

Cards win only one in Dodger series

Instead of half a loaf, all that the Cardinals got were the crumbs. They won the third and final game of their series with the Dodgers, 3-2, Thursday night and it probably was more in the nature of a consolation victory than anything else.

The disappointed Cards, who lost the first two games of the showdown series, had the satisfaction of snapping the Dodgers' seven-game winning streak. That

was mighty small consolation considering that the Dodgers still lead the National League by 6½ games today.

What the sad situation amounts to for the Cardinals is this: They came into Los Angeles last Tuesday all hepped up about their pennant chances because they had taken three in a row from the Giants and were "only" 3½ games back. But they lost a full game — plus a precious opportunity — by the time they

left L.A.

Meet Once Again
The Cardinals have one more shot at the Dodgers when they meet them again in a three-game set in St. Louis starting Sept. 16 but by then it may be too late.

The Cards broke a 2-all tie Thursday night when Ken Boyer doubled in the sixth inning and came home with the winning run on Julian Javier's single. Ernie Broglio won his 14th

though he departed in favor of Ray Sadecki in the eighth. Don Drysdale suffered his 14th defeat against 16 victories.

Giants Beat Braves
In the only other NL games scheduled, the Giants snapped their five-game losing streak with an 8-6 victory over the Braves and the Pirates beat the Cubs 9-2.

Other in the American League, the Indians defeated the Yankees, 7-4, the Orioles downed the Angels, 5-1, the Red Sox whipped the White Sox, 11-2, and the Athletics topped the Senators, 6-2.

Owens to grid it despite accident

Alley-oop is back and ready to bounce even higher!

That would be flanker R. C. Owens, the springiest man in the National Football League, who checked into the Baltimore Colts training camp Thursday after nearly losing his life in an automobile accident in July.

Owens, who stands 6-3 and was an outstanding college basketball player, achieved his greatest fame and his nickname during his days with the San Francisco Forty Niners when he and quarterback N. A. Tittle originated the "Alley-oop" pass in which Tittle would throw the ball high in the air and Owens simply would outleap the defenders.

The only known player ever to block a field goal as it was clearing the crossbar, Owens did not suit up Thursday but appeared fit and ready with no trace of injuries.

In other NFL camps, San Francisco placed injured end Clyde Connor, an eight-year veteran, on waivers. . . . Linebacker John Reger will return to the Pittsburgh Steelers starting lineup for Saturday's clash with Baltimore at Atlanta after being sidelined a week with a knee injury. . . . The Los Angeles Rams sliced their roster to 44 players by placing five men on waivers — veterans Glenn Shaw and Duane Putnam and rookies Ken Chancellor, Doug Brown and Jerry Green-walt.

Plays Newcomers

Coach Allie Sherman of the New York Giants said he planned to use newcomers Nat Craddock, Charlie Killeit and Jim Pace as much as possible at the running back positions in Sunday's game with Minnesota, while the Vikings planned to use quarterback Fran Tarkenton for the entire 60 minutes of action. . . . Washington head man Bill McPeak intends to make wholesale use of rookies, sophomores and borderline cases in Saturday night's contest with the Philadelphia Eagles. . . . Both the Green Bay Packers and Cleveland Browns worked out in preparation for weekend clashes with the Chicago Bears and San Francisco, respectively.

In American League camps, Weeb Ewbank felt that the time of passes between the quarterbacks and ends was showing definite improvement after watching his New York Jets work out on Thursday. . . . The Oakland Raiders acquired defensive halfback Jim McMillan from the Denver Broncos for a draft choice. . . . And the Kansas City Chiefs went through a short 30-minute drill in preparation for tonight's encounter with Denver.

Rams arrive in Portland for another shot at Dallas

The Los Angeles Rams left Southern California for Portland and a weekend re-match with the Dallas Cowboys today four men lighter on their player roster.

The Rams reduced the squad to 44 Thursday with the release of four men from the active list. In addition, lineman Duane Put-

nam, who had not been in summer camp this season, was taken off the reserve list and released as a free agent.

Of the four actives dropped, fullback Glenn Shaw was the only veteran. He joined the Rams in the middle of last season after having been on taxi squads of the Chicago Bears and Minnesota Vikings. The other three put on waivers were rookies—Ken Chancellor, center from Houston; Doug Brown, tackle from Fresno State, and Jerry Greenwalt, end from Occidental College.

The Rams finished workouts Thursday for their Saturday night game with the Cowboys, who beat them 17-14 in a pre-season opener in Memorial Coliseum.

The Cowboys, meanwhile, ended heavy drills at Forest Grove in the rain. Head coach Tom Landry welcomed the moisture, saying it gave his team a chance to get used to a slippery ball. He ran the Texas club through its entire offense.

Don Perkins, an all-pro running back, rejoined the club after being sidelined with an injury, but rookie flanker Wendell Hayes was sent home for surgery after an old injury recurred.

Jefferson to say farewell to coach

PORTLAND (UPI)—Tom DeSylvia's pupils and other football notables will turn out tonight at a farewell banquet for the former Jefferson High School and Portland State College grid coach.

DeSylvia resigned at PSC earlier this year in a dispute with school officials. He is leaving the state to accept a job as an assistant coach at a San Mateo, Calif., high school.

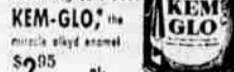
