Stanford will be 'good' this year

Tuesday we mentioned something about the grid fortunes of Oklahoma through the little grid booklet that was the first of dozens that will pour into this office in advance of the 1963 grid season. Oklahoma's book was the first one to hit the sports desk, and Stanford, not one to ballyhoo football beyond academics at all, was second.

Lets take a look at Stanford. In his first year at the Indian helm will be John R. Ralston, "a progressive young coach with an outstanding record."

Stanford is the one institution in the southern (or California half) of the old Pacific Coast Conference that has stayed well within reasonable bounds concerning the attitude towards the southern colleges.

Stanford paid for it, though, in other ways. Football sank to its lowest ebb. Stanford became a doormat for everybody, including the northern schools. The Indians hit a slump and stayed there.

Last year for the first time in nearly a decade, the Indians showed signs of coming out of it. This year it looks like Stanford may be on its way to a great season.

It is interesting to note, as Oregonians, the number of Oregon players on the Stanford roster. Actually, there are only four, but they come from Duck-Beaver recruiting grounds. On the inside of the front cover is a picture of 1963 co-captain Marvin K. Harris, an All-Coast center for the Indians in 1962. He is a senior from Coos Bay.

Another senior letterman on the Indian squad comes from Coos Bay, too. He is T. Robert Burke, an end. Southern Oregon has two. Philip M. Humphreys of Medford is a halfback. He is a promising sophomore. Eagle Point's John K. James is a transfer. He is a junior and a guard. Both Humphreys and James should see some duty this year.

Perhaps the most amazing

thing about Stanford is the fact that it held the same attitude as Oregon, Oregon State, and Washington State on the matter, but still managed to stay on good terms with its powerful California neighbors, especially the two Los Angeles schools, UCLA and Southern California. Stanford, however, never dropped the northern schools from its schedule and refused to enter the southern boycott. Here again it is amazing that Stanford was able to keep its good relations with the southern colleges.

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Angels' Happy Chance points to more shutouts

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Happy Dean Chance, after pitching an "easy" game Wednesday night, is looking forward to a good second half of the season and a "couple more shutouts."

Angel manager Bill Rigney said Chance "was pitching easy" in Los Angeles' 2-0 win over the Washington Senators. "It was the first time he hasn't walked a man in a complete game this season," Rigney noted.

The 6-foot-3 righthander only made 97 pitches, striking out only two batters, but distributing five Senators hits in separate innings.

Wilmar Dean, the 22-year-old ex-farmboy from Wooster, Ohio, spoke confidently about his personal outlook for the remainder of the season. "I told Rigney I was a second-half pitcher," said Chance in the clubhouse. "I figure I ought to throw a couple more shutouts."

Wednesday night's was his second of the season and he combined on another blanking of the Senators earlier this season with Julio Navarro.

However, Chance felt he hurled better against the New York Yankees in his last time out when he lost a shutout and the game in the ninth 2-1.

"I guess the competition Wednesday (the last place Senators) was not as tough," he added, then commented further — "I guess you're not supposed to beat the Yankees."

The Angels scored only two runs Wednesday night but banged out 10 hits. They jumped to a 1-0 lead in the first inning on singles by Jim Fregosi, Billy Moran and Felix Torres. Los Angeles tallied again in the fourth on back-to-back bingles by Bob Rodgers and Ken Hunt, and Lee Thomas' double play ball which scored Rodgers.

Will McCovey returns to give Giants boost

CINCINNATI (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants, rejuvenated by the return to the lineup of Willie McCovey, were within three games of the first place Los Angeles Dodgers today.

It took the Giants 10 innings but they finally captured a 7-6 decision from Cincinnati Wednesday night to creep closer to the Dodgers, who lost to Milwaukee. Red-hot St. Louis also won its game, and remained but one game back of San Francisco.

McCovey had been out of the lineup serving a two-day suspension after a wild beef with an umpire Sunday in Philadelphia. The Giants lost both contests, and the Dodgers dropped their only game.

Wednesday night, Willie returned and supplied the extra oomph that got the Giants past the tough Redlegs.

McCovey blasted his 34th homer in the seventh with one aboard and added two more hits to the Giants' 15 hit attack.

Willie Mays likewise had a big night as he whacked his 29th homer with a mate on in the sixth and also had two other hits.

Other Giant standouts in the hero-filled contest were the slumping pair of Jimmy Davenport and Felipe Alou. Both came off the bench to deliver in the clutch.

Davenport, who entered the ball game in the sixth inning, opened the 10th by doubling off Red reliever Bill Henry. One out later, Alou pinch hit for winning pitcher Don Larsen and singled to right to score Davenport.

The Giants used seven pitchers as Cincinnati collected 17 hits but stranded 11 batters.

