Goldwater says he'll decide next January if he will be candidate for '64 GOP nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater said today he will decide by January if he will be a candidate for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

The Arizona Republican said "I'm playing this thing by ear day by day. I wouldn't want to say 'yes' or 'no' now, because I think it's much too early."

Now considered along with New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller as a leading candidate for the nomination, Goldwater said he would not run for the Senate if he decided to seek the presidential candidacy.

Graham raps end of worlders

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham Sunday hit at those who preach the coming of "the end of the world," but warned that "many world leaders today are aware that we are on the brink of a world catastrophe and impending judgment."

"There is a growing universal awareness that as a society we have our backs to the wall with a storm about to break in all its fury," he told 40,630 persons at Memorial Coliseum. It was the ninth meeting of the current crusade which ends Sept. 8.

"There is still a future, but it will be God's kind of future," he said. "We need not lose faith, but we must transfer our faith from man and his progress to God and his purpose."

"Up until 1914 we dreamed of an early millennium. Just as we thought that the race had reached the age of maturity and self-sufficiency, the world was plunged into a series of wars, with each successive one becoming more costly and more deadly than the one before it."

"Our dream world came crumbling down around us. Death, crime, depression, strife, lawlessness, immorality and disillusionment unprecedented came in all their wild fury to lessen our hope and increase our fears."



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'Rights' rally falls far short of expectations

A civil rights rally at New York's Polo Grounds flopped Sunday, but Negroes opened a small crack in one of the Deep South's more formidable racial barriers.

Negroes attended religious services at two white churches at Plaquemine, La., but were turned away at two others. Plaquemine has been the scene of numerous racial arrests.

Only 2,002 persons paid \$2 each to get into the New York baseball park which seats about 50,000. A crowd of about 30,000 had been expected to attend the rally to raise funds and stir up enthusiasm for Wednesday's civil rights march on Washington.

Sponsors, who invested \$40,000 to stage the rally, said it was "a tremendous loss." Most of the principal speakers scheduled to address the rally failed to appear.

About 50 Negroes staged a singing march at High Point, N. C., in a continuing protest against the town segregation policies. Fifteen demonstrators were arrested while picketing a High Point theater Saturday night.

Racial developments elsewhere in the nation during the weekend:

Nashville, Tenn. The head of the Roman Catholic Church in Tennessee urged church members to do away with racial discrimination by meeting with Negroes and talking "openly and calmly about our mutual hopes and problems."

Atlanta The Georgia Federation of Young Republicans condemned the planned Negro mass march on Washington as "unwise and detrimental to the nation's interest."

Brunswick, Ga. Glynn County School Superintendent R. E. Hood said 17 Negroes have applied for transfer from a local Negro high school to the formerly all-white Glynn Academy here.

Young GOP head asked to resign from Birchers

SEATTLE (UPI) — The Board of Directors of the Washington State Federation of Young Republicans requested Saturday that Don Runner of Spokane, president of the organization, resign from the John Birch Society.

After Saturday's meeting here, Runner said he did not plan to resign from the society at this time. Asked if he intended to quit the society later, Runner replied, "I'll decide that when the time comes."

The request that Runner quit the Birch Society came in the form of a resolution adopted by the board of directors and announced at the end of the Young Republicans' 12-hour closed meeting in Seattle Saturday night.

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Argument ends in death of Portland man

PORTLAND (UPI) — Fred S. Parker, 33, of Portland was shot to death at his home early today after an argument with a fishing partner.

Arthur Roy Brazier, 38, Fairfield, was arrested a few minutes later as he waited in his pickup truck in front of the Parker residence. He was charged with first degree murder.

Police said they were told the men returned to Brazier's home Sunday after a fishing trip. An argument ensued and a fist fight started. Parker, his wife, Mrs. Brazier and her three sons left and went to Parker's home.

They said Brazier showed up a few hours later with a rifle and fired a single shot at Parker. Police recovered the weapon.

Nikita, Tito go into seclusion

PULA, Yugoslavia (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev and President Tito met today in the seclusion of the latter's Brioni Island retreat to thresh out problems affecting Yugoslavia's relations with the rest of the Communist world.

Questions believed to rank high among the matters they discussed were the expansion of Yugoslav trade with the Moscow-bloc nations and the adoption of a common stand against Red China's brand of communism.

Khrushchev, about halfway through a 15-day "working vacation" in Yugoslavia, arrived Sunday at Brioni aboard Tito's luxurious yacht Sengul.

He came to the hilly, green island from a triumphal tour of southwestern Yugoslavia following Belgrade talks that apparently restored Yugoslav-Soviet friendship after a 15-year estrangement.

Tito had been feuding with Moscow since the late Josef Stalin expelled him from the world Communist movement in 1948 for leading Yugoslavia down a Communist road independent of Moscow.

The Belgrade talks apparently healed the breach, although Yugoslavia formally continues "neutrality." The Brioni talks were expected to produce ways of implementing the re-established friendship.

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'Father' of Jeep dies from pill overdose

DAYTON, Ohio (UPI) — Karl K. Probst, 79, the man who once built a car that didn't run but later became the father of World War II's Jeep, died Sunday at his home after apparently taking an overdose of sleeping pills.

Probst had been ill for several weeks.

Probst was born in West Columbia, W. Va., and moved to Columbus when he was 8 years old. He also lived in Toledo, Lansing and Detroit.

He had remained active in the automotive field in recent years and had just completed a design for an improved Jeep seat. At the time of his death Probst was working on a design for a two-cycle automobile engine.

In 1940 he was asked to design a small military personnel carrier that would be better than the Germans had. As a consulting engineer for the Bantam Car Co. of Butler, Pa., he drew the plans for the Jeep in seven days.

In 1944, after a dispute between the Willis Overland and the Ford Motor Co. concerning the development of the Jeep, the Federal Trade Commission proclaimed Probst the "father" of the vehicle.

The West Virginia native was a 1906 graduate of the Ohio State University. At the age of 12, he and his great uncle built a car that did not run, and later a bicycle that blew up. As a high school student at Columbus, Ohio, he built one of the four cars in the city in 1901.

In 1932 Probst formed his own consulting firm. He lived much of his life in Detroit, and was a design consultant to Chalmers, Dodge, Chrysler, Reo, Kaiser and other motor car companies. He gained a reputation as a strong advocate of light cars.

De Gaulle adds large sum to military budget

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle was reported today to have added \$200 million to next year's military budget to speed development of France's independent nuclear force.

Financial circles said the extra \$200 million is designed to bring nearer the day when France will be a full-fledged nuclear power.

The "first element" of the French nuclear striking force is due to be operational by the year's end at the latest. At that time, the first Mirage IV light bombers are supposed to be ready to carry 60-kiloton atomic bombs—three times as powerful as the Hiroshima bomb.
