

2 young swimmers setting outdoor AAU aquatic marks

CHICAGO (UPI) — Steve Clark continued the youthful assault on records in the windup of the national AAU outdoor swimming championships Sunday that Don Schollander began the previous day.

Dr. Jim Counsilman's powerful Indianapolis Athletic Club continued its domination of the team title, and Lt. Tom Gompf of the Air Force, who must have felt like the proverbial "bridesmaid," finally won a national diving title.

More records might have fallen during the three-day tourney at Ridgeland Common Pool in Oak Park had Chet Jastremski been able to compete. Jastremski, 22, of Toledo, Ohio, suffering from sore legs, gave it a try during the opening of competition Friday, then bowed out.

As it was, three individual and one team record fell.

Breaks World Mark

Schollander, 17-year-old swimmer from the Santa Clara Swim Club, broke the official world's

record in the 200-meter freestyle Saturday for the second time in two weeks. Then, moments later, he turned in a tremendous anchor to pace the Santa Clara 800-meter freestyle relay team to another world record.

Schollander swam the 200-meter freestyle in 1:59.0. Two weeks ago, in qualifying for the national AAU meet, he clocked 1:58.8 in the Los Angeles Invitational.

He swam a 200-meter freestyle of 1:58.7 in the relay, but it will not count as a world record. The mark is held by Bob Windle of

Australia, a 2:00.3 set last April.

Bettors Own Mark

Clark, 20, of Los Altos, Calif., broke his American and meet record in the 100-meter freestyle Sunday with a preliminary time of :54.2. He improved by two-tenths of a second on his previous mark of :54.4 which he set in the AAU meet two years ago.

He went on to win the finals in :54.9 after he trailed during a good part of the race behind Richard McDonough, 20, South Orange, N. J., who was second at :55.1.

Gompf, 24, from Dayton, Ohio, thwarted the attempt of young, unheralded Larry Andreason to sweep the diving competition. With his blonde, beaming wife looking on, Gompf told newsmen his 10-meter diving title Sunday was his first national triumph after seven consecutive times as runner-up.

Andreason, 17, from Commerce, Calif., won the 3-meter and junior platform diving titles earlier.

Carl Robie, 18, of Drexel Hill, Pa., swam the 200-meters butter-

fly Saturday in 2:08.8 to break the mark of 2:10.8 he set in winning the same title as last year's AAU meet.

Wins Medley Title

Sixteen-year-old Richard Roth turned in a great 2:16.0 in the 200-meters individual medley Sunday to take the title from Ted Stickle of the Indianapolis club.

Roth, of Atherton, Calif., led at the end of the butterfly, backstroke and breaststroke sections, then resisted successfully a powerful 50-meter finish by Stickle, 21, from Santa Clara,

Calif., who holds the American and meet record of 2:15.9, was second.

The Indianapolis "A" team won the tourney's final event — the 400 meters medley relay — to climax its seventh straight title. Indianapolis finished with 106½ points.

Far back were Santa Clara and the Los Angeles Athletic Club, tied with 45 points; Verdugo Hills Swim Club, Calif., 26; Gopher Swim Club, Minn., 20, and the North Jersey Swim Association, 17½.

LA lead over Giants same as last year

A year ago today the Los Angeles Dodgers held a 3½-game lead over the San Francisco Giants in the National League pennant race.

That's the same bulge that separated these California rivals after weekend action, leaving some figure filberts wondering if history was ready to repeat itself.

You don't need a long memory to recall that the Dodgers blew a four-game lead in the final week of the 1962 season and then bowed to the Giants in a three-game playoff. This year, though, the Dodgers seemingly have hit the skids much earlier.

Since July 20, when the Dodgers held a 10-game lead over the Giants, Walt Alston's men have lost 11 of 20 games. During the same period, the Giants, led by wondrous Willie Mays, have won 15 of 19.

Mays, hitting in his 13th straight game, doubled in two key runs to help the Giants whip the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-1, while the Cincinnati Reds walloped Sandy Koufax and the Dodgers, 9-4.

Mays unloaded his double in the fifth inning to break up a pitching duel between Cal McLish (11-8) and the Giants' Jack Sanford (11-12). Chuck Hiller drove in three runs for the Giants with a homer and a sacrifice fly. Wes Covington collected four of the Phils' five hits off Sanford, who needed ninth-inning help from Billy Hoft and Don Larsen.

