Ranch home hit by fire on Saturday

PRINEVILLE — The ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Creston Close, some ten miles northwest of Prineville near the Madras highway, was burned to the ground Saturday afternoon. The building was built some 50 years ago, it was estimated, and burned rapidly.

The fire was believed to have been started in the wiring of the house. Close, at home at the time, said he was not aware of the onset of the fire until after he heard the crackling of flames in another part of the house.

Only a few articles of furniture and clothing were salvaged. The city of Prineville fire department found the entire structure ablaze when volunteer firemen arrived, and were unable to do more than control any spreading of grass fires to surrounding areas.

The loss was only partially covered by insurance, it was stated. An invitation to give needed household articles and clothing for the family was broadcast Sunday over station KRCC, with donors asked to leave articles at the Prineville Credit Bureau or telephone that office if larger articles of furniture were to be offered.

The Closes have three children, two boys, aged 17 and eight and an 11-year-old daughter. They are staying temporarily with relatives in Prineville.

5-day forecast calls for more of same in area

The five-day forecast for interior Oregon calls for more of the same: "Temperatures averaging below normal." Also, there is a chance of a few showers, especially in the northeastern part of the state.

The local forecast calls for fair weather through Tuesday, except for some clouds and a chance of showers this evening. Lows tonight, the forecast adds, will be in the 46-45 range and highs Tuesday, from 77 to 82.

Bend's temperature again dropped to near freezing last night. The official low was 34 degrees, apparently the coolest mark reported from any part of the nation.

Spots of white frost were visible around town about sunrise. Low temperature in Bend for the past eight consecutive nights have been in the 30-degree plus range.

Quake just missed by C. C. Kirtsis

A Bend man, C. C. Kirtsis, might have been a casualty in the devastating earthquake that took a heavy toll of lives in Yugoslavia on July 24, if he hadn't changed his mind and his schedule.

On a trip to his old home in Macedonia, Kirtsis had planned to visit the Skopje area and stay at the Macedonia Hotel, but changed his itinerary to go to Venezia. While in Italy he learned of the earthquake. Tumbled into wreckage, with many killed, was the Macedonia Hotel in Skopje.

Kirtsis, former owner of the Bend and Riverside Motels in Bend, and a resident of the community since 1920, left on May for a visit with relatives in Macedonia, and returned to his home here this past week. This was his second trip to his old homeland since coming to America. The earlier visit was in 1950.

Kirtsis visited many of the big cities in southern Europe on his present trip, and found that tourists have "discovered" even his old home country. He was surprised by the spread of the use of English in southern Europe since his last visit there.
