

Gov. Hatfield says he won't be 'favorite son' candidate in '64

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield said today he would not be a "favorite son" candidate for the Republican presidential nomination in Oregon's primary election next May 15.

Sicka receives 15-day sentence

"I have never indicated any interest in a favorite son role. I don't seek it," he said.

Hatfield maintained he would file a withdrawal notice if necessary to keep his name off the Oregon primary ballot.

The governor is frequently mentioned as a Republican vice presidential possibility, and sometimes as a Presidential dark horse.

Mum on Vice Presidency
In answer to a question from United Press International, Hatfield replied "you cannot assume I would accept" the vice presidency if it were offered.

Asked if he would refuse the offer, Hatfield replied, "No one would be discourteous enough to give a flippant yes or no answer. The office deserves more respect than that, and an answer should be seriously considered."

"It is a moot question. It won't happen. I am a political realist, and this is not in the cards," Hatfield insisted.

He referred to the speech he made to a Malheur County Republican picnic Aug. 9 in which he commented, "they said I would run against Dick Neuberger in 1960, against Wayne Morse in 1962, and they are at it again saying I'll run against Lyndon Johnson in 1964. They are as wrong now as they were then."

Hatfield has consistently insisted he is not a candidate for presidential office.

Observers Not Convinced
Political observers don't seem convinced he means it. They point to Hatfield's urging that the Republicans can win in 1964 if they work at it, and note the apparent wide-open struggle now underway for leadership of the party.

Hatfield has carefully avoided aligning himself with any of the apparent front runners in the Republican party, including New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater.

Bend may have been coolest spot in nation

Bend's weather was cool again last night — possibly the coolest reported in any state outside of Alaska. Bend's night chill was 34 degrees, with August frost again reported from some parts of town. The low temperature for the night was recorded about dawn.

Redmond registered a low of 38 for the clear night.

The present chilly week continues a weather pattern trend that has lasted through most of the summer. Highest temperature recorded in Bend so far this season was 89 degrees.

Records indicate that never in the 60-year history of the Bend weather station has a summer temperature under 90 degrees been recorded at the local weather station.

Even in 1903, when Bend experienced its coolest July in history, a high of 93 was recorded in May, a high of 82 in June and a maximum of 93 in August.

Forecasts call for fair weather in Central Oregon tonight and Wednesday, but with some afternoon cloudiness. Temperatures will remain about the same, with a low of 36 forecast for Bend tonight.

Concert planned by Methodists

Other numbers will be a piano solo by Mrs. Severin, "Dance of the Dwarf," three solos by Mrs. Waller, "Let My Song Fill your Heart," "Girls of Cadiz," and "Into the Night," and a group of songs from Broadway musicals by the Waller family.

Green Ridge lookout put in service

Construction of a new Deschutes National Forest lookout, in the Green Ridge country, has been completed and is now manned, with Sig Skavlan, Jr., Bend, on duty.

The new lookout is unique in that it is not located on a high peak to provide a 360 degree sweep of the Central Oregon horizon, but faces in only one direction, west. Visible are the timbered areas in deep canyons of the eastern Cascades, where considerable slashing from timber cutting remains on the ground. It is an area of high fire hazard.

The lookout was constructed with brush disposal funds. A Portland prefabricating firm was in charge.

Built on a westward facing rocky ledge, the new lookout is a cabin-like structure, not a viewpoint on high stilts. From the building, the lookout can obtain an 180 degree sweep of the east-slopes of the Cascades, from canyons leading up to Mt. Jefferson south to Jack Creek and other timbered draws east of Mt. Washington.

BOLT KILLS BROTHERS

Plans made for school start at Crook High

PRINEVILLE — With less than two weeks remaining until the opening of school in Crook County, students are reminded that one or two activities will begin somewhat earlier.

All students are invited to pick up their class schedules for the coming year at the high school any time during the week of August 26. Due to a preliminary registration last spring, when schedules were arranged, the usual three-day resiguration period will not be held before school opens this fall.

