Three 'vital' tilts on PCL slate today; Tacoma 'must win'

Only three games are scheduled in the Pacific Coast League today but two of them have a vital bearing on the race for first place in both the northern and southern divisions.

The most important contest is the one between Oklahoma City and Dallas-Ft. Worth. The lead in the southern division has seen-sawed back and forth between the two clubs with Oklahoma City holding a 1½ game advantage.

Tacoma, if it hopes to catch Spokane in the northern race, must win practically all its games. The Giants now trail the Indians by 13½ games. Both have 29 games left on the schedule.

Sunday, Tacoma and San Diego exchanged hitouts, the Padres winning the 14 inning opener 1-0 but the Giants coming back to cop the nightcap 5-0. In other games Oklahoma City took a 2-0 shutout from Dallas-Ft. Worth; Seattle edged Denver 7-6; Spokane blasted Salt Lake City 11-3 and Portland took the first game of a twin bill from Hawaii 8-5 and in the second the Islanders bounced back to shutout the Beavers 1-0.

Scott Breeden of San Diego and Ron Herbel of Tacoma tangled in a pitcher's duel for 14 innings with the Padres finally scoring a run in the 14th to win 1-0. It was the first game of a double header and had been delayed an hour and 42 minutes by a thunderstorm.

Breeden went the entire game to gain his seventh win against nine losses. With two out in the 14th Herbel was struck on the arm by a line shot off the bat of Tommy Helms. The next batter walked and Wayne Schurr replaced Herbel. Chico Ruiz promptly drilled a single to score the only run of the game.

In the nightcap Jim Constable had too much stuff as he allowed the Padres but one hit. Tacoma collected nine off Jim Owens and John Flavin, including Cap Peterson's homerun in the sixth with

none aboard. San Diego's lone hit was a double by Les Peden in the fifth.

Jerry Nelson pitched the Beavers shutout over Dallas-Ft. Worth, giving five hits, the same number his teammates garnered from loser Ted Sudowski and two other hurlers. Both Beavers runs came in the third inning on a single by second baseman Jim Mahoney and doubles by Glenn Vaughan and Bob Boyd. Mahoney had three hits in three trips.

Spokane pounded two Salt Lake pitchers for 20 hits with Phil Ortega gaining his ninth win in 16 decisions. Dick Nen led the batting barrage with four hits. Wayne Carlander, who was touched for five runs before being relieved, was the loser.

Portland clubbed three Hawaii hurlers for 15 hits in the first game with Carl Browning gaining the victory. Hal Griggs was the loser. In the nightcap Islander hurler Mike Lee held Portland to five hits to lead Hawaii to a 1-0 win.

Mickey Wright, Waterloo victor

WATERLOO, Iowa (UPI)—Mickey Wright had stopped "shaking like a leaf" today in the wake of her victory in the Waterloo Women's Open golf tournament.

She fired a three-under-par 69 Sunday for an eight-under-par 54-hole total of 208, four strokes ahead of Sandra Haynie, Fort Worth, Tex., who finished second.

The Waterloo Open was the first time Miss Wright, Dallas, Tex., had been on the links in nearly a month. She had dropped out of the tour to have some dental work done.

"I was shaking like a leaf," said Miss Wright, the leading money winner in the tour. "The pressure was tremendous after having been off the tour for the last month."

Packers commence shelling with 27-7 Steeler defeat

The fun is over! The Green Bay Packer cannons were spiked briefly by the College All-Stars, but the shelling has begun anew for the champ's National Football League opponents.

Green Bay, its exhibition streak halted at 19 victories by the Stars, started another skein Saturday with a 27-7 triumph over the Pittsburgh Steelers at Miami, Fla.

Bart Starr, humiliated by a charging All-Star team, recovered his poise against Pittsburgh with two touchdown passes, one a 73-yard heave to Max McGee.

In other Saturday NFL exhibitions, Detroit defeated Cleveland, 24-10; Minnesota outgunned San Francisco, 43-28; Baltimore beat Philadelphia, 26-21, and Chicago outlasted New York, 17-7.

