2 achieve baseball's top honor

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (UPI) — Former outfielders Sam Rice and Elmer Flick, who long ago despaired of achieving baseball's highest honor, will be formally inducted into the Hall of Fame today along with the late Eppa Rixey and John Clarkson.

A capacity crowd of 9,700, including Commissioner Ford Frick and many other baseball dignitaries, will be on hand for the ceremonies which will be held before an exhibition game between the Boston Red Sox and Milwaukee Braves. The game will be played at Abner Doubleday Field, where the game's mythologists claim baseball was invented in 1839.

Rice, 71, collected 2,587 hits and compiled a lifetime batting average of .322 for 19 seasons with the Washington Senators while Flick, 87, had a .315 career average playing for the Philadelphia Phillies, Philadelphia Athletics

and Cleveland Indians from 1898 through 1910. Flick batted over 300 nine times during that span but is remembered—much to his annoyance — because the .306 average with which he won the American League batting championship in 1905 is the lowest to win a league title in history.

The two living new inductees will be enshrined along with Rixey, a 286-game winner for the Phillies and Cincinnati Reds between 1912 and 1933, and Clarkson, who had a 328-175 won-loss record for the Chicago Cubs, Boston Braves and Indians between 1882 and 1894.

Don Heffner, manager of the San Diego Padres, is convinced the way to win baseball games is with the long ball. His club has won five of its last six games and 24 of the 41 runs scored came as a result of 12 home runs.

Theron Johnson, Pacific Coast League leader in the homer department, got three to bring his season's total to 28; Rogelio Alvarez also garnered three and Mel Queen and Chico Ruiz each hit a pair in the six game span.

The Padres clipped Southern Division leaders, Dallas-Ft. Worth, in three out of four contests. They also downed Salt Lake City to start the four game winning streak. In that game six of seven runs were driven in with round trippers. Seven runs came via the home run route in the 17-4 clubbing of the Rangers in the series opener: three of eight in the second and five of six in Sunday's doubleheader opener, which was won by San Diego, 6-3. Two more were added in the nightcap as the Rangers won 5-3.

In other games Sunday, Hawaii and Portland split 3-1 games with the Islanders winning the first and the Beavers the nightcap. Oklahoma City downed Tacoma in the first game 5-3 but were shut out by the Giants in the second, 3-0. Spokane took a 5-1 victory from Seattle in a single game while Denver outlasted Salt Lake City in both ends of a twin bill, 4-2 and 10-5.

Ray Rippelmeyer chalked up his eighth victory against one of the American Football League and Davis is the first to admit that his club probably won't be a contender—unless somebody trades him some talent. The team lost 19 games in a row in 1961-62 going into the final battle, when it upset Boston.

The help probably won't be needed at quarterback, where Cotton Davidson put on a fine performance. He completed 16 out of 32 attempts for 251 yards and one touchdown. Tommy Flores, who will share the signal-calling duties, completed four out of six during the short time he was in the game, good for 83 yards.

But he lost a contact lens after

a pass interception, and he never got back into the battle. And there'll be no help needed at one end spot where Art Powell, who played out his option with the New York Titans last year so that he could join the Raiders, caught nine tosses for 123 yards and one touchdown.

Another strong spot is at middle linebacker, where Archie Matsos, a five-year veteran, was a ball of fire. He rammed through the porous Patroit offensive line time and again to throw ball carriers for a loss. He batted down passes. And he intercepted one and returned it 23 yards to the Boston 17.

"I don't know if it was the best game I ever played," grinned Matsos after the game.

Before the game, coach Davis had been worried about his defensive line. But it played the Pats off their feet during the first half, when the Raiders built up a 7-0 lead on Davidson's 24-yard touchdown pass to Powell.

Boston tied it up on a 23-yard aerial from Tommy Yewic to end Art Graham early in the third. The Raiders went ahead on Durward Pennington's 46-yard field goal, but the Patriots came right back on Gene Cappalletti's 16-yard field goal.

A passing attack featuring Davidson and Bo Roberson carried the ball 71 yards on the next drive, with Davidson sneaking over from the one to give Oakland a 17-10 lead after three quarters.

Boston tied it again on a 57-yard pass featuring Yewic and Cappelletti, but Davidson passed to Powell on the one to set up the winning touchdown after Matsos' interception midway in the last quarter. The score came on a one-yard dive by fullback Charley Rieves.

"I would say they were further along in their training than we were," said Boston coach Mike Holovak after the game.

Move to TV-Radio world was 'good'

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bud Palmer, who leaped from pro basketball into the hectic world of television and radio, feels today after many misadventures that the transition was well worth while.

"Basketball players today are bigger, better and faster than they ever were," says the six-foot, five-inch former Princeton and New York Knicks star. "I'd have a tough time making any team in the pro league today."

But for a while he wondered whether the switch was smart. "I started doing the Knick games on radio," grins the man who has become one of the top sports television commentators. "One of my friends came to me and said he figured I must know what I was talking about but he couldn't understand me."

Palmer next went on a children's show, complete with baggy pantaloons and turban, as "Palmo the Hindu Magician."

"Gorilla" Causes Panic
"One of the worst moments came when he had a guy dressed up as a gorilla dropped among the kids," he recalls. "There we were on camera with kids screaming and running all over the place yelling 'I want my momma!'"

Palmer tried his hand at any-

thing and everything, hockey, dog shows and horse shows.

"I got an odd-ball reputation," says the collar-ad guy whose father was Lefty Flynn, once a well-known Hollywood actor. "Anytime they wanted someone for a show nobody else wanted, they'd yell for 'Palmo'."

But Bud did his first golf at Baltusrol in 1956 when Ed Furgol won the U.S. Open and finds it one of the most satisfying, if difficult, of assignments.

"That's because of the restricted areas you can cover with the cameras and time limits," he explained. "Then, too, everybody is a golf expert and, from various camera angles, sometimes get the wrong slant on what you're describing."

A case in point was a tournament in which Palmer, as he usually does on the green he covers, measured distances from the flag to the edge of the green. He was criticized for calling one putt 24 feet in length.

"Okay," he challenged, "measure it."

The putt was 23 feet, 10 inches.

One of the most embarrassing moments for a television announcer, he says, comes when somebody he probably should know is shoved on camera and he can't remember the man's name.

"And it can get a little rough, too," he laughs, "when you're working off a teleprompter and it starts running backwards."

But, all in all, Palmer is happy in his newfound niche. As he admits, it's easier under any circumstance than battling those always bigger basketball stars under the backboard.
