

Warren Spahn provides more thrills in TV role

Versatile Warren Spahn played a Nazi soldier by day and his accustomed role at night and he killed the people with both performances.

The 42-year-old Milwaukee southpaw made his debut as a Hollywood actor Friday and then hurried out to the ball park to beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-1, and slice their National League lead to 5½ games.

The fun-loving Spahn said he wasn't sure which gave him the bigger kick.

When he showed up on the set to play a Nazi sergeant in ABC's television "Combat" series, he was given a submachine gun which he grasped with his left hand.

Told to carry the gun in his right hand, Spahn quipped: "I fire better with my left."

That was the hand he used to gain his 16th victory of the season and the 243rd of his career Friday night against the Dodgers. Spahn scattered nine hits, drove in one of the Braves' runs with a sacrifice fly in the sixth,

and scored another on Frank Bolling's single after doubling off reliever Larry Sherry in the ninth. Dead set on winning 20 games for the 13th time in his career, Spahn beat the Dodgers for the fourth time this year and was ahead from the first inning when Eddie Mathews hit his 19th homer with one on off 14-year-old Dick Calmus.

The Dodgers' only run off Spahn also came in the first when Tommy Davis singled home Maury Wills from second. The Cardinals took advantage

of the Dodgers' loss to gain a full game on them by beating the Colts, 4-1, while the Giants moved to within 6½ games of first place with an 11-3 win over the Reds. The Phillies defeated the Pirates, 4-2, and the Cubs edged the Mets, 6-5.

In the American League, the Yankees increased their lead to 11 games with a 7-2 decision over the White Sox, the Orioles swept a doubleheader from the Twins, 14-4 and 6-2. The Tigers also took two from the Athletics, 17-2 and 6-2, the Red Sox beat

the Indians, 3-2, in 13 innings and the Angels swamped the Senators, 17-0.

Bob Gibson won his 14th for the Cardinals with a five-hitter over the Colts. St. Louis scored all four of its runs off Dick Farrell (10-10) in the first inning, George Altman's two-run double being the big blow. Bill White had four of the Cards' eight hits.

Willie McCovey drove in three runs with three hits while Tom Haller and Chuck Hiller each homered as the Giants used a

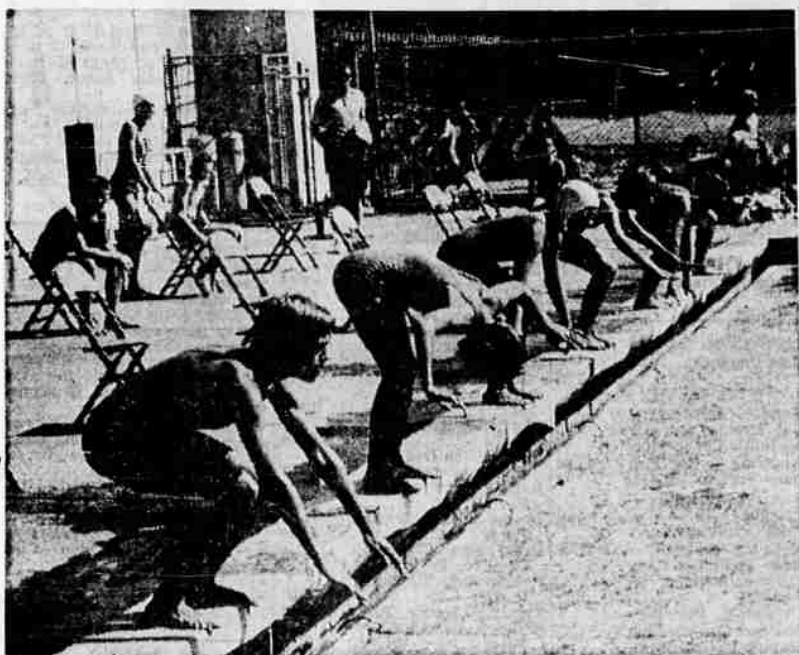
16-hit attack to knock over the Reds. Bob Bolin, who relieved starter Jack Sanford in the fourth, blanked the Reds the rest of the way for his eighth victory. Jim Maloney (18-6) suffered the loss.

