LA Dodgers in 6-game lead

Once bitten, twice shy. Maybe that's the reason cautious Walt Alston shies away from any pennant talk even though his Los Angeles Dodgers seem to lead they're "in" with a six-game lead and only six more weeks to go.

The Dodgers said good-bye to all time Sunday to the Polo Grounds with a 7-0 and 3-2 sweep of the New York Mets.

One of the Dodgers let the team's feelings be known when he left a clubhouse note which said:

"We'll see you again at Yankee Stadium the first week in October."

Alston, still scarred from last year's loss, said absolutely nothing about the pennant apart from the time - honored, "We'll just

keep playing one game at a time."

The Dodger skipper wouldn't even say for sure that his club has snapped its batting slump despite five straight victories.

"Let's see," he pondered, "we scored 22 runs in the last four games. Well, at least that's more than we've been getting lately."

Pleased By Pitching

Alston, however, was pleased by the Dodgers' pitching Sunday. Don Drysdale hurled a three-hit shutout for his 16th victory in the opener and rookie Dick Calkins pitched five scoreless innings in relief of Pete Richert to earn his second triumph in the nightcap.

Doug Camilli hit a two-run homer in the first game and Tommy Davis drove in two runs in each contest as the Dodgers gained a full game on both the

Giants and Cardinals, who were rained out.

The fourth-place Phillies won their seventh in a row by defeating the Pirates, 3-1, the Braves beat the Colts, 3-2 and the Cubs took two from the Reds, 2-1 and 4-0.

In the American League, the Yankees went 10½ games ahead with an 8-2 and 8-4 sweep of the White Sox, the Senators downed the Twins, 7-3, the Indians beat the Red Sox, 7-4, the Athletics bounced the Orioles, 5-4, and the Tigers edged the Angels, 3-2.

Phils Score Early

The Phillies tagged Don Schwall for two runs in the first inning on a pair of walks and two singles and went on to defeat the Pirates on Johnny Klippstein's fine relief job. Klippstein took over when starter Ray Culp came up with a sore arm in the third inning and shut out Pittsburgh the rest of the way.

Warren Spahn, set on winning 20 games for the 13th time in his career, got No. 15 with a seven-hitter against the Colts. The Braves nicked loser Skinny Brown for two runs in the fourth, and Roy McMillan singled home the winning run in the seventh.

The Cubs' two victories over the Reds gave them a total of 64 for the season and matched their highest win total for any year since 1959.

Lindy McDaniel saved Larry Jackson's 14th victory in the opener when he entered the game with the bases full in the eighth inning and struck out Frank Robinson and Gordy Coleman and got John Edwards on an infield out. Jim Maloney suffered his fifth defeat against 18 victories.

Paul Tolt blanked the Reds on four hits for his fourth win in the nightcap. Billy Williams and Lou Brock homered off loser John Tsitouris.

Light, middle weight tiffs to top week's card

NEW YORK (UPI)—A "may-be" lightweight title fight at Saginaw, Mich., Monday night and a nationally televised middleweight bout at Madison Square Garden Saturday top this week's light boxing schedule.

At Saginaw, the promoter is advertising the fight between high contenders Paulie Armistead of Los Angeles (no. 1) and Menny Lane of Saginaw (no. 2) as for the "vacant" lightweight crown.

The Michigan State Athletic Board of Control regards the 135-pound championship as vacant because on June 11 both the World Boxing Association's (WBA) Championships Regulations Committee and Executive Committee stripped Carlos Ortiz of his title because of his refusal to defend against the then top contender Lane.

And the WBA's championships Rating Committee apparently agreed with Ortiz of New York instead of with the WBA's other two committees because it continued to rate Ortiz as world champion.

Meanwhile, the WBA now is holding its annual convention at Miami Beach and it may rule definitely before Monday night

whether Ortiz is still champion or whether Armistead and Lane indeed are fighting for the 135-pound crown. Southpaw Lane will be favored at 7-5.

At New York's Garden, Saturday night, middleweight contender Joe Gonzalez of Puerto Rico will fight Juan (Rocky) Rivero, Argentine knockout specialist, for home television (ABC).

Gonzalez, 23 and ranked 10th by the WBA, seeks his fifth straight victory. He is favored at 2-1. Rivero, 25, is not ranked among the top 10. But his 38 victories in 46 bouts include 35 knockouts.

Terry Baker shines at moments, but Vikings whip LA Rams, 27-3

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The Los Angeles Rams today looked forward to an exciting season from rookie quarterback Terry Baker despite a weekend setback at the hands of the Minnesota Vikings.

