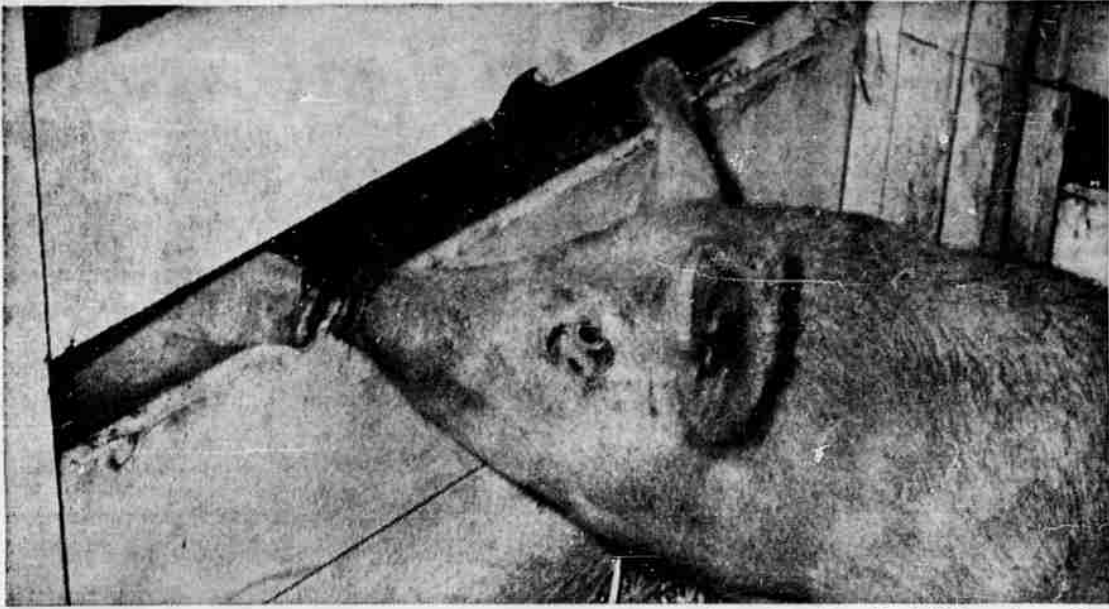

Official Fair start on Friday

PRINEVILLE — The 1963 Crook County Fair opens officially tomorrow at the flag-draped fairgrounds south of Prineville with hundreds of entries in place from the home economics building to the livestock pens.

Judging will have been completed by Friday morning, on all open class, 4-H and FFA exhibits in the various buildings, with the exception of the livestock, poultry and rabbits. Community and commercial exhibits also await judging.

Fairgoers this weekend will see several new and remodeled structures, including the large new building housing the show and sale ring for the Lions' Club fat stock show and sale Saturday at 6:30 p.m., and a canvas-covered section prepared to house some 50 head of cattle for the expected increase in livestock entries.

This year, for the first time, a milking area is being provided in the livestock side of the fairgrounds for the accommodation of the increasing number of dairy cattle entered. Noral Simmons, Powell Butte rancher, is loaning his milking machines, since, it was stated by fair officials, many dairy cows are unaccustomed to hand milking.

Another innovation in the fair program will be the beef judging in open class, to be held tomorrow evening in the sales pavilion at 8 p.m. This has formerly been done during the day, when farmers are less able to attend the event. The judging will be conducted in the new sales ring as the first livestock event ever to be held in the building.

Visitors to the fair will see entries from all parts of the tri-county area, since all open class competition is open to residents in Deschutes and Jefferson counties as well as Crook county.

Retirement set by librarian

SISTERS — Mrs. Grace Aitken, who has served as librarian at the Sisters branch of the Deschutes County Library for the past sixteen years, is retiring from the position.

Back in 1938, a group of civic minded women formed the Sisters Civic Club, deciding to promote a public library. The late Myrtle Dennis gave a deed to the lot on which the building was built in 1938. Members of the club solicited funds, material and labor and the library was established Jan. 13, 1939 as a branch of the Deschutes County Library.

Mrs. Alice Scott, and Mrs. Malda Bailey have been trustees through the years. When there was need for more room, Leonard Lundgren gave the library a small building in 1958, which was added to the original building. Again, funds, material and labor were contributed by many.

Mrs. Alice Scott was the first librarian and Mrs. Aitken was the sixth and has served since Oct. 1, 1947. Mrs. Aitken will retire on October 31. Mrs. William J. Grace has accepted the position.

No action on proposed sale

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Federal Trade Commission said today no action had been taken on the proposed sale of St. Helens Paper Co. by Crown Zellerbach to Boise Cascade Corp.

The FTC said study of the proposed sale had not been completed.

A report from San Francisco Wednesday said the St. Helens mill would be sold to Boise Cascade for \$30 million, minus some equipment and timber.

Crown acquired the mill in 1953, but was ordered to divest itself of the property under terms of federal anti-trust laws. The U.S. Supreme Court last year upheld the FTC divestiture order.

Skopje visited by Khrushchev

SKOPJE, Yugoslavia (UPI) — Yugoslav President Tito joined visiting Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in a trip to earthquake - devastated Skopje today after indicating their once bitterly feuding Communist nations have patched up their differences.

The two leaders flew here from Belgrade for four hours of surveying damage and greeting survivors of the July 26 earthquake that took about 2,000 lives.

At the same time, the official Tanjug news agency reported Tito said at a dinner with Khrushchev Wednesday night, "We have mutually arrived at the conclusion that many things which have divided us in the past have been mere trifles and that we are now faced with common interests and tasks."

Tito's speech seemed to write the end to the two-nation struggle that began in 1948 when the late Soviet dictator Josef Stalin expelled Yugoslavia from the Red movement for pursuing an independent brand of communism.

Wednesday at the same time, Khrushchev said political and economic relations are developing "very well" between Russia and Yugoslavia.

"During the course of the past few years, especially in recent times, the relations between the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia have been developing in the spirit of best mutual understanding and good cooperation on the government level," Tito said.

His remarks capped two days of Tito - Khrushchev talks and of speeches in which both leaders have hailed plans for economic collaboration between their nations. Both men also have trumpeted a new high in political cordiality.

Boy electrocuted near Stayton

STAYTON (UPI)—Thomas Aymong, 16, was electrocuted near here Wednesday afternoon when a 60-foot irrigation boom contacted a 12,000 volt electrical transmission line.

The victim was the son of Mrs. Betty Aymong. He also is survived by two brothers and two sisters.

The accident occurred at the Maurice Fery farm about a mile southwest of here at 4:30 p.m. It is still under investigation by authorities.

Trawler report is confirmed

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — The Navy confirmed Wednesday night that two Russian fishing trawlers have been operating on the edge of the Pacific missile range during test firings of missiles and satellite launches.

Capt. R. M. Hartmann, information officer of the 11th Naval District, said the trawlers were about 200 miles southwest of San Clemente island. He said the two 168-foot vessels carry electronic gear and could scan missile firings at Vandenberg Air Force Base and Point Mugu as well as Navy experimental activities on San Clemente.

They were typical fishing boats and appeared to be fishing," Hartmann said. "They had a lot of gear on them. I imagine that these have been doing what Russian trawlers off Cape Canaveral might be doing."

Hartmann said the vessels have been under Navy and Coast Guard surveillance for some time and their presence had not interfered with varied Navy training activities off Southern California.
