London police report they've recovered more loot in \$7.1 million train robbery

LONDON (UPI) — Police disclosed they have found more of the loot taken in last week's \$7.1 million mail train robbery, some of it from two middle-aged sisters among five persons formally charged in the case today.

The total thus far recovered totaled \$674,000, with reports that police were seeking an additional \$1.5 million buried on a farm near the scene of the greatest robbery in history.

Two suitcases crammed with money, believed to be about \$280,000, were found in a forest near Dorking, south of London. Earlier, police said they had recovered about \$394,000 at Bournemouth, and \$5,600 in banknotes elsewhere.

As detectives moved swiftly and secretly to track down the gang that hijacked the Glasgow-London train eight days ago, five persons were brought into court at Linslade, four miles from the robbery scene at Cheddington.

All five were ordered held for another hearing Aug. 24. When they appeared today in the tiny courtroom in the Linslade police station, police said all denied the charges of complicity in the crime.

But police reported one of the men, William Boal, 47, said at the time of his arrest: "I am silly to get involved in this. I should have known better."

Morocco plot reported foiled

RABAT, Morocco (UPI) — A two-pronged plot to steal arms from a U.S. Navy base in Morocco and assassinate King Hassan II has been foiled.

Minister of Justice Ahmed Bahini told a news conference Thursday the rebels planned to steal weapons from the U.S. Navy Base at Kenitra with the help of some American Navy personnel.

He said at least 104 persons, including some prominent members of the left-wing union National Des Forces Populaires (UNFP), have been arrested.

A spokesman for the U.S. Embassy here said the arms scheme failed because of crack U.S. intelligence work, and that no American weapons fell into the hands of the plotters.

But reports said two Navy ensigns and four U.S. Marine Corps enlisted men, all unnamed, were implicated. They said the ensigns were broken in rank and given six-month jail sentences, and that the Marines were court-martialed.

Bahini said the plotters planned to kill Hassan on July 29 but they were arrested in Casablanca on July 16 and 17 because an officer in the king's royal black guards remained loyal.

Seaside faces damage action

PORTLAND (UPI) — Attorneys for a Eugene youth who said he was injured in last year's Labor Day riots at Seaside have filed a \$75,000 personal injury and false arrest suit against the City of Seaside and several police officers. The suit was filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court here.

The suit alleges Richard Frederick Wick, 19, sustained severe personal injury at the hands of officers and that he was held in violation of his civil rights as guaranteed by the 14th Amendment.

Named as defendants in the suit are the City of Seaside, former Police Chief John Warnonchik, Patrolman William Donovan and two unidentified persons on the police staff.

However, the police said Boal changed his tune to "I deny the charges" when he was formally booked.

Charged With Participation

Boal, a London toolmaker, and Roger John Cordrey, who were captured in a battle with police in the seaside resort of Bournemouth Wednesday night, were charged with actually taking part in the theft.

Boal's wife, Mrs. Renee Boal, 42, her sister, Mrs. Mary Florence Pilgrim, 49, and the sister's husband, Alfred Pilgrim, 52, were charged with knowingly receiving part of the stolen money.

Police in court said all five persons denied the charges. But

Early detection of mouth, lip cancer possible

CHICAGO (UPI) — Cancers of the mouth and lip constitute 10 per cent of all cancers found in men—and oral smears can help cure them early, two dentists said Thursday.

Often after radiation treatment of the cancerous mouth tissues, ulcers appear caused by tissue reaction to the treatment, Drs. Dwight R. Weathers, Milledgeville, Ga., and James W. Griffin, Atlanta, Ga., said in the current Journal of Oral Surgery, Anesthesia and Hospital Dental Service.

"It is difficult to distinguish these ulcers from a recurrence of the malignant lesion or tumor cells not affected by radiation," they said. "The oral smear presents a solution to this dilemma."

"It has been estimated that 80 per cent of the deaths from oral cancer could be prevented by early recognition and prompt, adequate treatment," the dentists said.

It is of great value in the early diagnosis of cancer and excellent for following patients already treated, they said. "By taking smears periodically, the dentist can check the progress of the patient and the effectiveness of the therapy."

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Year extension of farm labor program voted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate has voted a one-year extension of the Mexican farm labor program, but only after approving an amendment saying U. S. farm workers doing similar work must be given the same benefits accorded the Mexican workers.

Under the amendment, U. S. domestic workers must be offered workmen's compensation, housing, and transportation that is comparable to that given to Mexican farmers.

The Senate vote Thursday was 63-24. The bill now goes to the House, which voted down a two-year extension of the farm labor program. Opponents of the measure contended that it aggravated the unemployment situation in this country.

Mexican farm workers are used across the United States, but they are concentrated on large farms in California, Arizona and Texas.

The equal benefits amendment drew sharp criticism from Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark. He termed it a "meaningless gesture" to American workers, but one that had "effectively destroyed" the bracero program.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., voting for the amendment, offered by Sen. Eugene McCarthy, D-Minn., did "not know what they're talking about."

Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, R-Calif., complained that a few absentee senators could have beaten the proposal if they had been voting.

"My husband gave it (the money) to me last week," police quoted Mrs. Boal as telling them. "They did not tell me they (the banknotes) came from the train robbery. I hope I am not involved."

