## Fire control officials meet

PRINEVILLE — Fire control officers of all local, state and federal agencies with Prineville offices were planning to meet today to take final steps to decide which agency will take primary responsibility in any of the "no-paid - protection" areas around Prineville.

Meetings have been held in the Bureau of Land Management office, with Gale Ontko, BLM fire control officer chairing the sessions, since a 300 - acre fire swept across privately owned grasslands along a rim south of Prineville some weeks ago.

Thus far, the group has developed a composite map showing areas where each agency has primary concern in event of fire. The area of the Prineville rural fire zone, the BLM, the National Grasslands and the state forestry service have been outlined, with a resulting improvement in mutual understanding, it was noted.

Spotted across the map are areas where no agency has a fire control authority. On these areas, it is planned that one agency will be allotted the primary responsibility for action, working in cooperation with the other agencies in the event of fire.

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## Woods to serve jail sentence

Roland Carlisle Woods, 23, of Bend, was committed to the Deschutes county jail Monday, in lieu of a \$100 fine for reckless driving while operating a motorcycle.

Woods appeared yesterday before Judge Joe Thalhofer in Deschutes County District Court.

Woods was arrested Saturday after a six-mile chase by officers on E. First Street north of Revere Avenue, into Sawyer State

Park and Tumalo State Park and on to the Tumalo Reservoir area. Officers said that the motorcyclist reached speeds of 65 miles an hour in a 35-mile zone, passed a vehicle on a hill and failed to observe the stop sign on entering the new Highway 97 through route.

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## Reply awaited to offer made by Big Six

PORTLAND (UPI) — Officials of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) were expected to reply today to an offer of the Big Six employer group to resume work at plants shut down by four member firms.

The surprise offer came late Monday as the Northwest lumber strike entered its third month.

Lowry Wyatt, Tacoma, vice president of Weyerhaeuser Co. and spokesman for the employer group said attempts to resume operation would begin Wednesday at plants of the four members which were shut down June 7 in retaliation for a strike called two days earlier against the other two members.

About 20,000 members of the IWA and LSW are idled at Big Six plants in Oregon, Washington, California and Montana. Some 9,000 other union members are out on strike against other companies in the region including the Georgia-Pacific Corp.

Wyatt said work would be resumed beginning with the day shift on Wednesday, or as soon thereafter as preparatory work would permit, at the woods and plant operations of Crown-Zellerbach, Weyerhaeuser, International Paper and Rayonier.

**Struck Firms Too**  
He added work also would be available for the employees of the two struck firms, U.S. Plywood and St. Regis.

Wyatt said the association took the action upon review of recent developments involving other lumber industry firms and the two unions.

He said the association employers shut down their plants as a defensive move in the face of selective strike action by the unions against two members of the six-company bargaining association.

"The recent combination of circumstances no longer requires the necessity of a shutdown in order to preserve the integrity of the association," Wyatt said.

"The association believes it is in the public interest to provide this opportunity for employees to return to work at this time."

Wyatt said the employers would continue to seek settlement for the dispute. He indicated willingness to meet with the unions at any time there appeared to be a possibility of reaching an agreement.

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
