

Television in review

Panel considers bias charges in handling of racial news

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — CBS-TV Thursday night offered a unique hour of self-appraisal: a look at the controversy over how broadcasting and the press have covered the desegregation crisis.

CBS is well aware of the ultra-sensitivity of the problem, having been accused by some quarters of slanting coverage in favor of the Negro cause. NBC has run into the same controversy. But since the controversy extends to most, if not all, communications media, the special program expanded its scope to include the printed press as well.

Reporter Charles Collingwood began the broadcast by reading from several letters that complained of the coverage on CBS and elsewhere. Shortly thereafter, the remainder of the hour was turned over to a discussion group of some leading figures in journalism. They were:

James J. Kilpatrick, editor of the Richmond (Va.) News-Leader; Grover Hall Jr., editor-in-chief of the Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser; Louis M. Lyons, curator of the Nieman Fellowships in Journalism at Harvard University; and Richard S. Salant, president of CBS News. The moderator was Edward Barrett, dean of the Graduate School of Journalism at Columbia University.

The chief value of the hour to television viewers was an important one: to make them aware of an extraordinarily difficult situation in which broadcasting and the press, even when at their best, are dealing with material that touches viewers and readers with such emotion that it is virtually impossible to satisfy everyone. In one of the few general agreements of the night, all members of the panel affirmed that the desegregation story was one of the toughest of all time.

If the program did nothing more than create a deeper understanding and sympathy for this problem among those who tuned

in, it was a success. Plenty of verbal punches were thrown, some glancing, some direct hits. Many of the points, though not new, are of such steady controversy that their impact was powerful. For instance: the argument that northern papers have, until recently, ignored the racial problem in their own back yards; the argument that southern papers—and some northern ones—suppressed the racial story; the argument that television gives more time to desegregation advocates than opponents. And so forth.

There was general agreement, however, that both American wire services are doing a good, balanced job covering the crisis.

The Channel Swim: A spokesman for Hollywood's biggest Negro talent agency says there has been a "definite" increase in the use of Negro entertainers in recent months.

Eugene Burdick, co-author of "The Ugly American" and "Fail Safe," is reported working up a possible CBS-TV series about the problems of natives in the South Pacific. The test film for NBC-TV's planned weekly two-hour features, aimed at the 1964-65 season, is said to be based on Ernest Hemingway's "The Killers." Perry Como, who once was hard to get out of a studio, tours seven cities for his NBC-TV specials this season.

CBS-TV cancelled its weekly, half-hour children's show, "The Reading Room," and has come up with a replacement, as promised. It is entitled "Do You Know?" and, each Saturday starting Oct. 12, features youngsters in questions-and-answer sessions based on selected books. Two teams made up of three 9-to-12-year-olds from different schools will compete, in what appears to be an attempt to provide a livelier format.

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False report said to be melee spark

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—A federal attorney says a false "eyewitness report" of a bombing last May sparked a melee of 2,000 angry Negroes who stoned police after another bombing here Tuesday night.

In an "unprecedented" statement on a case still under investigation, U.S. Attorney Macon Weaver said Wednesday the false tale of a Negro about the bombing last May was "directly responsible" for the angry demonstration Tuesday.

Weaver said an unidentified Negro told the Justice Department he saw two Birmingham policemen toss a bomb at the home of integration leader Rev. A.D. King last May.

The U.S. attorney said he hoped leaders of the Negro community would spread the word about the false story.

Weaver said that after extensive questioning here and in Washington the Negro admitted the story was a fabrication.

The attorney said the violence that resulted after Negro attorney Arthur Shores' home was bombed Tuesday night was a "direct result" of the false statement circulated in the Negro community.

He said the Negroes knew of the story but did not know it was a lie. Some 2,000 Negroes gathered near Shores' home shortly after the blast. They threw rocks and bricks at officers and automobiles until police, firing over the heads of the crowd, dispersed them.

HOPES TO STAY ON

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman plans to hold on to his Cabinet post "as long as the President wants me."

Freeman, who returned from a month-long trip to Russia and other Soviet bloc nations Wednesday, said he had "no indication" the President did not want him. Republicans claimed Freeman's trip was to groom him for a diplomatic post and then to ease him out of the Cabinet because of the administration's defeat in the wheat referendum last May.

Approval given on transactions

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Power Commission Tuesday authorized Pacific Power Light Co., Portland, Ore., to acquire electric facilities in Wyoming and Oregon.

In separate transactions, the company will pay the government \$213,000 for facilities used by the Bureau of Reclamation in Carbon and Sweetwater counties, Wyo.; and buy from Eastern Oregon Electric Cooperative distributing facilities in the Pendleton, Ore., area for \$69,812.
