PRINEVILLE — Crook-O-Dao Days end today, and will give way immediately to rodeo days, with the first show of the 1963 Crooked River Roundup scheduled for tomorrow evening at 7:30. Rodeo grounds are polished and groomed and banners are flying in preparation for the big weekend.

Today's city-wide festivities began with a luncheon in the Ochocho Inn, when the court of eight princesses were introduced to members of the Kiwanis Club and visitors. Each princess was accompanied by a representative of her sponsoring firm.

## Work planned on McKenzie

The Oregon State Highway Commission at its August 27 meeting in Salem will receive bids for the grading and paving of 3.86 miles of the Redmond-Deschutes River section of the McKenzie Highway.

Highway officials said the project generally follows the existing route with minor changes in grade and alignment to improve sight distance and riding quality. The two 12-foot lanes will have asphaltic pavement. The project is scheduled for completion in the summer of 1964.

The project will start at the junction of U.S. 97 and 126 in Redmond, and inside the city limits will include curb and gutter work. From Redmond, the modernized section will reach to a point close to the Deschutes River, where it will link with the completed bridge section.

West of the Deschutes, the McKenzie Highway has been modernized to a point about two and a half miles beyond Deep Canyon, across which a new bridge was constructed several years ago.

On completion of the present contract, a final contract, not yet in the planning stage, will completely modernize the McKenzie Highway between Redmond and Sisters. This unit, on the Sisters end, is six miles in length.

Later work on the Bend-Sisters section of U.S. Highway 20 will eliminate the present hazardous junction at the intersection of U.S. Highways 20 and 126 near Sisters, scene of several traffic fatalities.
