## Prayer, Bible-reading will continue in many schools, despite high court ruling

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Prayer and Bible reading will continue this fall in many U.S. public schools despite the Supreme Court's ruling that such religious exercises are unconstitutional.

A nationwide UPI check showed today that the court's June 17 ruling is being openly defied in some areas.

Elsewhere, it is being circumvented by "interpretations" which seem to ignore the plain language of the ruling.

Only a few states which previously had religious exercises in their schools have issued explicit orders for their discontinuance. Many said they are still "studying" the matter. Some were unaffected because the ruling confirmed their existing laws or policies.

The survey turned up only two states—Pennsylvania and California—which appear to be acting on the court's suggestion that it is perfectly all right for public schools to engage in "objective" study of the Bible and America's religious heritage.

Defiance of the ruling has been especially forthright in Southern states, where no politician stands to lose many votes by attacking the Supreme Court and defending the Bible.

In Alabama, the State Board of Education defied the Supreme Court Monday and made Bible reading part of the required curriculum of public schools. Gov. George Wallace said if the courts rule out the practice in a specific Alabama school "I'm going to that school and read it myself."

"I would like for the people of Alabama to be in defiance" of the high court ruling, he said. Alabama law already required daily Bible reading in all state-sup-

ported schools and the resolution went a step further in making it part of the course of study.

South Carolina's superintendent of education, Jesse Anderson, has publicly notified teachers of his state that they may "feel free" to continue classroom religious exercises.

"Continue to read the Bible and pray until someone stops you."

The Florida legislature passed, with only one dissenting vote, a bill which allows each county school board to decide what it will do about religion in public schools. The sponsor of the bill pointed out that since Florida has 67 counties, it would take 67 different court suits to eliminate religious practices from the state's schools.

But defiance of the ruling is not encountered only in the South.

In New Jersey, the state Department of Education, acting on the advice of Atty. Gen. Arthur J. Sills, officially notified all local school boards that religious exercises must be discontinued. But the school board of Mahwah, N.J., voted 5-4 to continue Bible reading and recitation of the Lord's Prayer.

Similarly, in Massachusetts, the state commissioner of education formally advised all school districts that the Supreme Court ruling clearly means that "the Lord's Prayer may not be recited, nor may there be a reading of the Bible for devotional or religious purposes," but the school superintendent of at least one town (Montague) spurned this notice and recommended that religious exercises be continued in the schools of his district.

Circumvention of the ruling by interpretation usually proceeds on the premise that the high court merely forbade "mandatory" religious exercises and did not object to "voluntary" ones.

## Ex-Mrs. Douglas prepares to wed

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI) — Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas headed west today for a month-long camping and hiking honeymoon in the mountains while his former wife prepared for a honeymoon trek in the opposite direction by auto.

Mercedes Hester Douglas, who divorced Douglas last Wednesday for cruelty, will remarry today in Beverly Hills, Calif.

The 64-year-old Douglas married Joan Carol Martin, 23, here Monday. The couple had met in October 1961 while Douglas was giving a lecture at Allegheny College in Meadville, Pa., where Miss Martin was a coed.

The quiet church ceremony was followed by a family-only reception at the home of the bride's parents in suburban Williamsville. The newlyweds then departed for a month-long honeymoon camping and hiking in the mountains of Montana and Washington.

Later Monday John Metzberg, a long-time friend of Mercedes Douglas, announced that she would be married here today to Robert Eichholz, a Washington, D.C. attorney. The 46-year-old Mrs. Douglas had been the jurist's second wife.

She and Eichholz, according to Metzberg, will honeymoon cross country by car, winding up in Washington.

## Post-mortem is performed on body of Dr. Ward

LONDON (UPI)—Dr. Donald Teare, the Home Office pathologist, conducted a post-mortem on the body of Dr. Stephen Ward today to determine officially what drug the playboy-osteopath used to commit suicide.

The operation lasted little more than a half hour, but its results will not be made known until the official inquest into Ward's death. The inquest will be held Friday.

Meanwhile the British press continued to hammer away at the case which at one point threatened to topple the government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

"There is deep disquiet among the public, M.P.'s (Members of Parliament) and lawyers at the mysteries remaining unraveled," the Daily Herald said in an editorial today.

Ward, 50, died last Saturday from an overdose of barbiturates. He had swallowed the drugs the previous Wednesday, hours before an Old Bailey jury convicted him on two counts of living off the earnings of prostitutes.

Ward faced a maximum possible sentence of 14 years in jail. But he died without regaining consciousness, and never even knew he had been found guilty.

Ward left behind notes saying he was sorry to "disappoint the vultures" he felt were making him a scapegoat for the sex-and-security scandal still reverberating through Britain.

It was Ward, in his role as society osteopath and artist, who introduced former War Minister

John Profumo to red-haired Christine Keeler, 21. Macmillan's government almost collapsed when Profumo admitted he had lied to the House of Commons about his relationship with the girl.

Miss Keeler said she had been having an affair with a Soviet naval attaché at the same time. The naval attaché, Eugene Ivanov, was recalled behind the Iron Curtain before the scandal broke.

## DA closes up games at fair

GRESHAM (UPI) — Dist. Atty. George Van Hoomissen closed down seven amusement concessions at the Multnomah County Fair Monday night. No arrests were made.

Van Hoomissen said he believed the games were being operated as games of chance.

The district attorney earlier Monday arrested Ernest Hoblit, 61, El Monte, Calif., on a charge of operating a game of chance.

Hoblit pleaded guilty to the charge before District Judge John Gantenbein and was fined \$20 and given a 30-day suspended jail sentence.

Van Hoomissen said the investigation came following a complaint from Harold Carlson, 55, Portland. Carlson reported that his 16-year-old nephew lost \$3 by gambling on a fortune wheel.

## Hearing on yacht sinking ends

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—An informal inquiry into the sinking of the \$250,000 luxury yacht Freedom II ended Monday with no further investigation expected, but with the true cause still unknown.

Cmdr. J. H. Hawley said after informal interviews with most of the seven crew members who abandoned the yacht last Friday that everything about the sinking "seems straightforward and on the up and up." He said he expects "no further ramifications" in the case.

"One of the bottom planks must have carried away," he said. "This is the only thing that could account for the tremendous influx of water. But we'll never know for certain because in all probability the vessel sank at sea."
