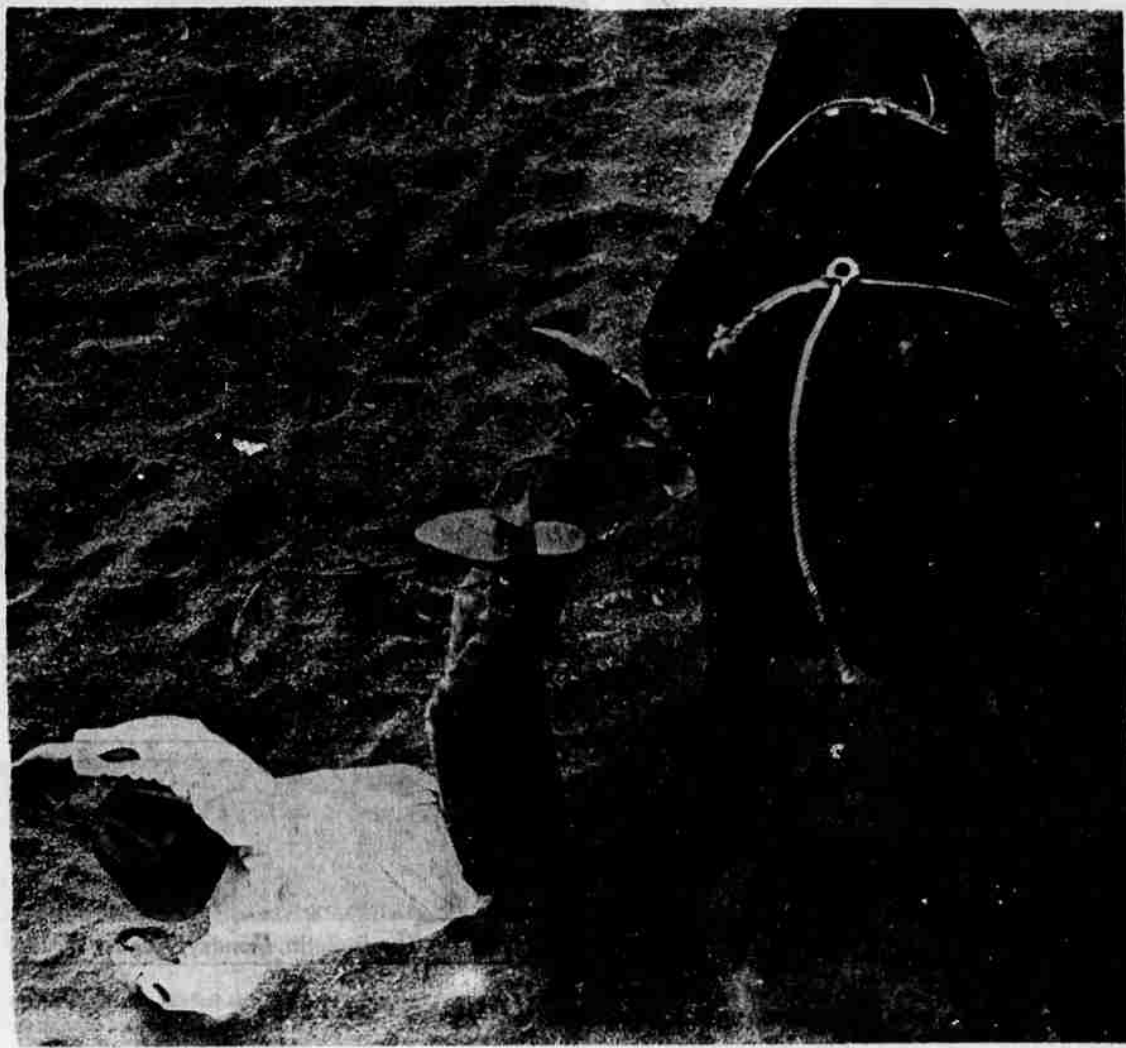

Senators to quiz prize informer Joseph Valachi

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Joseph Valachi, one of the Justice Department's prized informers on crime and illegal narcotic sales in the United States, soon will be called before a Senate investigation committee to reveal publicly what he knows about large-scale crime syndicates.

Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., said Sunday his Senate permanent investigations subcommittee would suspend its current examination of the controversial TFX fighter plane contract to hear testimony from Valachi for three or four days.

Attack leveled against bridge

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Portland Art Commission has leveled an attack against the city's new Marquam Bridge, labeling its design "less than attractive."

Douglas Lynch, chairman of the group, said Saturday the commission has requested drawings from the State Highway Department and additional time to study possible modifications.