Dennis Bennett picked up his seventh victory for the Phillies against only two defeats although screwballer Jack Baldschun had to throttle a Pirate threat in the seventh.

Wes Covington's 14th homer with one on off loser Don Schwall

in the third put the Phils ahead for good and they scored what proved to be the winning run in the fifth on an error by third baseman Bob Bailey. Jim Pagliaroni homered for Pittsburgh.

Billy Williams hit a pair of two-run homers, his 20th and 21st, and drove in five of the Cubs' runs in their victory over the Mets. Paul Toth, first of three Chicago pitchers, was credited with his fifth win in 13 decisions while Larry Bearnarth dropped his sixth decisions against two victories.

Top pro golfers will soon push boxers in money earning class

NEW YORK (UPI) — Top professional golfers like Arnold Palmer may soon be able to challenge even world heavyweight boxing champions for the title "biggest money earner in sports."

That's the expert opinion of Fred Corcoran, tournament director for the International Golf Association, who emphasizes that "by Sunday night at Akron, Ohio, Palmer doubtless will be the first golfer in history to win \$100,000 in prize money in a year."

Palmer, 33, and competing in the \$35,000 American Golf Classic at Akron, already has won \$96,935 in 17 tournaments this year and should wind up with at least \$125,000 by Dec. 31, says Corcoran.

Only one baseball player ever has reported to have received as much as \$125,000 in salary for a year. That was Ted Williams with the Boston Red Sox.

Part Of Earnings

However, it is extremely important to note that Palmer's prize money of \$125,000 will be only about one-fourth of his total earnings for 1963, some of his close friends point out. They estimate that his television money from a flock of exhibition matches and his income from various companies in which he is interested will exceed \$400,000 — giving him a total of more than a half-million dollars for the year.

In this connection, it is important to note that intimates of former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson estimate that Floyd's income from all sources averaged about \$500,000 a year during the seven years since he first became champion.

Corcoran pointed out that the rich sport of golf has provided other stars with big money this year: Jack Nicklaus, \$79,590; Julius Boros, \$69,596; Tony Lemna, \$62,513, and so on.

Corcoran, who spent his boyhood as a caddy near Belmont Spring outside Boston and who now lives in his own bungalow just off the 15th green of the Winged Foot Club at Mamaroneck, N.Y., said:

"Golf has become the most popular world-wide spectator-participant sport. In the United States alone we have nearly 7,000,000 golfers and probably 50,000,000 or more spectator enthusiasts, judging by the popularity of its television."

As an indication of the boom in Linkville, Fred emphasized that only this week "golf went under lights." On Wednesday night at Sewell, N.J., 40 players teed off at 10:30 p.m. and played over a specially lighted course.

He said the great Walter Hagen, now 70, was the first man to earn a million dollars through golf but it took him a lifetime. Stars of the future probably will be millionaires before they're 25, he predicted — not only in the United States but in many of the world's 34 other countries that are now members of the International Golf Association.

Johnny Pott making bid for first golf win

AKRON, Ohio (UPI) — Johnny Pott was making a strong bid today to win his first major golf tournament of the year, holding three strokes lead going into the third round of the American Golf Classic.

The 27-year-old pro, whose last victory was in the Waco Turner Open in May of 1962, was the only golfer able to break par on the long, narrow Firestone Country Club course for two days in a row.

His second round two under par 68, coupled with his first round 67, gave him a tournament record total of 135 at the halfway mark, three shots better than another 27-year-old pro, Bobby Nichols.

That total was five shots better than Jack Nicklaus, the Masters and PGA champion, and six shots in front of favored Arnold Palmer.

"I just hope I can keep it up," said Pott. "It's time I get back on the winning track."

Palmer Not Optimistic
Palmer wasn't at all optimistic about his chances of repeating. "I'm just not playing well," Palmer said. "I feel fine, but I'm off in my driving and as for my putting — well let's not talk about it."

Nicklaus, who won his biggest golf purse \$50,000 here a year ago in the World Series of Golf, was not happy either although he had shot two par 70 rounds.

