

Negroes seek better shake in TV industry

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Battle lines over militant Negro demands for quickly-increased representation in television and movie production have been drawn by industry workers. Here is how the situation shapes up:

—Unions representing actors, writers, musicians and publicists are generally strongly behind the position espoused by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

—Unions in the technical crafts have generally stiffened in resistance against Negro demands that at least one Negro be placed on every video and movie crew. These technical unions argue that they must cope with increasing unemployment, with seniority—and that the Negro position would result in perhaps illegal preference over other minorities. Furthermore, they deny charges of discrimination.

Unrealistic Demand

In addition, many television producers and other employees—a great number of them normally sympathetic to the Negro cause—are raising eyebrows at a publicized insistence that Negro regular be included in every video series. While generally agreeing that there will be more use of Negroes, they consider this demand unrealistic.

The Negro weapons are threefold. If a technical craft union does not grant the membership status sought, Negro spokesmen may try to haul it before the National Labor Relations Board and disenfranchise it. If a television series does not cooperate, with both actors and crew members, the sponsor may well find itself boycotted; and even if the series should cooperate but the technical union refuses to agree to a Negro crew member, the sponsor could suffer. Third, movies and studios may be picketed or demonstrated against if there is not an accession to the Negro demands, which include what Negroes consider a fair portrayal of their race.

The First Target

The first television series targeted for crew integration demands was, at last report, NBC-TV's "Hazel." Its selection was reported to have been at random and also because its crew for the next series of shows has, supposedly, not yet been fully selected. Negro leaders say there is no ill feeling against the sponsor, the Ford Motor Co.—with one spokesman saying he knew Ford "has spent a considerable amount of money in behalf of the Negro." Nevertheless, a "selective buying campaign" may come about if the crew demand is not fulfilled.

Of the argument that there should be a Negro regular in each series, one respected producer said: "You may as well say there must be an Italian, a Jew, a Presbyterian in a series. It's the rules that have been killing us on TV." Another producer, who feels he is sympathetic to using Negro actors regularly, said: "I don't like being told I have to use anyone." Another publicized aspect of the Negro argument is that they should be used in the same ratio in which they exist in the United States — one in nine—in all television shows.

The strain is tremendous: On people trying to be fair, on students who have trained for tough-to-get union jobs and feel now that they may be pushed back further, on sponsors who will go where the most money is — and on consciences trying to survive in-fighting.

A short discussion of Judge Foley's request for a higher salary for his secretarial help followed and Judge Penhollow moved that the Circuit Court's budget be increased \$250.00. The motion was seconded by Friday Holmes and unanimously carried.

Fred Shepard moved that the budget be adopted as published with the following amendments: Increase the estimated beginning cash balance from \$79,969.61 to \$86,416.31, and increase General Fund budgets as follows:

Watermaster — Field & Office Assistant, \$851.20.
Circuit Court — Bailiff-Secretary Wages, \$256.00.
Civil Defense — Salary (Civil Defense Director), \$2,500.00; Training, \$500.00; Office Supplies, \$250.00; Telephone, \$125.00; Radiological Equipment & Repair, \$300.00; Radio Equipment and Repair, \$700.00; Training Supplies, \$500.00; Shelter Marking and Stocking, \$75.00; Convention Exp., \$100.00.

Increase the estimated receipts of the Civil Defense Non-Tax Fund from \$1,700.00 to \$10,125.00, and increase expenditures of Civil Defense Non-Tax Fund budget from \$1,700.00 to \$10,125.00.

The motion was seconded by Friday Holmes and unanimously carried. Thereupon the budget was adopted as amended and it was ordered that the County Assessor make the necessary levies.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed Reclassification of Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area to Mt. Jefferson Wild Area.

In accordance with the established policy of the Forest Service and as required by Regulation U-2 of the Secretary of Agriculture, six months' public notice is hereby given of the intention (1) to modify the boundaries of the existing Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area located in the Deschutes, Mt. Hood, and Willamette National Forests in the State of Oregon, and (2) to reclassify that part of the primitive area and adjacent areas predominantly valuable for wilderness-type use under Regulation U-2 of the Secretary of Agriculture as the Mt. Jefferson Wild Area.

The Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area was established by the Forest Service on October 30, 1930, under Regulation L-20 of the Secretary of Agriculture. In 1933 it was enlarged to its present 86,700 acres. The Forest Service proposes to modify the boundaries of the primitive area to place them on identifiable topographic features, eliminate areas not qualifying for wilderness designation, and to add adjacent areas considered predominantly valuable for wild area use.

The proposed Mt. Jefferson Wild Area contains 96,944 acres, all of which is National Forest land. The proposed area extends along the crest of the Cascades from the vicinity of Breitenbush Lake southward approximately 24 miles, almost to the Santiam Highway. Mt. Jefferson is the most prominent feature in the area.