The bridge will connect the Baldock and East Bank freeways.

Lynch said that the Art Commission is supporting Mayor Terry D. Schrunk's proposal that city officials be allowed to consult with the State Highway Commission in designing of the bridge.

He said that the group is generally concerned that the city and community have an opportunity to review bridge plans before they are put into effect.

Bodies removed from rivers

PORTLAND (UPI) — The bodies of two persons were recovered from the Columbia and Willamette rivers Sunday.

The body of Charles W. Moss Jr., 12, Portland, was found in the Columbia River. The boy drowned when he fell into the river from the Harbor Moorage at 96th and Marine Drive last Wednesday afternoon.

The body of a man was taken from the Willamette River near the Broadway Bridge here. The Multnomah County coroner's office identified him as John Lee Lockett, about 30, Portland.

The coroner's office said he was in the river from about a week to 10 days.

HOLDUP REPORTED

PORTLAND (UPI) — Three men held up a Safeway store on North Interstate Avenue and escaped with an undisclosed amount of cash. Police said five men were seen in the getaway car, which bore Washington license plates.

McClellan said Valachi, a convicted narcotics seller, may provide enough information to serve as the basis for an expanded version of a subcommittee investigation of national and international narcotics rackets, planned for after the TFX hearings.

Officials Mum

Government sources, meanwhile, have refused to give out further details about the New York hoodlum since they leaked the story last week that Valachi had been providing information about "Cosa Nostra," the nation's top crime syndicate. He had been in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., serving a life sentence when he began giving federal agents names and details about criminal organizations and activities.

Through Valachi, the Justice Department has learned of a dozen men believed to be the leaders of organized crime in America. He also has revealed details of nearly forgotten gangland murders and unsolved disappearances of fellow crooks.

Valachi has a police record which dates from 1918 when he was 15. It showed 18 arrests in a 38-year period before his final arrest and imprisonment at Atlanta on narcotics charges. Most of the 18 charges brought against him during 38 years were dismissed.

In Secret Hideaway

Valachi now is being held in a secret hideaway to prevent gangsters from assassinating him for giving information about their activities to the government.

The subcommittee counsel, Jerome Adlerman, and other staff members already have interviewed Valachi at the hideout to gain information which McClellan said he hopes to use to further show Cosa Nostra's multi-million-dollar operations in gambling, extortion, narcotics and loan-sharking.

Valachi, the son of Italian immigrants, was born in New York City in 1903. He reportedly is married and has two children.

Sheriff's deputy shot in leg

MAPLETON (UPI) — Lane County Sheriff's Deputy Dean Lingafelter was accidentally shot in the leg while attempting to serve a subpoena here Friday afternoon.

According to the sheriff's office a youngster ran up to the deputy, grabbed his pistol, and it discharged. The bullet entered Lingafelter's leg at the top of the calf and emerged about five inches below. No bones were damaged.

The deputy was released from a hospital at Mapleton after undergoing emergency treatment.

Brother pinned beneath car freed by youth

SEATTLE (UPI) — Bruce Cairney, 17, Portland, has been credited with single-handedly lifting an automobile to free his brother who was pinned beneath it.

The boy was riding in a small car on Vashon Island in Puget Sound near here Sunday with his brother Craig, 20, and John Brookhart, 16, both of Portland.

The car overturned, pinning Craig beneath it. Bruce, a slender youth, then rolled the vehicle off his brother.

"I don't think I could do it again," Bruce told King County sheriff's officers.

All three youths were admitted to West Seattle Hospital for observation. All were said to have suffered bruises.

Further rail meetings held

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz pushed further meetings between the railroads and rail unions today in an effort to produce some agreement on the work rules dispute by mid-week.

Wirtz continued meetings with both sides during the weekend in an effort to break the deadlock on the issues surrounding the size of train crews and presence of firemen in diesel locomotives.

The firemen's union, at the request of Wirtz, has called its decision-making committee together in Washington Tuesday and be on hand to decide whether to accept any agreement arising from the talks. Management spokesmen have declined to meet with firemen's union negotiators on the grounds they lack the power of decision.

Wirtz has proposed a two-or-three-year contract to solve the firemen and crew size issues, and has said both sides accepted this as a basis for renewed discussions.

He said the talks on these two issues "and perhaps with respect to all of them ought to come to a climax" the first part of the week.

The railroads plan to post new work rules eliminating thousands of jobs Aug. 29 unless agreement is reached before then. The rules would precipitate a nationwide strike.

FUNDS ALLOCATED

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall today announced allocation of \$9,719,000 of the accelerated public works funds to 92 forestry conservation projects in more than 100 counties in 24 states.

