Football—mountain teams gun for Bucks

It's that ancient American scholastic favorite — king football. There is no question about it. Leather will tug together in just a shade over three weeks.

Practice for the Central Oregon schools, others in the Intermountain Conference (and the whole state of Oregon for that matter) begins Monday, Boom. It's here. It's time to take a look at the grid picture and to make those speculations that every year never fail to get scribbles in trouble.

This year the Intermountain loop appears to be more than just a little unpredictable. It has in its ranks a whole host of darkhorses. The league looks stronger than it has looked for a number of seasons. The greater horses like Pendleton look slightly weaker. . . . The Dalles look stronger. . . . and the rest loom as improved (some vastly so) over last year.

To make Intermountain prognosticating even more difficult, this season will see every game "a counter." Every game is a league game. The State of Oregon athletic control group allows only nine games per season. With the addition of Mac HI and Madras two years ago the league went to 10 teams. With the return to full round-robin play, no team within the group will be playing any extra or "wrapup" tilts.

Pendleton's Buckaroos, defending champions and a real threat in state playoffs the last few years, will sorely miss Steve Bunker at end. Nevertheless, Coach Ron Requa expects another good club. The Bucks still rate as "the team to beat." The Bucks have 11 lettermen back despite losses of Bunker, Tim Temple and Ron White. Requa announced this week, "we're going to try to win that championship again."

According to what we have gathered from coaches put together with comments about the matter from Nolan Skiff of the Pendleton East Oregonian, the picture looks something like this.

Hermiston looms as the leading threat to Buck supremacy. The Umatilla County boys are big and experienced. There is some indication that the Hermiston crew may have some speed, too. Bend (it's really dangerous to say so but coaches elsewhere insist on it) also rates the "dangerous" label. Bend and Hermiston, at least at this date, appear to be the leading darkhorses.

The Dalles Indians cannot be ignored, either. The Columbia River crew will be big and sound. People up The Dalles way so far have made few observations on the squad.

La Grande could be tough. Under a brand new coach, Gordon Tallchief, Skiff of the East Oregonian feels that the Tigers could get their needed boost and be "surprisingly strong."

Here in Central Oregon, Bend Coach Tom Winbiger isn't saying much. "I'll just have to wait and see," he has said. Redmond rates a darkhorse label, too. The Panthers have a new head mentor in Doc Savage. It is difficult to anticipate how the 'Cat crew might develop. Prineville suffered heavily from graduation. The Crook County boys lost Mike Bar-

row at quarter, and the two "round men," Dick Caudle and Larry Kirkpatrick. Both impressed would-be tacklers last year with Sherman tank antics.

Prineville has a new coach as does Redmond. Bub Dowling, in his first year at the Cowboy grid helm, will put together perhaps Central Oregon's largest team. The 'Pokes loom as a big question mark.

Madras, still new to the Class A-I wars, will be vastly improved over last year. Coach Frank Good's eleven will not be the doom that it was last year.

Mac-Hi plays the same role as the Jefferson County boys. The Milton - Freewater squad is new to Class A-I competition, but with one season under his belt, Coach Dick Bartlett has served notice that his squad will be "improved." Baker suffered from graduation, too, but the Bulldog squad will still be a tough bone to bury.

Crook County Fair sets horse deadline Aug. 24

PRINEVILLE — Owners of purebred horses, or horses skilled in racing or cow-handling, are reminded that the deadline for written entries to horse events in the 1963 Crook County Fair is 4:30 p.m. August 24. Entry blanks may be obtained at the fairgrounds or at the Chamber of Commerce office in downtown Prineville.

A large number of entries for horse events is expected from the tri-county area as interest in horses and horsemanship continues to grow in this region, according to Ivan Chappell, fair manager. Two new events will be included in the horse events, the cow-penning contest and the figure "8" stake race.

In the penning contest, a team of two riders must separate two cows from a herd and move the cows into a pen through an eight-foot opening, in four minutes. Prize is \$50 plus the entry fee. In addition to prize money, a number of buckles, trophies and plaques are being awarded in horse events, all of which are scheduled to take place on August 25, last day of the show.

Lava Bears to begin grid drills Monday

Prep football players in Central Oregon and the Intermountain Conference are about to don uniforms for the 1963 season.

Most high schools are issuing their team members grid togs this week. Some players have their uniforms already.

Coaches are completing the pre-going preparations, as everything gets down to hard work on Monday. Monday, August 26, is the first regular day of grid practice for prep elevens all over the state.

At Bend High School, juniors and seniors have their uniforms already. They were issued Wednesday. Today (Thursday), the sophomores will draw gear from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. They will take their uniforms from the high school dressing room. Friday will see the Lava Bear freshmen drawing equipment from 1 to 5. The frosh, however, will be issued gear at the junior high school dressing room.

This year, the freshmen at Bend High School will start practice the first day along with the JV's and the varsity. Bend Athletic Director Dick Gesser explained that since the Bend schools open a week later than other Central Oregon schools, the freshman team heretofore had been forced to start the season a week later than the others. Gesser pointed out this was causing a problem. Coaches and officials from other schools were finding it difficult to cooperate, because of the scheduling difficulty.

Bend thus decided that in order to be ready when the freshmen at the other schools are ready to play, the Bruin frosh would have to hold practice before school starts. This is the first time it has been done in Bend. Before, the freshmen started practice after school had begun.

Gesser pointed out that freshmen footballers need at least three weeks of practice before

they are in physical condition to play games.

Juniors and seniors at Bend will get their physicals tonight at 7 in the senior high school dressing room. Freshmen and sophomore Lava Bears received their physicals Tuesday night.

Bend kicked off the 1963 football program this Monday when 75 aspirants showed up for a pre-season information meeting.

Daily doubles are in store for the Bend varsity, when the Lava Bears commence drills Monday. Varsity gridgers will work out from 9 to 11 in the morning and from 3 to 5 in the afternoon. JV's and frosh will have workouts everyday, but they will not be daily doubles. Both squads will workout from 3:30 to 5 p.m. All grid teams will practice on the senior high field.