"This course is just too tough for me," he complained. He admitted that his driving was making it tougher for Friday he missed seven fairways.

But neither Pott nor Nichols was complaining. Pott started out with three birdies on the first five holes — two of them on putts of 60 and 55 feet — and had only one bogey, driving the rough on the long par five, 625-yard 18th.

"I was extremely lucky. I guess," Pott smiled. "The difference was the putts I made — especially those two long ones. I'd like to chop up some of those 60 and 55 footers."

Nichols Earns Bonus
Nichols, who two under par 67 was the best second round score and earned him \$500 in bonus money, also wielded a hot putter. He had 10 one putt greens and needed only 26 putts in all.

Four strokes off the pace going into today's televised play were Miller Barber, Bruce Crampton and Dave Hill, all at 139. At 140 with Nicklaus came Open champion Julius Boros, Dave Marr and Gay Brewer.

Palmer was all alone at 141 while there were 11 tied at 142, seven strokes off Pott's lead.

Kathy Whitworth gets attention in Utah golf go

OGDEN, UTAH (UPI) — Fearless Kathy Whitworth, the talented gal from Jal, N. M., commanded most of the attention today in the second round of the Utah Ladies Professional Golf Association Tournament.

Miss Whitworth, a small town girl finally making good in the competitive business of professional golf, carried a three stroke lead into the second round of the event being played over the neat Ogden Golf and Country Club course.

Confident Kathy, a 23-year-old hazel-eyed brunette, shot a sizzling five under par 68 Friday to take the lead. She outscored pre-tourney favorite Mickey Wright of Dallas, Tex., by three strokes to set the stage for a showdown between the two long hitting stars.

Riding a succession of birdies, Miss Whitworth put together rounds of 33 and 33 to set the pace in the 34-hole \$5,500 event which ends Sunday.

A native Texan who moved to the small New Mexico town as a youngster, power-stroking Kathy

credits Miss Wright for some of her success. "I learn a lot just watching Mickey," she said.

Commenting on her opening round Miss Whitworth said "every phase of my game seemed to work good and I was hitting the ball well." It was very evident she was hitting the ball well. Her round included eight birdies, seven pars and only three bogeys. She had a string of four birdies on the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th holes.

The New Mexico golfer said, "I had no fear of the greens because the course was in such great shape."

Her performance overshadowed that of Miss Wright who had a respectable two under par 71, including a double eagle. Mickey's double eagle came on the 605 yard, par 5 15th hole.

After a booming drive off the tee, Miss Wright used a five iron and sent the ball approximately 220 yards into the cup. The shot triggered a roar of approval heard over the entire course.

The blonde Texan soared to 39 over the front nine and came back with a 35—the best nine hole effort of the day.

Area lake, stream fishing rated better this weekend

PORTLAND — Fishing this weekend in Central Oregon should be improved, or at least that's what a report from the Oregon State Game Commission said this week.

Generally speaking the fishing in the Cascade Lakes and in area streams will be fair or better. The report read as follows.

Prineville Reservoir is showing some improvement for trout on deep troll. Catfish angling is improving on Bear Creek arm and at the upper end of the reservoir. Ochoco Reservoir and Walton Lake are slow. Pelton Reservoir is fair. The Crooked River below Prineville continues to provide fair to good evening fly-fishing. Good catches of kokanee continue to be taken by bait anglers at Elk Lake. Evening fishing with blue upright or royal coachman flies is producing good catches of rainbow at Three Creeks Lake. Bait fishing with worms has also produced good catches.

At Wickiup Reservoir, kokanee and brown trout are being taken in the river channels. East Lake has been good for rainbow trolling with a spinner and worm. Paulina Lake trolling and still-fishing has been fair. Late evening fly fishing has produced good catches. South Twin Lake is improving for rainbow with several good catches being taken by still-fishermen. At Davis Lake a few limit catches of rainbow, up to five pounds, are being taken in the Odell Creek channel and west shore. Large rainbow and Atlantic salmon are offering a challenge to fly fishermen.

