TELEVISION IN REVIEW

Why? Reviewer ponders reasons for Sunday night TV special

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — CBS-TV Sunday night aired a Jo Stafford musical special, with Bob Hope and James Darren, and I can't imagine anyone lasting it out except persons desperate from boredom, or television reviewers from a sense of duty.

Being wholly of the latter category, and probably partly of the former, I spent the hour wondering what I deduced to be impending waves of psychosomatic illness, and asking myself the most obvious question concerning the entire network proceedings, namely: Why? That is to say: Why? Or to be more explicit about it: Why?

Well, one of the most obvious answers is that at least it was better than putting on another rerun. And for all practical purposes, you have seen similar versions of Sunday night's shabby, sentimental hogwash for several decades now, and far better. In another sense, too, the hour was in a way a rerun in that it had previously been shown in England, having been taped and produced there. And I think that perhaps the most depressing thing about the whole affair was seeing the British members of the musical ensemble, so individual in their own way, imitate us so badly — and our worst stuff at that.

Miss Stafford is reasonable guest-spot material, but a viewer must be endowed with extreme good nature to put up with an hour. To be perfectly fair, she was simply given nothing of imagination to work with, and her own gifts of magnetism have their limits. As for young Mr. Darren, he exudes, in his singing, the formidability of a limp dish rag; and his gift for lines is almost as proficient. As for Hope — well, there was the usual shotgun barrage of jokes — no, wisecracks — a few of them good for a snicker, most not that much. You know most of the jokes by now.

The Channel Swim: As expected, the networks are having headaches trying to get sponsors for news-in-depth reports on the de-

segregation crisis. As Variety, the show business paper, noted, some advertisers with stay with such programs if there is a "participation" basis with other sponsors, so that no single company is fully identified with the effort.

NBC-TV's "Bonanza" and its sponsor, Chevrolet, are reported to have received considerable mail concerning the participation of one of the show's stars, Pernell Roberts, in a desegregation demonstration at a Torrance, Calif., housing tract. Much of the mail was said to have come from Detroit and the South.

Roberts, a maverick who has wanted to get out of "Bonanza" for a long time, supposedly will be written out of the series this season after he takes a fictional bride.

Playwright William Inge is reported to have quit his plans to develop a one-hour drama series for CBS-TV dealing with a mid-western family. Exiled King Peter of Yugoslavia is scheduled to visit NBC-TV's "Tonight" show next Monday; he is 39. David Susskind may produce a drama about England's multi-million-dollar train robbery for NBC-TV's "Show of the Week."

Hope expressed for progress at Geneva sessions

GENEVA (UPI) — Authoritative sources have expressed hope that the 17-nation disarmament conference here may provide the basis for new East-West agreements before it recesses early next month.

The introduction of two new U.S. proposals last week reversed the belief that the arms talks were unlikely to produce any significant developments before they adjourn Sept. 6 to enable delegates to be present at the opening of the U.N. General Assembly in New York Sept. 18.

The Russians already have rejected the U.S. proposal that both nations halt the production of the fissionable material from which nuclear weapons are made.

Authoritative sources said, however, that a second U.S. proposal—calling for the mutual establishment of observation posts to guard against surprise attacks—offers "a very likely possibility" for agreement.

Neutralist delegates have said an outline for possible agreement on this subject might be worked out in the near future.

Speed mark set by grandfather

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah (UPI)—A Van Nuys, Calif., grandfather became the world's fastest driver of a stock-bodied passenger car Sunday when he hit 195.94 miles per hour across the Bonneville salt flats.

Norman C. Thatcher, 66, led the field of drivers here for the Bonneville National Speed Trials on the famous speedway.

Believed to be the oldest active professional racing driver in the United States, Thatcher drove a 1963 supercharged Plymouth in an attempt to get the sedan to a goal of 200 miles per hour. He said after his achievement that he is sure he will top the 200 mph mark today.

In his run, Thatcher hit 172 mph in 2 1/4 miles and was up to 192 mph by the time he had hit the 4 mile mark.

Shortly before he hit the 190 mph mark, Thatcher's radiator started to leak and sprayed the windshield. He said he felt this hampered his run.

Last year Thatcher hit 191.89 mph in the speed trials. Drivers from California, Utah and other Western states are on hand for the trials.

Morse comments on settlement

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., issued the following statement last week regarding settlement of the Northwest lumber strike:

"I congratulate the industrial statesmanship of the management and union representatives of the lumber industry which has resulted in a new three year contract. This achievement offers to the men and women who make up the industry, and to our state, the promise of orderly economic progress, and is a monument to the value of industrial democracy."

SALEM (UPI) — Receipt of a \$1.2 million Ford Foundation grant to support the Oregon Program was announced last week by the State Department of Education.

The money will be used by local schools, colleges and the State Department of Education in efforts to improve Oregon education in the public schools.

Dr. Leon P. Minear, superintendent of public instruction, said improvements in education resulting from the program "will result in a more effective use of the tax dollar."

Oregon Program participants include the State Department of Education, nine Oregon colleges and universities, and 20 school districts. The money will be used to further such items as intern programs, team teaching, flexible scheduling, nongraded programs, and the use of new technology in instruction, Minear said.

PROCLAIMS FREEDOM DAY

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Mayor Joseph M. Barr issued a proclamation as "Freedom Day" here.

Barr said he drew up the proclamation to help dramatize President Kennedy's civil rights bill. He also said that city employees can take part in the march on Washington the same day at their own expense.
