Connie Still, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cole Still, Prineville, will ride Carrots, her red-roan while competing for rodeo queen. The two have competed together before and won several ribbons and a belt buckle in Central Oregon Saddle Club Association competition.

Connie is a 1961 graduate of Crook County High School. She at-

tended the University of Oregon for one year and is now employed as a secretary at the United States National Bank in Prineville, after one year at Eugene Business School.

If her favorite color and favorite food are put together, one may find a 5' 2", 118 pound girl, wearing blue and eating strawberry ice cream. Besides riding horses, Connie also enjoys cake decorating and water skiing.

Carolyn Cleveland, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Pruitt, Bend, is already familiar with rodeo court procedures. She was on the Roseburg Rodeo Court in 1958.

Carolyn has also won many ribbons through her 4-H horsemanship training of three years. She has trained her Arabian, Snipper, herself.

A 1962 graduate of Redmond Union High School, which she attended during two years in Myrtle Creek, Carolyn went to COC last year and plans to go back. Presently, the 5' 6" girl is employed at Bob Thomas Chevrolet.

The 19-year-old princess keeps her trim 121 pound weight by dancing, bowling, and enjoyment of all water sports. She named tacos as her favorite food and red as her favorite color.

A Prineville girl, Sue Stover, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Miksche, is also vying for rodeo queen. The 17-year-old girl will ride Blaze, a quarter horse, in competition. She has already competed in 4-H horsemanship and showmanship and won a third place in Texas Barrel racing.

State accidents on weekend take 9 lives

Nine persons died in Oregon during the weekend as a result of traffic accidents.

Benjamin Phillips, 25, Independence, was killed late Sunday night when his motor scooter failed to negotiate a turn five miles south of Salem on River Road. A passenger, Kenneth Moye, 27, also Independence, suffered a fractured leg.

James McCoy, 31, Florence, lost his life when his car ran off a Douglas County road into Loon Lake east of Reedsport Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Delsa Wheeler, 59, Vancouver, Wash., was killed in a one-car accident on U.S. Highway 26 about 20 miles southeast of Seaside Sunday morning.

Lee Clark, 48, Talent, was killed when his car collided with a semi-truck and trailer near Ashland early Saturday.

An unidentified man who was injured in a one-car accident in Northern California Friday night died in Oregon Saturday. The man died in an ambulance en route to a Medford hospital. He was taken to a hospital at Klamath Falls following the accident. John Janssen of Corning, Calif., was killed in the one-car crash on U.S. Highway 97 about 25 miles south of Dorris, Calif.

Ralph Rogers, 69, Ravenna, Mich., died at a hospital at Canyonville Saturday from injuries suffered July 28 in a car crash on Canyon Mountain.

Canyonville Postmaster Norman Hanson, 43, died Friday night at Forest Glen Hospital of injuries received in a two-car accident near Canyonville earlier in the day.

Dennis Montague, 19, Klamath Falls, was killed in a one-car accident near Klamath Falls Friday night.

Lizzie Shields, 2, Hermiston, was killed Friday when she was struck by a car backing out of a driveway near her home.

In addition, James Bethune, 3, Portland, died in a Portland hospital Saturday from burns suffered in a car fire in Portland Friday. His brother, Greg, 5, was critically burned in the blaze.

More men idled as Northwest lumber tieup enters third month

PORTLAND (UPI) — More men were idled today as the Pacific Northwest lumber strike entered its third month.

The strike began June 5 when members of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) and the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) struck U.S. Plywood and St. Regis Paper Co. The next day four other members of the Big Six shut down plants where union members were employed.

The strike later spread to some other firms, including giant Georgia-Pacific, and union officials said it may spread further.

A spokesman for the Timber Operators Council, a 196-member employer group, said the Boomers' local, affiliated with the IWA, struck the Van Vleet Logging Co. at Astoria today with nine members out. He said an additional 100 loggers were idled as a result. Three boomers also were out at the Wullger and Arila Logging Co. at Astoria with some 30 loggers idled, the TOC spokesman said.

Others Out To

Seven boomers also were reported on strike at the Kerry Log and Rafting boom on the Columbia River and another nine out at the Milwaukee boom in Tacoma.

Meanwhile, there was no immediate word on whether members of the TOC would put into effect a 26-cent per hour wage increase, as recommended by management negotiators last Friday. The increase would be 12 cents retroactive to June 1 with the rest effective in the next two years.

Harvey Nelson, president of IWA's region 3, criticized this plan and said the IWA would meet it "with any action that is deemed appropriate."

Nelson also said a decision would be made today by the union's regional negotiating committee whether or not to strike Potlatch Forests, Inc., of Lewiston, Idaho. Nelson said if a decision was made to strike it would become public knowledge when picket lines appear.

Rodeo week is underway at Prineville

PRINEVILLE — Rodeo week begins in Prineville today, with the local citizens celebrating the event by wearing all manner of western garb. Downtown streets are colorful with banners and rodeo-inspired windows.

For the first time, this year a full week of activities has been planned, featuring "Cook-O-Do" days. The program brings something to see or do each day, until the week climaxes with the three-show rodeo event, this Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Rodeo grounds are prepared and ready, members of the roundup board report, with the exception of sawdust that is to be spread over the turf arena this week. Sawdust for the arena has been donated by Pine Products lumber company.

In former years, sand has been spread. This has worked into the turf and created a slick surface, board members were told, calling for the change this year.

At their final meeting before the rodeo, last weekend, members of the board discussed a number of last-minute details. Raymond Guthrie, chairman of the racing events in the rodeo shows, said that deadline for entering the quarter-horse races is Friday at 8 p.m. One race, with seven entries, is to be held at each of the three rodeos, under the sponsorship of the quarter-horse association.

Salmon anglers call off strike

VANCOUVER, B. C. (UPI) — About 6,000 British Columbia salmon net fishermen were back on the fishing grounds today after the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union called off a strike Saturday over salmon prices.

The strike which began 22 days ago cost the industry an estimated \$10 million.

Union Secretary Homer Stevens announced that fishermen had voted 86 per cent in favor of accepting a recommendation that the dispute with the B.C. Fisheries Association be referred to a single arbitrator and that fishing be resumed at 3:30 p.m. Sunday.

The union and the Fisheries Association have not been able to agree on the matters to be referred to the arbitrator, but the two sides will attempt to settle this in further meetings.

Federal Fisheries Minister H.J. Robichaud and B. C. Labor Minister Leslie Peterson said if the two sides cannot agree on the terms of arbitration, then this matter should also be referred to the arbitrator.