Detective Chief Supt. Thomas Butler, the Scotland Yard man in charge of the investigation, said no more arrests were expected today.

Nursing home ousts fourteen elderly persons

MONMOUTH (UPI) — Fourteen elderly persons were moved from the Madonna Nursing Home here Thursday because the owners of the home said they couldn't afford to keep them.

Mr. and Mrs. K. E. Draheim complained to the Polk County Welfare Commission that allowances for the recipients were not sufficient to run the home.

The fourteen, aged 77 to 95, were moved to homes at Dallas and Independence.

"We could keep them on the \$101 to \$174 a month we get," Mrs. Draheim said. "We could keep them like you wouldn't keep a dog."

She said the welfare commission had "downgraded the care allowance so much that we just can't keep them."

Mrs. Ruth Hardy, director of the Polk County Welfare Dept., said the complaint of not enough money is common among operators of nursing homes in the county, but this was the first time the department had been asked to move the patients.

No Comment

No official comment could be obtained on either report.

The five captured suspects were scheduled to appear in court at Linslade, about four miles from where the gang held up the Glasgow-London mail train eight days ago.

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4 small fires noted in state

Havana guns open fire on airplane

HAVANA (UPI) — Trigger-happy anti-aircraft artillerymen opened fire early today on a plane over Havana at the same time the government was reporting a bombing and strafing attack Thursday on a central Cuba sugar mill by a "pirate" aircraft.

It could not be determined immediately whether the two incidents were related although the government claimed the plane over the capital "apparently strayed off course" over the suburban Nico Lopez (formerly Shell) refinery.

The sugar mill attacked just before dawn Thursday was the Boliva plantation near Moron, in Camaguey Province. An armed forces communique said the "pirate" aircraft "fired several shots" at the mill and dropped two 50-pound bombs.

The communique obliquely identified the attacking plane as American saying it "came from and returned to the north," meaning the United States.

The report said anti-aircraft fire "forced the plane to withdraw," but did not identify it or say whether it was hit. The reference to its having strayed off course suggested it was a Cuban patrol plane.

Lorre's wife asks divorce

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Actor Peter Lorre was sued for divorce Thursday by Mrs. Anne Marie Lorre, 37, who charged extreme mental cruelty and said the 58-year-old whimsical movie villain was "utterly irresponsible" about money.

Mrs. Lorre said her husband made as much as \$70,000 a year but throughout their 11-year marriage "has irresponsibly wasted and squandered or secreted" money.

She asked \$1,150 temporary alimony and \$520 a month child support for their 10-year-old daughter pending trial of her suit. She also asked that a receiver be appointed so Lorre could not "dissipate or waste" any more money.

Trio admits tar, feathering elaborate hoax

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A man, his wife and the woman they are accused of tarring and feathering in an elaborate hoax "to stir up a racial incident" were in police custody today on charges of arson and conspiracy.

Mrs. Katherine Harwell, 26, in serious condition at General Hospital with severe burns she suffered when she was left tarred and feathered in a burning house, confessed the hoax Thursday and implicated Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lewis of suburban Walnut.

Firemen rescued Mrs. Harwell from the burning Lewis house Tuesday night. At the time, she told investigators that three white men had burst into the house, applied tar and feathers, bound her and set the place ablaze. She said the men, whom she did not recognize, called her a "nigger lover" and tore off her outer garments.

Mrs. Harwell said Thursday she permitted the Lewis couple to apply tar and feathers to her body. All three were booked Thursday night on the arson and conspiracy charges.

Although the Lewis couple refused to discuss the incident, sheriff's investigators theorized Lewis, 36, had thought he could get a previous condemnation of the house rescinded by creating a "racial incident."

The house was condemned as unfit for human habitation because of a previous fire.

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Massive protest by Negroes staged in St. Louis bank

Civil rights demonstrators flocked into an East St. Louis bank Thursday and staged a massive protest against alleged job hiring discrimination. The integrationists — men, women and children — promised to return today.

The "lie-down" demonstration by 200 demonstrators stopped business in the First National Bank, the largest in the city. Most of the integrationists went limp, and sweating police carried them bodily to cars and buses.

At least 31 of the demonstrators were booked but most of them, juveniles, were released without charges.

Thursday in Chicago demonstrations continued against mobile school classrooms and civil rights leaders proclaimed the protests would continue.

Other racial developments:

Richmond, Va.: A six-man biracial team meets for the first time today to plot the establishment of a privately-financed free school system for Prince Edward County, Va., where public schools were abandoned four years ago and avoid desegregation.

Mobile, Ala.: The city commission was requested to open all public accommodations to "all properly attired and well-behaved persons regardless of race, color or creed." Negroes threatened a federal court suit if the commission ignored the request.

New York: Thirteen civil rights demonstrators left for Washington on foot to participate in the civil rights march Aug. 28. They called it the "freedom walk to Washington."

Sourdoughs meet

PORTLAND (UPI) — The 32nd International Sourdough Reunion and Convention was under way here today with about 200 persons attending. The organization was founded here in 1931 and originally was made up of veterans of the Alaska-Yukon gold rush. Now anyone who stays in the north country through the winter can be a member.

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
