Zone change, annexations considered by councilmen

PRINEVILLE — The face and shape of Prineville became the primary concern of city councilmen Tuesday evening at the August meeting of the council, as members considered a variety of annexations and a zone change.

Of major interest, drawing a number of residents of northwest Prineville, was the public hearing on a proposed zone change from commercial to light industrial on two city lots at Ninth and Deer Streets.

Many opinions were voiced pro and con, as residents considered the application for the zone change made by John Koehler

and Harry Sprouse who seek to build a blacksmith shop at that location. The shop is currently operating adjacent to the proposed shop site.

It was generally agreed by the group that the blacksmithy is needed in the Prineville area. It was the location that disturbed some property owners who stated that the noise, particularly from night work, devalued rental property, and disturbed those living near the shop.

Councilmen ultimately agreed to investigate the issue more closely, visit the site, and invited those present at the hearing to return to a decision-making meeting in September.

The council also vacated a portion of East Eighth Street, held a public hearing on annexation of four lots and read an ordinance pertaining to further annexation for the second time.

No one appeared to contest the first annexation and the petition, submitted by Dan Fridley, was approved.

In further business, the city council voted to adopt a revised schedule on building fees. Under the new fee schedule, a \$12,000 home will have a building fee of \$38 as compared to \$14.50 under the former schedule.

Weather woes blamed on nuclear testing by noted Denver Scientist Irving Krick

PORTLAND (UPI)—Noted Denver Scientist Dr. Irving P. Krick, president of the American Institute of Aerological Research, says residents of the Pacific Northwest must resign themselves to the same kind of "unseasonable dampish weather" they've experienced this year.

Speaking at the 67th annual convention of the National Association of Mutual Insurance Companies, he blamed the situation on high altitude nuclear explosions by the Soviet Union and the United States. And, he said, the recently signed nuclear test ban will not help the situation in the near future.

This summer's weather has been a source of hurt pride for many

Greggians. Dr. Krick said the high-altitude nuclear tests have had a tremendous effect on atmospheric conditions, changing jet streams and bringing about extremes in weather conditions. Oregon has experienced precipitation, while others have had extreme cold or dryness.

The white-haired scientist—who has done dozens of weather modification projects in the United States, Canada, and foreign countries—said his organization predicted the weather developments which have occurred this year.

His theory is not a simple equation such as the hydrogen bomb equals bad weather, but it is

something similar: "Something like nuclear explosions causing change in both the course and intensity of the jet stream."

The jet stream is a high speed current of air which moves west to east around the globe at altitudes between 30,000 and 50,000 feet.

REPAIR WORK DUE

CHILOQUIN (UPI)—Mill Supt. Warren Lough said today it was hoped the fire-damaged Simplot and DeVoe Lumber Co. Sawmill here would be back in operation within a week to 10 days.

Flames swept through the mill Tuesday night. An estimated 20 to 30 per cent of the mill was destroyed with most damage in the electrical system.

Untimely jokes bring apology

LONDON (UPI)—Britain's commercial television network apologized to the United States today for its broadcast of a taped Bob Hope show containing "untimely" jokes about Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's pregnancy.

Philip Dorte, midland controller for Associated Television, the network which televised the show, said he apologized to U.S. Consul Kenneth Atkinson in Birmingham for the "unfortunate references" to Mrs. Kennedy.

The show was recorded in Hollywood shortly after Mrs. Kennedy's pregnancy was announced, but was not shown here until Wednesday night.

The third child of President and Mrs. Kennedy, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, was born prematurely last week and died Friday 39 hours after birth.

Among the jokes on the show, recorded in the United States, was one in which a female Russian spy asks Hope how much longer the Kennedys will be in power.

"Forever," retorts Hope. "They're breeding their own voters."

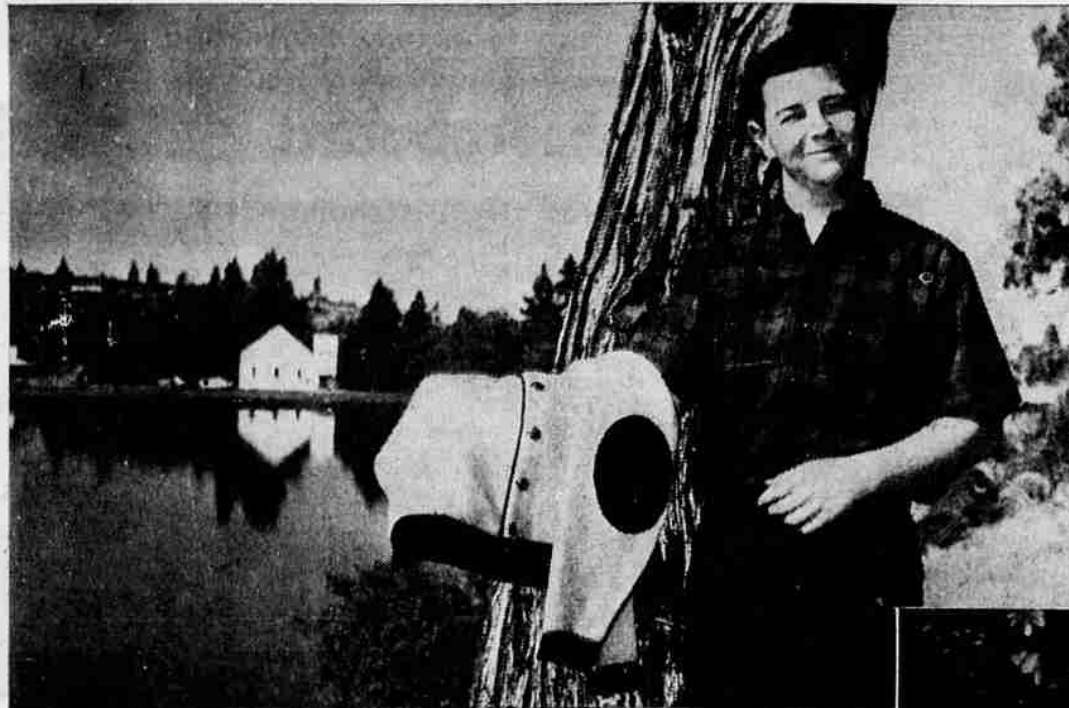
At another point, Hope comments on the "wonderful news from Washington—the New Frontier is finally delivering."
