Polpourt: A visit by John D. Wendler this week reminded us that fall must be just around the corner.

Wendler is the U.S. Game Management agent for greater interior Oregon from Lakeview. He is in the Lake County city and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. He was recently transferred to Lakeview from Alaska.

A fish and wildlife representative periodically makes trips to Bend and Central Oregon on fish and hunt matters. This week's hello was much earlier than expected.

Wendler had with him the 1963 Federal regulations governing the hunting, possession, transportation and importation of the mourning and white-winged doves, and waterfowl. These booklets are out much earlier than in past years. Usually the booklets are not in circulation until the waterfowl season is well underway. Generally the dove season starts in September and waterfowl in late October.

This year, however, the books already have been circulated. In Bend, copies of the white 12-page regulations have been left at the following places: Harold's Sporting Goods on The Dalles-California Highway, Ken Cale's Hardware on E. Greenwood, Bob's Sporting Goods on E. Third, Masterson-St. Clair Hardware, Inc., on Bond Street, Bend Surplus Sales on Bond Street, and The West Side Hardware and Sporting Goods on Galveston Avenue.

BACK TO STANFORD

Yesterday when we listed by name the Oregonians that are on the 1963 Stanford football roster, we omitted the best one of the bunch. He is the Indians' number one left halfback, Dick Ragsdale. Ragsdale also doubles at quarterback. The Stanford grid booklet says simply of Ragsdale: "... there is only one conclusion — he's a fine football player."

Ragsdale is from Medford. He graduated from high school there in 1961, and in the fall of that year, Ragsdale competed on the 1961 Stanford freshman team and won the Murphy Memorial Award for being the most valuable freshman. Last year he was used almost exclusively on defense. He was a leading safety man for the 1962 Indians, topping the squad in pass interceptions and punt returns. Ragsdale averaged 34.3 yards on punts and ranked high in defensive statistics.

During the first half of the 1962 season, Ragsdale was handicapped by an ankle injury, but in the last four games, he saw 124 minutes of action. Ragsdale was switched to half back in spring practice this year "to take advantage of his running ability." This Oregonian could be Stanford's big gun this year.

SKIING'S HERE TO STAY

Two Central Oregon cities are going to get quite an honor this summer and this fall.

Bend will host the U.S. Olympic alpine ski team this month. It will be the first time that the U.S. team has ever had summer

Officers and directors of the Oregon State Bowling Association and the American Bowling Congress from as far away as Wisconsin will be present to help conduct a workshop session. The bowling weekend is slated as August 17-18.

Bend High School footballers (all, including freshmen) will be expected to attend a general football squad meeting next Monday at 7 p.m., in the senior high auditorium, Athletic Director Dick Gesser announced today.

In other words, all high school grid athletes expecting to compete this year are to be present.

This year for the first time, freshmen gridlers will be starting practice before school starts along with the high school varsity and JV's. Details will be presented on equipment issues, insurance and physical examinations. In addition there will be a program of football films.

Seventh and eighth grade football squads will start their programs after school begins, Gesser added.

The immortal
'Babe' died 15

NEW YORK (UPI) — Baseball fans fortunate enough to have seen Babe Ruth in his hey day have memories of the greatest Yankee of them all who died 15 years ago today.

They remember the Babe hitting one of his 714 home runs and running around the bases on legs that seemed too skinny to support his prodigious body.

They remember the Babe striking out — a sight almost as breathtaking.

They remember the Babe off the field — eating, drinking and carousing sometimes into the wee hours of the morning, and hitting a home run that same afternoon.

Yet the men who knew him best — his teammates — remember Ruth for different reasons. Their fondest memories of baseball's greatest hero concern (A) his sense of humor and (B) his fondness for kids.

Sense Of Humor

"The Babe had a great sense of humor," recalled Waite Hoyt, a pitcher on those explosive Yankee teams of the Ruth era and now a Cincinnati sportscaster. "He always got a big kick out of playing practical jokes."

"Tony Lazzeri was the butt of many Ruth jokes. In those days we'd put on our baseball pants by turning them inside out first, then put an elastic band around the knees and pull them up. One of Babe's favorite gags was to drop a cigarette into Lazzeri's pants just before he pulled them up."

"One day Lazzeri got back at him. Babe used to have a big, red handkerchief to mop his face. Just before he ran onto the field one day, Lazzeri set fire to Babe's handkerchief. There was Babe running out to right field and slapping his backside to put out the fire."

Earle Combs, who played alongside Ruth in the Yankee outfield for 11 years, remembered when the Babe toured with a vaudeville show during the off-season.

Enthusiastic Fan

"He was playing in a show in Kansas City," related Combs, "and after the performance a lady came rushing up to him and said, 'Babe, you were just wonderful... you should play in Shakespeare.' Good old Babe shook his head and said, 'Hell, no, lady, I gotta be in St. Louis tomorrow.'"

