Portland pair shot at garage

PORTLAND (UPI) —Two men were in serious condition after they were shot at a garage early today.

Paul R. Mullen, 21, and Paul G. Rustan, 25, both of Portland, were charged with attempted assault with a deadly weapon and larceny from a garage. Bail was set at \$5,000 each.

Garage attendant Patrick Hopcroft, 27, said he shot at the pair when he was threatened with an iron bar. He said he refused to lend them tools from the garage to work on their car.

Police said the two entered Smoke's 24-Hour Auto Repair to borrow the tools and were refused. Police reports said the two men became abusive and Hopcroft got the gun. A scuffle ensued and Hopcroft said he got free and fired.

Parks director facing ouster

SEATTLE (UPI) —The State Parks Commission was to meet here this afternoon for a session which could result in the dismissal of Parks Director Clayton Anderson.

Gov. Albert D. Rosellini, who called the meeting, has made it clear that he thinks it is time to change the man in the politically-sensitive \$12,000-a-year job.

Rosellini said the meeting would be held in secret.

Anderson, former Oregon recreation director, took over the parks post Jan. 22, 1962 after the agency had been in turmoil for more than a year. He was the third director in less than 12 months.

Rosellini said that he wanted the parks commission to discuss the agency's "administrative problems" including reports of low employee morale.

Anderson replied that he was willing to "stand on my record" as director.

'Red' project nearly finished

SALEM (UPI) —The State Water Resources Board's research project which has kept the waters of the Row, Coast Fork and main stem of the Willamette River near Eugene "in the red" is nearing completion, it was announced today.

Engineer Malcolm Karr said a red dye was dumped into the waterway Tuesday as part of a flow-temperature study.

The dye, which turned the swift-moving stream brick red from bank to bank, enabled researchers to measure the rate of water flow.

Data being assembled will be used by the water board's staff to check methods used in a study of the Umpqua River Basin in Douglas County, Karr said.

Corbett eyes state contest

PORTLAND (UPI) —State Sen. Alfred Corbett, D-Portland, said today he was considering a campaign for Secretary of State next year, but said it was too early to be definite.

U. S. prepared to exchange ground posts

GENEVA (UPI) — The United States today declared it is ready to exchange ground observation posts with the Soviet Union to reduce the danger of surprise attack, providing no strings are attached.

Soviet disarmament negotiator Semyon Tsarapkin indicated Moscow is willing to reconsider its previous demands that establishment of such posts be coupled with a reduction by one-third of troops in central Europe and with creation of a nuclear-free zone in this area.

United States negotiator Charles C. Stelle said America "is prepared to accept an arrangement limited to a system of ground observation posts."

Stelle said the United States "does not insist" that such an exchange be linked to other previous American proposals for advance notification of major military movements, aerial observation, radar controls and mobile observation teams.

Tsarapkin told UPI Moscow's demand for a tie-in between observation posts and troop reductions plus a denuclearized zone "is under consideration. Western officials said the indication are the tie-in is not so strict as before."

Stelle said that because the Soviet government "has recently indicated renewed interest" in exchanging observation posts "we might well explore the possibilities of agreement on this measure."

He said the United States already has suggested that such posts be placed at "certain principal ports, major railroad stations, intersections of key highways, and possibly at significant airfields."

The posts could "observe the flow of military traffic and the general level of military activity on a local basis," he said.

The delegations, which resumed sessions here Monday after a brief recess, are seeking limited accords on lesser disarmament issues as a follow-up to the partial nuclear test ban treaty signed in Moscow Aug. 5.

Hunt services due on Monday

Graveside funeral services for Marshall L. Hunt, 62, will be held Monday at 2 p.m. in Pilot Butte cemetery. He died Wednesday night in a Klamath Falls hospital, as the result of a heart attack suffered August 3, while participating in a trap-shoot competition.

A Bend resident 28 years, Mr. Hunt was employed by the Bend Hardware Co. for the past 12 years. A native Oregonian, he was born Oct. 27, 1900, in Oakland.

He is survived by his widow, Marie, 38 Greeley Avenue; a son, John R. Hunt, Everett, Wash.; a daughter, Mrs. John Baker, Bend; a sister, Mrs. Carey Stearns, Lufkin; a nephew, James Stearns, Tulalake, Calif., and two grandchildren, Pamela Marie and James Marshall Hunt.

The Rev. James P. McGugin of First Presbyterian Church will officiate at the rites. Tober's Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements. Members of the family requested that friends who wish to make memorial gifts do so in the form of contributions to the heart fund.

4-H Horse Day starts Saturday morning, 8:30

Saturday is the big day for 4-H equestrians.

Over 120 Deschutes County 4-H'ers will put on a Horse Day Saturday which was postponed from the Deschutes County Fair, July 30. The event will feature horse showmanship contests.

Events begin Saturday morning at 8:30, and are slated to run all day in the arena at the county fairgrounds in Redmond.

Competition will run in four major divisions: harness demonstration, drills, obstacle course running, and colts-at-halter contests. There will be sub-divisions in all of these. Competition will be divided according to three classes.

Juniors comprise 4-H youngsters from ages 9-11, the intermediates 12-14, and the seniors, 15 and over. There will be no admission charge. The grounds will be open to the public.

John Schmid, county 4-H agent, is in charge of the show. The Horse Day was postponed because of a horse flu epidemic on the suggestion of Dr. Glenn B. Rea, chief of the veterinary division, Oregon Department of Agriculture. Postponement also was advised by Burton Hutton, state 4-H agent.

Deschutes County 4-H'ers are competing in the show so they may be ready for the State Fair Horse Show, Friday and Saturday, September 6-7, at Salem.

Lawmaker may be called to explain 'whitewash' charge

SALEM (UPI) —The Legislative Interim Committee on Insurance today threatened to subpoena Rep. Shirley Field, R-Portland, to explain her charge that the committee would "whitewash" the Oregon insurance industry.

The subpoena threat came as the committee met to begin work on a five-point program during the next 14 months.

Sen. Thomas Mahoney, D-Portland, said Rep. Field "should be subpoenaed before the committee if she does not appear voluntarily to explain her charges."

Rep. James Redden, D-Medford, said he had discussed the issue with Rep. Field and she was anxious to appear at a committee meeting in Portland because she had several witnesses who also wished to address the committee.

Program Outlined
Committee Chairman F.F. Montgomery, R-Eugene, outlined the five-point program, and announced subcommittee assignments.

Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, Rep. Morris Crothers, R-Salem, and Montgomery will study the sale of life, health and accident insurance by companies not authorized to do business in Oregon.

A study of rate setting by title insurance companies will be made by Mahoney, Redden and Montgomery.

Rep. Philip Lang, D-Portland, Sen. Eddie Ahrens, R-Salem, and Mahoney will probe the sale of life insurance with provision for mutual fund participation.

Reserve, surplus and capital requirements of firms engaged in casualty or liability insurance will be studied by Redden, Ahrens and Pearson.

The above probes were ordered by the resolution authorizing the interim committee.

The committee added a fifth area of investigation, hospitalization insurance standards. Named to this subcommittee were Crothers, Lang and Redden.

Three of the committee members, Montgomery, Pearson and Lang, are engaged in insurance-related businesses, and Dr. Crothers is a past president of the Oregon Physicians Service.

State Insurance Commissioner Walter Korlann and Deputy Commissioner Ed Zoren outlined the operation of the state's insurance department at this morning's session.

Korlann said he had "no magic answer" to the problem caused by out-of-state firms which sell hospitalization insurance in Oregon by mail. He said the firms were not licensed in Oregon, and he had no authority to license them.