The Reds raked Koufax for nine hits and five runs during a 5-1-3 innings to become the first team to beat the Dodger southpaw twice this season. Koufax, now 18-5, entered the sixth inning with a 4-1 lead but was chased during a six-run Cincinnati uprising. Frank Robinson and Don Pavletich homered for the Reds and Frank Howard and Tommy Davis hit the seats for the Dodgers.

Tiger may face Hungarian boxer

IBADAN, Nigeria (UPI)—Dick Tiger vs. unbeaten Laszlo Papp—somewhere in the United States? That's the proposed fight which world middleweight champion Tiger of Nigeria was considering today, now that he has definitely disposed of ex-champ Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah.

Tiger, 33, stopped gory Fullmer, 32, in the seventh round here at Liberty Stadium Saturday night, and is now digesting a proposal to make his next defense against 37-year-old Papp of Hungary somewhere in America.

Papp, the only three-time Olympic winner and the only professional boxer behind the Iron Curtain, is the challenger nominated by Championship Sports, Inc., (CSI), one of Tiger's handlers disclosed today.

Championship Sports, which staged the last four world heavyweight championship fights, would like to have Tiger defend against Papp on closed-circuit television. Terms of the CSI proposal were not revealed.

Uncertain whether to retire after Saturday's bloody beating — or to continue in the ring.

Hickey, 49'ers back to 'drawing board' after 43-28 defeat

MORAGA, Calif. (UPI)—Coach Red Hickey and his San Francisco Forty Niners staff headed back to the old drawing board today to figure why their 1963 model fizzled so badly on the launching pad.

Hickey unveiled his "new" football machine in Portland Saturday night as a seven-point favorite over the Minnesota Vikings. But only superhuman efforts by Kermit Alexander and Elbert Kimbrough kept the Norsemen from burying the contraption right there in the sod of Multnomah Stadium.

The Minnesota team, which had lost six straight games to San Francisco, walloped the Forty Niners 43-28 in the opening exhibition contest for both teams.

Only one-man offensive and defensive performances by Alexander and Kimbrough, respectively, kept the score from matching the lopsided statistics.

Dazzling Debut

The Vikings took a 3-0 lead in the first period but Alexander, a rookie from UCLA, electrified 20,837 fans in the second period when he fielded a Minnesota field goal attempt and raced 95 yards for a touchdown in his first ball-handling performance as a pro.

The Minnesota team bounced right back with a field goal and a touchdown as Viking quarterback Fran Tarkenton picked the Forty Niner defense to pieces. Kimbrough broke up several long pass attempts with an outstanding defensive job, but he couldn't cover the whole field.

The Forty Niner offense finally got rolling just before the half ended, when Alexander scampered 27 yards, quarterback John Brodie hit Monte Stickles for 41, and fullback Roy Winston plunged over from the one.

But the Vikings came back again, scoring 10 points on a touchdown and a field goal in the final 38 seconds of the half.

Alexander Again

Early in the third period, Alexander exploded again. He took a Minnesota punt, fumbled it briefly, and then rolled 81 yards down the middle to score. That made the score 23-21, but it didn't scare the Vikings. Tarkenton hit on a 65-yard scoring pass two minutes later, and Minnesota quickly added a field goal after the Forty Niners fumbled the kickoff in the opening moments of the fourth period.

The Forty Niner offense sputtered again, and the Vikings moved the ball into position for their fifth field goal of the night to lead 36-21 with seven minutes remaining.

With a comfortable lead, the Viking defense relaxed a bit and the Forty Niner offense got another chance to look good. Brodie connected on a series of passes to Stickles and Jim Johnson, and Winston plunged over from one foot out.

But then Bob Reed capped a fine Minnesota showing by taking the Forty Niner kickoff and loping 90 yards into paydirt.

The statistics told the story, with Minnesota leading in every department: Yards rushing, 243 to 74; yards passing, 226 to 174;

first downs, 24 to 13; total offense, 443 to 278.

Hickey was confident that his team would look better against the St. Louis Cardinals Friday at Salt Lake City. That's a pretty safe assumption — because they couldn't look much worse.

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
