Newspaper says U.S. still owes Oregon \$500,000

SALEM (UPI)—The Salem Capital Journal said today the federal government still owes the state of Oregon nearly \$500,000 for state expenditures during the Civil War and two Indian campaigns in the 1870s.

The newspaper said Oregon Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton will investigate to see whether the claims still could be collected. The newspaper said the state still has claims pending for \$300,000 in bonus pay and bounties paid by the state to Oregon Militiamen who were mustered into federal service at Pacific Northwest Indian posts during the Civil War.

An additional \$52,000 is claimed from state expenditures during the Modoc Indian War in 1872-1873 and \$21,000 from the Umatilla Indian War of 1874.

The Capital Journal said the Civil War claim, resulting from two bond issues passed by the Oregon Legislature in 1864, were approved in part by the U.S. Court of Claims in 1909, but that Congress never appropriated the money.

The claims for the two Indian campaigns were filed in 1911. They seek additional monies refused by the federal government in original settlement of the state's Indian war claims.

The militia said the state troops were mustered during the Civil War after all federal army units were called back to the east coast from the Northwest stations.

The enlistment bounty of \$150 a man and the bonus pay was authorized by the legislature at the urging of army officials when state authorities found it impossible to fill the recruiting quota set by the war department.

Some 1,810 Oregon Militiamen were stationed at posts in Oregon, Washington and Idaho between 1861 and 1866. Although no Oregon units ever participated in campaigns against Confederate Army troops, they played a key role in suppressing Indian uprisings.

California Attorney General Stanley Mosk last January laid siege on the federal capitol for some \$7.5 million California claims owed for state expenses during the Civil War.

Bids on relocation of Cove park due in Salem Aug. 27

The State Highway Commission at its meeting in Salem on August 27 will receive bids for a project that involves relocation of Cove Palisades Park, deep in the Crooked River canyon west of Culver.

Bids will be called as the time rapidly approaches for the initial flooding of the tri-canyon area upstream from the multi-million dollar Round Butte Dam. Lake Chilnook will start forming behind the big dam in December.

The park relocation project involves road work, site development, and development of overnight camping facilities above the elevation of the pool that will be created by the Round Butte Dam.

Plans call for an overnight trailer park with 48 units, an overnight camp tent park with 84 units, two utility buildings, two rest stations, one caretaker's house, one registration booth, and two boat ramps, plus other items.

July job rate high in Oregon

SALEM (UPI)—Despite the lumber industry labor dispute there were more people working in Oregon last month than in any July in history.

Department of Employment Commissioner David Cameron put the total at 732,800.

This was 300 less than the June working force.

Unemployment dropped to 32,900 in mid-July, 1,500 less than a year ago and 2,500 less than in June.

Cameron explained the loss of 7,400 jobs in the state during the month in the state and local government category resulted from the June closure of educational institutions.

Timing of the crops resulted in a 1,400 decline in canning and preserving jobs.

The big job gain came in non-manufacturing where there were 22,300 more jobs than a year ago.

These gains included 7,800 in contract construction; 3,800 in trade; 3,200 in services and 5,500 in government.

The lumber industry labor dispute had 9,000 persons out of work in mid-July, about the same as the June figure.

Agricultural employment was down almost 11,000 from last July.

The decline was largely because the strawberry harvest was completed by mid-July this year.

Driver skids into street pole

Dentist reports plans for new building in Bend

Construction of a new professional building, on the corner of Greenwood Avenue and E. Ninth Street, will start Monday. The building will be ready for occupancy approximately November 1, according to the owners, Dr. and Mrs. Dean W. Masterson.

Jan Ward of Bend is the general contractor. Plans and specifications were drawn up by the firm of Stearns, Menton and Morris, architects, C. W. Rickabaugh of Town and Country Real Estate will handle space leasing.

Dr. Masterson, a dentist, will have his suite in the building, and will occupy about a third of the space. The building will be approximately 25 by 9 feet, with a blacktop parking area to accommodate 12 cars.

Dr. and Mrs. Masterson and their three children moved here last week, and have occupied residence property in Blakley Heights purchased from Ray Leagfield. The Greenwood Avenue property was purchased from Ray Norris.

The building will be a one-story structure of wood frame construction. It will afford space for two or three tenants in addition to Dr. Masterson's suite. It has been designed for maximum flexibility, in order to meet the special, electrical and air conditioning needs of the future tenants.

Dr. Masterson recently completed service in the U.S. Air Force. He was stationed at McCord Field, near Tacoma, Wash.

MADRAS — The Jefferson County Search and Rescue Group, one of the most active organizations in Central Oregon, has a new chairman this week.

He is Morris Priday, manager of the Madras office of Bend-Portland Truck Service.

Priday succeeds Art Sykes, who has served as chairman since the search and rescue group was organized in September of 1961. Sykes resigned the post because of the press of business.

Activities on tap in the near future include a pancake breakfast to be held in connection with the Jefferson County Fair. It will be on Sunday morning, August 25, at the fairgrounds, between 6 and 9 a.m., according to Mrs. Leonard Scott, publicity chairman for the group.

Besides selecting its new chairman this past week, the group received training in the use of a resuscitator donated by a member of the organization, Paul Dwiggins.

The group has also received from the Warm Springs Lumber Company a 9 by 12 foot shed or the two bloodhounds which are available to the group for its rescue missions. In addition two bloodhound pups are being trained.

In the two years the group has been in existence, membership has swelled to 59 members, a quarter of whom are women.

In addition to several practice searches, the group has participated in 11 major search and rescue operations, the most recent one being in the Camp Sherman area. A total of some 1500 man hours of work has been represented in the various efforts of the organization.

Training includes work in such activities as high scaling, mountaineering, rock climbing, glacier and snow work, survival, tracking, first aid, radio and communications, compass reading, and practice searches.

Training directors include: Walter Madsen, Bruce Hahn, James Ramsey, John Barger, and Mike Stetpin.

Training sessions represent an additional total of nearly 2000 man hours of work.

In actual search and rescue missions the group works directly under the supervision of the county sheriff.