Combs, an insurance executive in Frankfort, Ky., believes that the modern ballplayer would be wise to emulate Ruth's relationship with young fans.

"The Babe loved children," he asserted. "I never saw him refuse a kid an autograph. He had more patience with young fans than any ball player I have seen."

Benny Bengough and Joe Dugan, two other former Ruth teammates, echoed Combs' feelings. Dugan added another significant thought on the greatest home run slugger of all time.

"The Babe would hit a hundred homers today," the former third baseman insisted. "Never forget that he used a 32-ounce bat and with this golf ball they use today — they don't kid me about the lively ball — Ruth would have hit a hundred a season."

Grand old man of football
celebrates 101st birthday

STOCKTON, Calif. (UPI) — The grand old man of football, Amos Alonzo Stagg, celebrates his 101st birthday here today.

Stagg is the only man in football's Hall of Fame to be honored both as a player and a coach. He has resided at a rest home here for the past few years.

His doctor, F. H. Bushner, director of the Amos Alonzo Stagg Foundation, said Stagg feels "okay physically."

Tonight the "official" birthday party is scheduled at Simpson's Restaurant in San Francisco and the public is invited. A huge cake with 101 candles will be served but out of deference to Stagg's life-long principle of abstinence, there will be no liquor served.

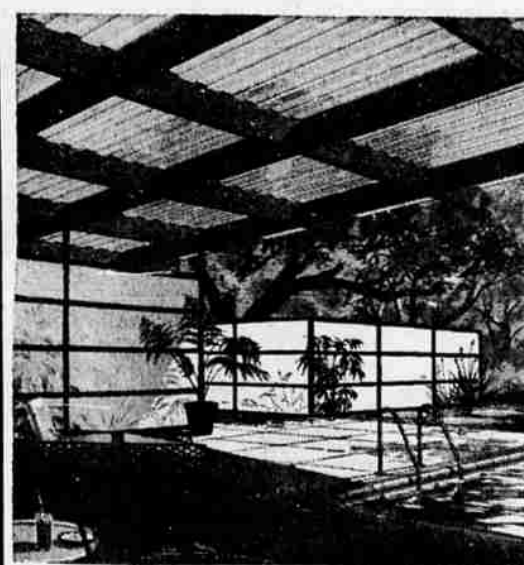
Stagg retired three years ago after 70 years of coaching. He

was an end at Yale and was named to Walter Camp's first All-America team. He later coached at the University of Chicago and University of Pacific. During his 57 years as head coach his team won 309 games, lost 200 and had 35 ties.

Nosler signs contract with
Norma, Swedish bullet firm

One of Bend's newest industries has really taken a shot in the arm.

It's an agreement that did it. The Nosler Partition Bullet Co., Inc., has signed a working contract with Norma of Sweden, one of the leading bullet producers in Europe.

Nosler produces just about the only precision bullet that is made especially for high-speed magnum hunting rifles. It is a favorite for other rifles, too. Actually, Nosler's partition bullet is two bullets in one, and the local corporation has a secure patent on the product.

Magnum rifles are now the trend. Bullets fired by these high velocity rifles hit with a much harder force. There is no way of controlling the expansion of the old cup bullet.

Up until recently, the Nosler product was bullets only. Now, with Norma of Sweden, the Nosler bullet will be used with shell and put out on the market as a packaged unit, instead of being used solely as hand-loaded ammunition.

Norma has been in step with the current trend. The Swedish company itself brought out a straight 300 magnum. That's why Norma of Sweden has been cast-

ing eyes towards the Bend industry. The demand for these especially designed bullets is increasing all the time.

Nosler will ship the bullets to Sweden. Norma will put shells on them, package them, and re-ship them to the United States for marketing. A lot will go to markets in Europe, too. As a matter of fact, Norma with Nosler soon will start appearing on sporting goods and hardware store shelves all over the nation.

Expensive? John Nosler disclosed that shipping via surface vessel is so cheap that the Nosler company can deal with Norma just as easily as it could with any of the top American companies.

Nosler has quite a history. The whole story starts in Ashland. The first manufacture of Nosler precision bullets started in 1949 on a hobby basis. That same year, Nosler ran a couple of small ads in the American Rifleman magazine, and the company was swamped

with mail. Nosler then decided to go into the bullet manufacturing business with more gusto.

During the Korean War, however, John Nosler was forced to be more with his regular occupation, the trucking business. Bullet manufacturing was resumed in 1954 and by 1959 the Nosler company had outgrown its facilities there in Ashland. Negotiations with the city and other bodies bogged down, and a fast-moving group of Bend citizens called the Bend Development Corp., a subsidiary of the Bend Chamber of Commerce, jumped onto the project. It wasn't long before Nosler was sold on moving to Bend.