Blue Lake angling is fair for rainbow using bait. The Lake of the Woods is fair for kokanee and poor for rainbow. Klamath Lake is still producing a few large rainbow and a number of small fish. Agency Lake is fair to good trolling near the mouth of Wood River. Williamson Lake is fair for rainbows from 12 to 14 inches using flies. Wood River is good for rainbows and fair for brown trout. Crescent Lake is improving for kokanee and angling should be fair. Odell Lake is good for kokanee and lake trout.

Horse events at Fair Sunday

PRINEVILLE — Horse events will fill the schedule tomorrow at the Crook county fairgrounds. The judging of the open class horse show and the halter class will begin at 9:15 a.m. at the fairgrounds.

Horse races and working events, to be held in the rodeo arena adjacent to the fairgrounds will start at 1:15 p.m. and are expected to draw good crowds.

In the open class competition, seven divisions are listed this year, with Raymond Guthrie as superintendent. Shown will be quarter horses, Arabians, Thoroughbreds, Appaloosas, unregistered light breeds, Tennessee Walkers and Shetland ponies, both registered and unregistered.

In the afternoon's horse events, spectators will be entertained with a cow hide race in which a team riding double races to one end of the field, the extra rider dismounts, and rides the dragged cowhide back to the starting line. This is a junior event.

Saddle horse races and a pony express race are also scheduled.

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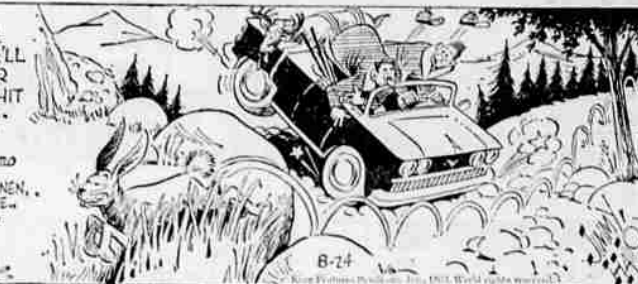

Green Bay fans to see Packers at Milwaukee

The world champion Green Bay Packers make their first showing of 1963 before the homefolks Saturday night when they take on the Chicago Bears before a sellout crowd of more than 40,000 in a pre-season game at Milwaukee.

In all, there are five National Football League exhibition games on Saturday's schedule and one in the American Football League.

The Dallas Cowboys meet the Los Angeles Rams at Portland, Ore.; the Detroit Lions play the St. Louis Cardinals at Omaha, Neb.; the Philadelphia Eagles take on the Washington Redskins at Charlotte, N. C., and the Pittsburgh Steelers face the Baltimore Colts at Atlanta.

In the AFL, the Buffalo Bills entertain the Boston Patriots at Buffalo, N.Y.

The Kansas City Chiefs, helped by a 104-yard kickoff return by Charley Warner, defeated the Denver Broncos, 30-16, in Friday night's only pre-season game.

Denver led the defending AFL champs, 10-7, at halftime on the margin of Gene Mingo's 17-yard field goal. The Chiefs went ahead in the third period on Eddie Wilson's 32-yard scoring pass to rookie Stone Johnson, a former U.S. Olympic sprinter.

A safety, Len Dawson's five-yard TD pass to Fred Arbanas, and Jack Spike's touchdown plunge clinched the game for Kansas City with a 16-point final quarter. A slim crowd of 6,865 watched the game at Kansas City.

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Rams play Dallas in Portland

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Los Angeles Rams and the Dallas Cowboys meet tonight in Portland's second and final National Football League exhibition game of the year.

A crowd of 28,000 persons is expected for the contest at Multnomah Stadium here. Game time is 8:30 p.m.

Terry Baker, Oregon State's Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback of last season, and Don Meredith are scheduled to guide the offenses for the Rams and the Cowboys in their third noncounting game of the campaign.

Dallas has rolled up two wins including a 17-14 victory over Los Angeles, which has an 0-2 record.

Also scheduled to start for the Rams on offense are Jim Phillips and Dick Bass at halfbacks, Art Perkins at fullback, Pervis Atkins and Carroll Dale at ends, Joe Carroll and Frank Varriehou at tackles, Charles Cowan and Joe Seibell at guards and Larry Hayes at center.
