WASHINGTON (UPI)—Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall made clear Monday the United States will insist that Japan continue to abstain from fishing in certain parts of the Pacific Ocean when fisheries talks with Canada and Japan resume next month.

Canadian negotiators are expected to adopt the same line at the Tokyo meeting.

Udall told a news conference the United States feels "very strongly" that the controversial "abstention principle" in the central part of the 10-year-old international North Pacific Fisheries Convention linking the three nations.

Under the abstention principle, Japan agreed not to fish for certain species in some areas of the eastern North Pacific Ocean so long as the stocks were being fully utilized by U.S. and Canadian fishermen. Chief species affected are halibut, salmon and herring.

The conservation treaty expires this year and is open for renewal. At a two-week conference in Washington in June, Japan called the abstention principle irrational.

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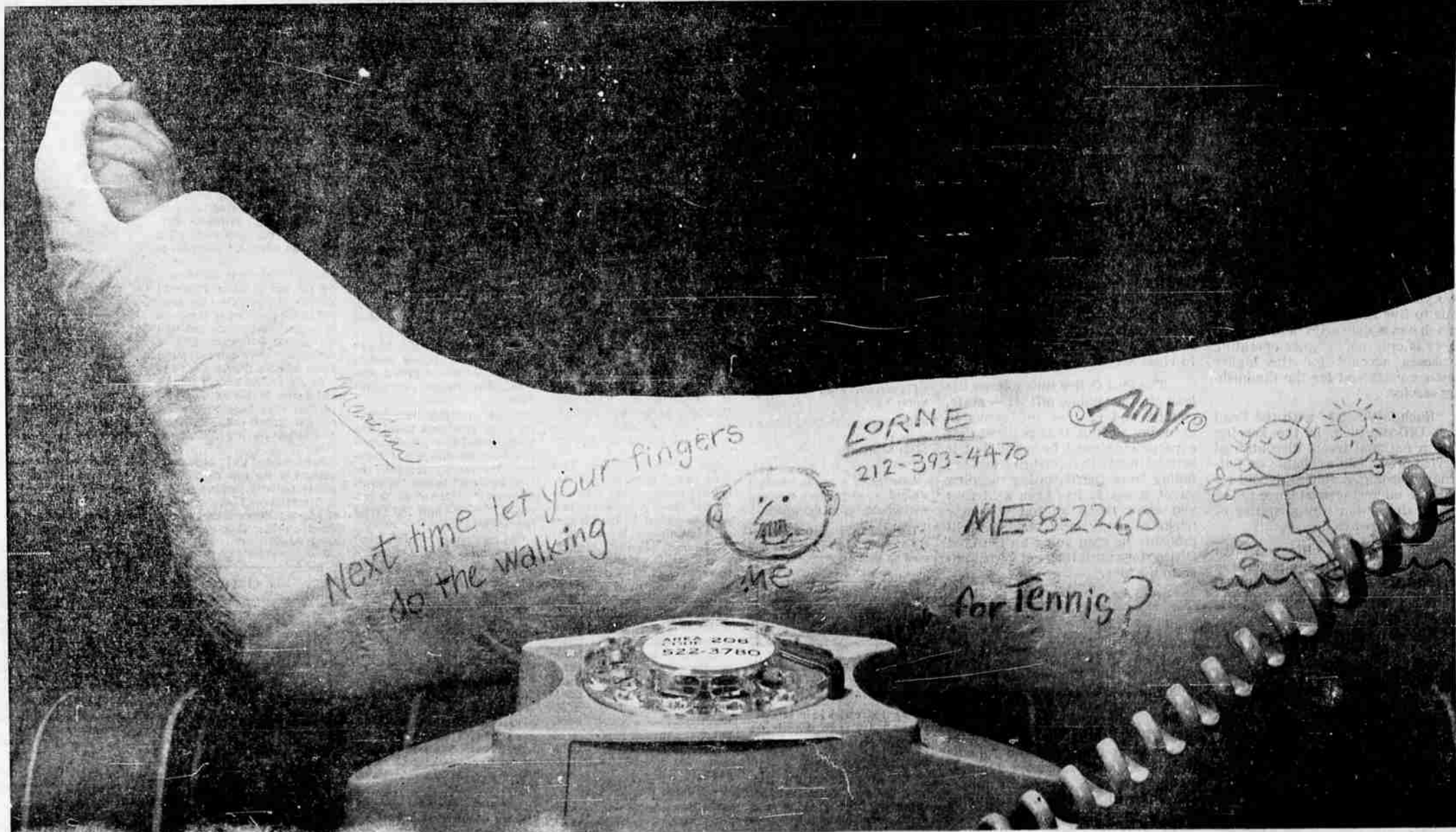
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