Office hours at CCHS are from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. A special day, August 29, has been set aside for registration of all pupils who will be new to the high school this coming year.

Elementary school registration has also been changed, in that all students who attended either of the grade schools in Prineville last year will be considered to be reentered again this fall. Not many drop-outs are expected, a school official noted.

Students who are registered for the new three-year stint at the Prineville junior high school are asked to be at the school sometime August 29-30 to pay their fees and receive their class schedules. Students whose addresses have changed during the summer should re-register at that time.

Flea beetles scarce in area

The potato flea beetle has been scarce in Central Oregon during the past season, according to surveys made in July and August by two Oregon State University entomologists, reports R. H. Sterling, county extension agent.

Early in July H. E. Morrison, associate professor of the Department of Entomology, Oregon State University, in company of other entomologists, failed to find either the tuber flea beetle or the western potato flea beetle in twenty potato fields in Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook Counties. Fields were selected for the survey in areas where serious potato flea beetle problems had been reported in previous years.

Again in August Dr. Morrison, in company with Bob Every, extension entomologist from Oregon State, visited Central Oregon potato fields. In 12 fields, most of which had been severely infested with the flea beetle in previous years, no potato flea beetles were found. A few flea beetles of a different species, similar to the potato flea beetle but not injurious to potatoes, were collected, Sterling said.

Abandoned barn claimed by fire

PRINEVILLE — Firemen raced to a rural fire call late Sunday evening on the report that a barn was burning in a field on McKay Road. The barn was located some distance from the paved road in the center of a dry field on Hudspeth property.

Firemen turned onto a dirt lane in the direction of the fire, only to find their progress halted by a potato field which had been planted across a dirt road which once led to the abandoned house and barn in the field. Firemen were forced to turn back.

A group of men crossed the potato field on foot to establish a fire ring around the barn and prevent spreading of the blaze. Cause of the fire was believed to be either a vagrant, or children playing in the building.

FIRE RUN MADE

Bend firemen spent 10 minutes pumping out a fire that spread through a small area of brush and grass at the edge of Juniper Park Monday afternoon. It was located at E. Seventh and Irving. Children's matches were blamed for the fire that caused no damage.

Four more persons accident victims in Oregon

Four more persons lost their lives in separate traffic and drowning accidents in Oregon Monday. The deaths came after 12 persons died in accidents in the state during the weekend.

Mrs. Anna Zelinka, 76, Hubbard, was injured fatally in a two-car crash on a Marion County road five miles northwest of Woodburn. She died 3 1/2 hours after the crash in an Oregon City hospital.

Frank Pratt, 50, Coos Bay, was fatally injured in a three-vehicle accident in the Coos County community of Empire. His car hit a pickup truck head-on after clipping a car. He died 40 minutes after the accident at a Coos Bay hospital.

Kenneth Pailles, 18, Klamath Falls, was killed in a one-car accident on State Highway 270 about 25 miles northwest of Klamath Falls. His car hit a bridge abutment over a water-filled irrigation canal.

Lester McDoulan, 67, Waldport, drowned at Yaquina Bay when he stepped in an underwater hole while walking ahead of an incoming tide. He had been digging clams with his wife and Mrs. Leslie Bereth of Seal Rock. A search for his body continued today.


TULELAKE, Calif. (UPI) — Curtis Oren Evans, 7, was killed Monday night when a car struck him as he was crossing State Highway 139 near here, authorities said.

EDINBURGH, Tex. (UPI) — Pablo Jimenez, 33, faced a week in jail and a \$50 fine today for the unprecedented crime of driving a cotton picker while drunk.

Jimenez told Judge Joe R. Alamia in court Monday he drove the picker four hours, stopping only at bars. His trip ended in a ditch.

Highway Patrolman James Billings estimated damage to the mechanical picker at \$4,000.
