Dollar volume for building in Bend in July totaled \$136,920, or \$210,759 below last year's July figure of \$347,679.

Most costly single building project was a new store building for Montgomery-Ward costing \$34,-095. Miscellaneous building expenses for eight projects were re-corded at \$55,895.

Other building costs were \$48,-500 for new dwellings, \$19,025 for dwelling alterations, \$2,900 for new garages and \$600 for non dwelling alterations.
