Eastern Oregon fires mopped up

Fire crews from the Bureau of Land Management today mopped up two blazes that burned 8,500 acres of grass and sagebrush in Eastern Oregon before being controlled Monday.

One of the fires, a 4,000-acre range fire west of Huntington in Baker County, destroyed five miles of fence, a cow camp bunkhouse and a sheep shearing shed. Damage was estimated at \$5,000.

The second blaze burned 4,500 acres north of Vale in Malheur County. The BLM said both were man-caused and broke out late Sunday.

Meanwhile, state fire crews battled nine small fires Monday. The largest was a 4½-acre blaze near Rogue River. All nine were man-caused and have been brought under control.

The U.S. Forest Service reported 16 small fires in Oregon and Washington in the 24 hours ending at 10 a.m. today. All but five were set by lightning.

Zoo maternity watch resumed

PORTLAND (UPI)—The watch has resumed in the maternity ward of Portland Zoo's elephant house.

Zoo officials say the time is near for Tuy Hoa and Pet. They predicted the same thing months ago but insist they can't be too far off this time. Electrocardiogram tests show the baby elephants are alive and kicking, according to Zoo veterinarian Matthew Maberry.

Packy, the first elephant born in the United States in 43 years, was born in the zoo April 14, 1962. The second baby, Me-Tu, came along a few months later.

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Decision due on zone issue

Bend city commissioners will decide Wednesday whether an alleged shortage of apartments in the city is sufficient reason for appending an emergency clause to a zone change ordinance.

The clause would eliminate a 30-day waiting requirement on the ordinance which is to receive final reading at Wednesday's regular meeting. It was requested Monday by contractor Al Bell, who told the board he would lose a substantial sum of money unless the ordinance becomes immediately valid.

Bell petitioned the zone change May 9, this year. He needs it to construct apartment units on property between E. Fourth and Fifth Streets and Alden and Burnside Avenues. The request change is from an R-3 (single-family dwelling) to R-4 (multiple-family dwelling) zone.

The contractor's petition has gained commission approval, but only after a series of delays caused by meeting postponements and other red tape.

On Wednesday the board will determine whether a shortage of rental facilities exists, and, if so, whether the clause would be justifiable.

Dugan given convention post

Lester M. Dugan, who serves the Bend congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses as district minister, has been named assistant convention manager for the "Everlasting Good News" convention at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif., September 1-8.

Dugan has been serving at convention headquarters since June 25, lining up the organization. A veteran organizer, he will share the responsibility of supervising 20 departments geared to accommodate an estimated 70,000 delegates coming from 50 states and 24 foreign countries.

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In-service session set for teachers

Teachers in all Deschutes county schools, with the exception of those in the Bend district, will have their in-service program Wednesday, August 28. The all-day program will be held in the cafeteria of John Tuck School, Redmond, it was announced today by David Potter, county school superintendent.

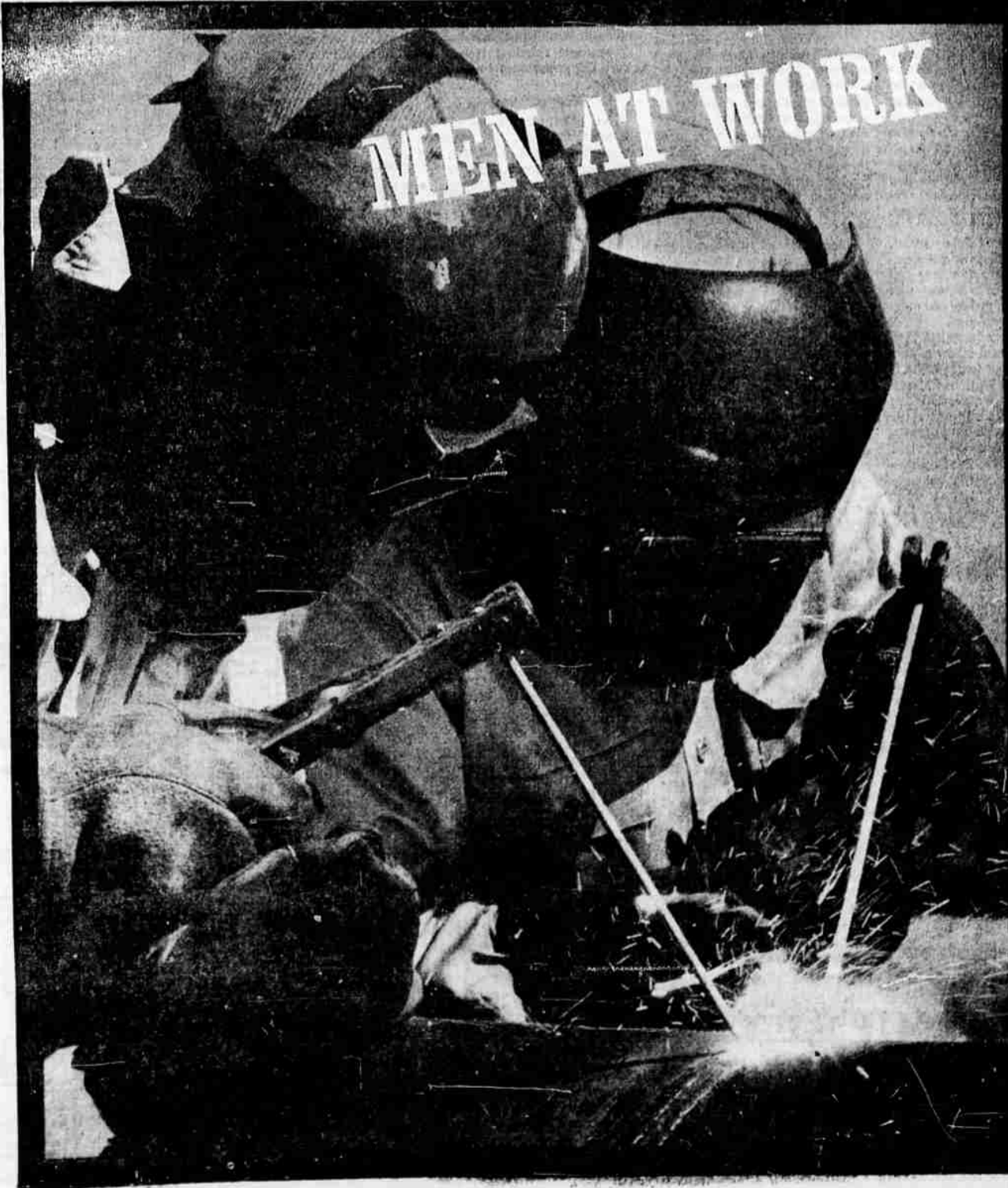
John Monahan, State Police captain, said he received a sketchy radio report on the death of Strandberg, who was 52.