Although the Rams went down 27-3 in Saturday night's Viking game in Memorial Coliseum, Baker, the All-America player from Oregon State, drew praise both from Rams coach Harland Svare and Viking coach Norm Van Brocklin.

Svare admitted Baker "moved the ball club," while Van Brocklin enthused the rookie was "a real exciting player," adding, "he's going to drive people crazy."

One reason for Svare's laconicism might have been the Rams' failure to cash in at the goal line on Baker's marches. The long scoring play by Los Angeles came in the second quarter on a 29-yard field goal by Danny Villanueva following a 41-yard drive piloted by Baker.

Baker completed 8 of 14 pass attempts for 93 yards and had two interceptions. He carried the ball three times for 16 yards.

In addition to two intercepted passes, Baker was foiled in a key fourth-quarter touchdown drive after leading the Rams to the Viking 19. With the score only 10-3 at this point, halfback Jon Arnett threw a desperate pass intended for Baker after failing to get through the Viking line. The job was intercepted by Viking defensive end Don Hultz, who carried the gift 60 yards to the Ram 5-yard line, setting up the next Minnesota touchdown.

It was this sort of misplay that Svare promised to correct this week as the Rams prepared for a rematch this weekend in Portland with the Dallas Cowboys, who corraled the Rams 17-14 in the pre-season opener.

"We've got to do some thing to get in, and we're going to work on it this week," Svare promised.

Darkhorse Casper wins Insurance City Open

HARTFORD, Conn. (UPI)—None of his fellow pros gave Billy Casper a chance of winning the Insurance City Open when the 72-hole tournament opened last Thursday.

After all, this was the Californian's first tournament appearance since May when he quit dur-

ing the fourth round of the Tournament of Champions at Las Vegas with a hand injury.

Casper still looked like a poor bet Sunday when he started the final round at the Wethersfield Country Club trailing pace-setter George Bayer by five strokes.

However, the 32-year-old former sailor from Bonita, Calif., fired a six-under-par 63 to take the top prize of \$6,400 with an aggregate score of 271. Bayer finished a shot back of Casper after setting for a 71 in the final round.

Wes Ellis, who led through the first two rounds, slipped to third place with a 275, two shots ahead of Doug Ford.

Jack Nicklaus, the Masters and PGA champion, finished with a 278 to tie Art Wall, Dave Marr and Bo Worthington for fifth place. Julius Boros, the Open champion and a sentimental favorite to win his first Insurance City Open, wound up back in the pack with a 281.

United States returns to tennis power in Davis win

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Freckled Dennis Ralston put the United States back among the world's tennis powers today after he almost singlehandedly defeated the Mexican Davis Cup team in the North American zone eliminations.

There's still a long way ahead before the U.S. team can invade Australia to challenge for the cherished trophy emblematic of the world's championship. But Mexican captain Francisco Contreras said the United States has a good chance to go all the way and bring the Davis Cup back to North America.

Ralston clinched the playoff Sunday in the first match when he swept aside Mexico's brilliant Rafael Osuna, 6-1, 6-3, 7-5. That victory came after the 21-year-old youngster had teamed with Chuck McKinley Saturday to upset the favored Mexican doubles team of Osuna and Antonio Palafox. Ralston scored the first U.S. singles win Friday over Palafox after Osuna had defeated McKinley in a hard-fought five-set match.

The doubles win gave the U.S. a lead of two matches to one, and Ralston clinched the elimination matches with his win over Osuna, leaving McKinley's win over Palafox by a score of 6-4, 6-4, 6-3 an anticlimax.

"That was the best I've ever seen Ralston play in a big match," the articulate Mexican captain added. "If he keeps up the pace he had in the series, he could become the best player in the world."

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Mattisons win

PORTLAND (UPI)—Lloyd and Jack Mattison of Eugene won their fifth straight Oregon Golf Association Father-Son tournament championship, and their sixth in seven years, Sunday at Oswego Lake Country Club.

They fired a two-over-par 144 to edge Corvallis High School football coach Lee Gustafson and his son, Mark, by one stroke.

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Roseburg still in regional Legion tourney

ROSEBURG (UPI)—Roseburg will meet Lewiston, Idaho, tonight for the right to play Billings, Mont., for the American Legion regional baseball tournament championship here Tuesday night.

Billings gained the finals of the six-day, double-elimination tourney by edging the Oregon team 5-4 in 10 innings Sunday night.

The decision left Billings with a 3-1 record and Roseburg with a 2-1 mark. Lewiston also is 2-1. Roseburg topped Billings 8-4 in the opening round.
