UO Ducks get most Shriners this year; Leagjeld to Idaho St.

Did you ever wonder where the All-star Shriners (both Metro and State) go to college after they leave the prep grid ranks?

An old fable says that most of them won't go to college. Not so these days. As a matter of fact, nearly every one will go to college somewhere and probably try his luck on the college gridiron.

It's hard to say what school gets most of them. In Oregon it vacillates from year to year between Oregon and Oregon State. Here's a breakdown in the way the distribution went this year:

Leading the pack is the University of Oregon who picked off 13, and the Ducks are followed, of course, by Oregon State who this year nailed eight. The University of Washington landed two, and Washington State got three. Idaho got two, and Idaho State (now rated a major college) landed one, who turns out to be Bend's Jim Leagjeld.

One would hardly think that scholastic-minded, Ivy-covered Harvard would be recruiting out in Oregon, but the Crimson did get one. Stanford also garnered one.

Do the small colleges figure in the rake off? They do, but they don't get as many. Actually, a small college feels extremely lucky if it can land any. Small colleges much of the time have to rely on those athletes who realize that scholarships at larger institutions will not be coming their way.

Football attitudes at small colleges — they perhaps being the scholastic institutions they boast — lean towards the give 'em the old college try with what you have adage that used to be prevalent at larger institutions in years of yore.

This year Linfield fell into a gold mine and nabbed five. Portland State (there are those who

will argue that Portland State is no longer a small college... enrollment is listed at 4,500... about the same size as Idaho) managed to get three. Oregon Tech nailed two. Pacific University at Forest Grove grabbed one, and Willamette got one. Weber College, Salt Lake City's up and coming non-Mormon institution, got one. Even Multnomah School of the Bible nabbed one. However, there is no football involved there. Nine are undecided.

Personalities? Jim Leagjeld, former Lava Bear back and the only one from Central Oregon that made the Shriners roster, will take his college football at Idaho State. The Pocatello institution has jumped onto the football bandwagon, and last year nearly upset Idaho in the first official grid encounter between the two schools in "modern times."

Though Oregon got more of them than did Oregon State, the Beavers plucked off the top plum. Paul Brothers, Roseburg's quarterback, is rated the finest quarterback produced in Oregon since Terry Baker, and Tommy Prothro got him. Coach Fred Spiegelberg of the state team will depend heavily upon him to handle the Metro's, and pick up the first state win since 1956.

Steve Bunker, the great prep end from Pendleton that stands 6'3", and weighs a solid 185, is going to Oregon. Bunker was getting plenty of offers from both Washington and Washington State. Both athletes may have a field day for the Staters. With Brothers on the throwing end, and Bunker receiving, State may take Metro's measure.

Some townfolk are saying that State will use Leagjeld solely as a punter. Coach Spiegelberg has not said how much he plans on using him, or if he plans to use him at all. No word has been received.

49'er 'shotgun' formation outmoded

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The "shotgun" formation, once one of the most feared weapons in professional football, is a gone gossamer, coach Red Hickey of the San Francisco Forty Niners said today.

Hickey, trying to put together a winning combination for the 1963 National Football League campaign, says he just doesn't have the right talent for the spread formation.

"You need special personnel to fit the shotgun formation," says Red. "And we haven't got that. When Bill Kilmer was hurt and became unavailable for competition this year, then we lost the

trigger for our shotgun." The loss of Kilmer has been a severe blow to the hopes of the Forty Niners this year, but Hickey still is optimistic about the season.

"We are going to have good speed in the backfield," he says. "And most of our fellows reported to camp in very good shape. That helped."

"Our biggest weakness last year was in tackling and pass protection. That's where we have to improve this year."

Five men have just reported from the all-star game: end Hugh Campbell of Washington State; back Kermit Alexander, UCLA;

tackle Charley Sieminski, Penn State; tackle Walter Rock, Maryland, and lineman Floyd Dean of Florida.

"I haven't seen much of this boy Campbell yet," says Hickey. "But I'm very anxious to get a good look. I hear that he can't run when he gets the ball; that he is slow, but that he can catch a ball thrown anywhere near him."

"But I note that he was the outstanding player in two All-star games; and he did a lot of scoring for Washington State. And that's what we want — scores."

Hickey had been planning on Alexander as one of his top ball packers this year. But Alexander,

who has terrific speed, also is a standout defensive back.

Then along comes a lad named Don Lisbon, a 190-pounder from Bowling Green, who has been just short of sensational in jugging the leather during practice sessions.

"It has made me think twice about the possibilities of using Alexander on defense," admits Hickey.

Another Rookie in camp who has been shaking up the defense is Mike Lind, drafted last year from Notre Dame, but unable to play in 1962 due to injuries. Lind is a powerful runner and follows his interference well. He also is

the slowest back in the clockings. "But we'll try everybody out to see who has the most," says Hickey. "And we'll have to do it in the exhibition games."

"Shucks, there was a time when I used to play and was an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Rams that we could look at a

schedule and figure five games won. Then we would hope to pick up two or three more to win a title. "Those days are gone, now. The league is more evenly balanced. Your can't count on a single game that is a cinch. Green Bay still is the team to beat. But every city has a potential winner."