San Diego defeated Boston, 30-

17, in an American Football League pre-season contest on Saturday and revamped Oakland downed Denver, 35-19, Sunday.

There are seven NFL tuneup games on tap this week and four in the AFL.

Chicago visits Washington Thursday in the NFL; Philadelphia plays Pittsburgh at Bethlehem, Pa. and St. Louis meets San Francisco at Salt Lake City, Utah, Friday. In Sunday games, Green Bay plays at Dallas, Los Angeles hosts Minnesota and a Cleveland doubleheader features Detroit vs. New York and Baltimore vs. Cleveland.

In the AFL, Boston faces Houston at Lowell, Mass., Wednesday, New York is at Buffalo Friday and Sunday games pit Oakland vs. Kansas City at Seattle, Wash. and San Diego at Denver.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—Billie Jean Moffitt, an extremely talented teen-ager with a tennis racket, was "Miss Big" as the United States overwhelmed England, 6-1, to win the 35th annual Wightman Cup tennis matches.

Miss Moffitt, a 19-year-old court whirlwind, won two singles matches and was a member of a doubles team that also came up with a victory to enable Uncle Sam to win his 29th Wightman Cup and fourth in the last six years.

The bespectacled youngster, who hails from Long Beach, Calif., in addition to possessing a fine all-around game and a never-say-quit spirit, also pleased the crowd with her vocal and facial gyrations.

Several times she would chirp "Yes" to compliment her foe on a fine shot, or admonish herself with "Hit it," "Go Billie" or "move Billie," when outfaced by her opponent.

On Saturday, opening day of the best-of-seven tournament, she defeated Christine Truman of England, 6-4, 19-17, and Sunday she beat Mrs. Ann Haydon Jones, Britain's No. 1 player, 6-4, 6-6, 6-3.

Darlene Hard, the No. 1 American player who plans to retire at the end of this year, overwhelmed Miss Truman, 6-3, 6-0, in the second singles matches Sunday to clinch victory for Uncle Sam. She lost to Mrs. Jones Saturday for the lone American setback.

Nancy Richey of Dallas, Tex., felled pretty Dede Catt, a 23-year-old redhead, 14-12, 6-3, in the opening singles match Sunday. The 20-year-old Miss Richey, who is the national clay champion, teamed with Mrs. Donna Floyd Fales of New York to beat the English duo of Miss Catt and Elizabeth Starkie, 6-4, 6-8, 6-2 to end the action.

More testimony by Butts today in libel suit

ATLANTA (UPI)—Wallace Butts was scheduled to return to the stand today as leadoff witness in the second week of the trial of his \$10 million libel suit against the Saturday Evening Post.

The former football and athletic director at the University of Georgia has testified under oath that he never gave important football secrets to Alabama Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant prior to last fall's game between the two schools.

The Saturday Evening Post, in an article last March, claimed that the information helped Alabama in its 35-0 defeat of the Georgia Bulldogs.

Butts, who resigned his post as athletic director shortly before the article was printed, sued the Post, asking \$5 million in general and \$5 million in punitive damages as result of the story.

He charged in the suit that the magazine had ruined his career and spoiled his reputation that had won for him a number of honors, including the presidency of the Football Coaches Association, a national organization of college coaches.

Butts was expected to be asked today, on cross-examination, more details of his avowed friendship with Frank Scobey, a Chicago beer distributor who has told the Senate racket committee that he made big bets on horse racing and football games with an Indiana gambling syndicate.

Scobey was not called as a witness during five days of testimony last week but his sealed deposition is on file in the case and could be entered into testimony.

Butts testified Friday that Scobey had helped him get a \$6,000 loan from a Chicago bank and had paid part of his bills on a trip to New York but that he never knew Scobey gambled.

Butts' testimony that he never conspired to rig last fall's Alabama-Georgia game was followed by an earlier denial by Bryant, who also has sued the Post.