Rebuttal witnesses

2 university presidents to testify

ATLANTA (UPI) — Two university presidents, one of whom already has said that he considers the reputation of Wallace Butts "bad," are scheduled to testify today in Butts' \$10 million libel suit against the Saturday Evening Post.

The college presidents are Dr. O. C. Aderhold, president of the University of Georgia where Butts carved out a career of nearly 25 years as coach or athletic director, and Dr. Frank Rose, president of the University of Alabama.

Aderhold and three members of Georgia's athletic board testified Wednesday as rebuttal witnesses for the Post in the trial which is now well into its second week. The Post claimed that Butts conspired to rig the 1962 Georgia-Alabama football game.

All four, under questioning by Post attorney Welborn Cody, testified that Butts' character was "bad." One of them, Harold Heckman, said he wouldn't believe Butts under oath.

Cody said he will continue with rebuttal witnesses today in the federal court suit and that he will introduce the long-awaited deposition by Frank Scobey, a Chicago beer distributor who once told a Senate rackets committee

that he placed bets on horse racing and football games.

Cody told the 12 businessmen making up the jury at the trial's onset last week that he will prove that Butts associated with "known gamblers."

William Schroder, chief counsel for Butts in his fight to restore the luster to a nationally known coaching reputation that elevated him to the presidency of the Football Coaches Association, said that he will call Dr. Rose as a rebuttal witness.

Both sides in the courtroom drama have rested and are putting the final touches to their

cases with the rebuttal witnesses. Actual testimony could end today, with summations and court charges coming up Friday.

Butts sued the Post following publication in the magazine's March 23 issue of a story entitled "The Story of a College Football Fix."

The story said that an Atlanta insurance man, George Burnett, overheard a telephone conversation between Butts and Alabama coach Paul (Bear) Bryant in which he claims Butts gave vital information to Bryant prior to the Alabama-Georgia game. Alabama, a 27-point favorite, swamped Georgia 35-0.

Both Butts and Bryant denied the report and both sued the Post for libel. Bryant's suit is pending.

Houston's George Blanda ready for starring season

The Houston Oilers' American Football League rivals are on notice today that quarterback George Blanda is ready for another starring campaign.

A veteran of 13 pro seasons, Blanda can afford to take things easy in pre-season exhibition games. But he came off the bench Wednesday night to show the young fellas how an old pro does it with a three-touchdown spree that lifted the Oilers to a 21-20 victory over the Boston Patriots.

Blanda relieved quarterback Jackie Lee with the Patriots leading, 20-0, in the third period and threw three touchdown passes and kicked three extra points to account for all the Oilers' scoring in their second straight exhibition-game triumph.

Blanda passed 19 yards to Charlie Hennigan and 12 yards to Billy Cannon for third-period touchdowns and then capped the performance with a seven-yard scoring toss to Hennigan in the fourth period.

Tom Neumann passed for the Patriots' first touchdown, fullback Harry Crump plunged two yards for their second and Gino Cappelletti and Bobby Walston kicked field goals to run up the 20-lead.

The Oakland Raiders indicate that they may move fullback Charlie Rieves to linebacker. Fullback Curtis McClinton of the Kansas City Chiefs pronounced in "great shape" after his conditioning was slowed by an injured knee. The Denver Broncos obtained offensive end Tom Rychel from the Buffalo Bills in exchange for a future draft choice.

Tackle Leo Nomellini and end Monty Stickles will be sidelined with minor injuries when San Francisco plays St. Louis in Salt Lake City Friday night. Passing star Y.A. Tittle of the New York Giants was sidelined with an upset stomach Wednesday but is expected to resume training today.

Coach Weeb Ewbank announced that end Geno Heeter, split end Glen Knight, tackle Sherman Plunkett and guard Dan Ficca will start in the New York Jets' offensive line Friday night against the Buffalo Bills.

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Ginny Duenkel may gain title

HIGH POINT, N. C. (UPI) — Gold medal winner Ginny Duenkel of Summit, N.J., goes after a second title today in the 200-meter backstroke against Olympic swimmer Donna DeVarna in the 1963 national AAU senior women's swimming championships.

Ginny, who won the gruelling 1,500-meter freestyle Wednesday, will be defending the backstroke title she won last year in the national meet at Chicago, but the duel so far this year with Donna, a double defending champion from the Santa Clara, Calif., Swim Club, has been a standoff.

Each has been timed this year in 2:34.3, a little more than two seconds off Ginny's winning time in 1962.

Donna, a former world record holder in the 400-meter individual medley and a member of the 1960 Olympic team, also competes in the 400-meter medley today and faces solid competition in defending champion Sharon Fineran, an unattached entry from Glendale, Calif.