The allocations, by state and projects included: Oregon—Josephine \$166,000; Galilee Road, \$200,000; Wasco, \$5,000; Lakeview, \$10,000; Coos, \$95,000; Elk Creek Road, \$137,000; Douglas \$289,000; La Pine \$45,000.

Scotland yard tracking down robbery 'leads'

LONDON (UPI) — The detective in charge of Scotland Yard's hunt for a gang of spectacular mail train robbers said today he believes the record \$7.1 million haul still is within a 30-mile radius of the hijack point and possibly intact.

"We are following up literally hundreds of so-called leads and are still combing the ambush area," detective superintendent Gerald McArthur said. "We are always keeping our fingers crossed that something will come up."

London newspapers reported today that Scotland Yard was on the trail of four or five known criminals who may have taken part in the daring robbery early Thursday morning at Cheddington, 40 miles north of London.

Scotland Yard refused to confirm the reports.

"We have not said anything of the kind," a spokesman for the famed police force said.

McArthur made no reference to the newspaper stories in a news conference at on-the-spot police headquarters at Aylesbury.

He said detectives were very interested in a stolen truck found abandoned at Redford, 70 miles from the ambush scene. Unconfirmed reports said bank note wrappers had been found in the truck.

The 30-mile radius named by McArthur takes in a sizable area of outer London.

The Daily Express said the detectives were working with the names of four known criminals who have been missing from their usual haunts since shortly before the well-dressed gang hijacked the Glasgow-London "traveling post office" in pre-dawn darkness last week. The Daily Mail put the number of suspects at five.

Sen. Kefauver to be buried only few yards from farm

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Estes Kefauver will be buried Tuesday in a cemetery only a few yards from his family farm house.

The body of the 60-year-old Democrat who died Saturday of a heart attack will be flown to his native Madisonville, Tenn., on a military transport. The body will lie in state in Madisonville's First Baptist Church from 11 a.m. EDT to 2:30 p.m. Tuesday.

From the small church, Kefauver's body will be taken to the family farm. After brief services on the front porch, he will be interred in the cemetery near the old red brick farm house.

Kefauver's widow and four children, a delegation from the Senate and the nine members of the House from Tennessee will fly from Washington to Knoxville aboard a presidential jet plane Tuesday and go by automobile to Madisonville for the funeral.

Sought Presidency

Hundreds of persons including members of the House and Senate paid their respects Sunday at a Washington funeral home where the body was on view.

Hayes escapes from hospital

SALEM (UPI) — Royal Kenneth Hayes, 25, who was committed to the State Hospital following the fatal shooting of a security guard at the Oregon Journal building in Portland last year, escaped from the hospital Sunday night.

Hospital officials said he was "not considered dangerous" and had escaped from a minimum security unit.

New Jersey police keep patrols in area where Negro girl killed

Police kept extra patrols today in a Jersey City, N. J., neighborhood where a Negro girl was slain by a white man during a racial disturbance Saturday. The suspect was to be arraigned today in the shotgun killing.

In Mississippi a river ferryboat turned around in mid-stream Sunday to bring into custody 25 whites and Negroes who refused to use segregated waiting rooms.

Police and sheriff's deputies at Plaquemine, La., arrested the group brought to shore by the ferryboat's captain. Officers said they would be charged with resisting arrest.

Ronnie Moore, a field secretary for the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), said witnesses told him officers used their shoe heels to break the "passive-resistance armlock" of the group. Officers denied any brutality.

At Lexington, N. C., police stepped between angry whites and Negroes outside a jail where three Negro youths were being held for the slaying of a white man in a race riot June 6.

The Negroes knelt and prayed outside the jail, and then Charles Poole — brother of one of the jailed Negroes — exchanged hot words with white hecklers.

When the white and Negro groups moved toward each other, police quickly took up positions in the middle of the street to keep them apart.

Other integration developments:
Tuscaloosa, Ala.: James A. Hood, 21, one of two Negro students who entered the all-white University of Alabama under federal guard two months ago, quit

to "avoid a complete mental and physical breakdown."

Hood, 21, apparently faced imminent expulsion for criticizing state and university officials. He said he hoped to return to the university, but school officials said he could not come back until after a hearing on charges he publicly and unfairly accused officials of trying to get him expelled.

Goldsboro, N. C.: About 150 Negroes staged an orderly anti-segregation march in the town that saw 139 Negroes arrested in a demonstration Saturday night. Sixty-five Negro demonstrators remained in the Goldsboro jail.

Chicago: The American Bar Association considers a resolution today calling on lawyers to promote equal rights for Negroes. The resolution also asks an end to violent racial demonstrations.
