

House members at work on rights package

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Eleven House members were at work today writing civil rights legislation that would help meet demands of thousands of integrationists marching a few blocks away.

The final decision of a House judiciary subcommittee is likely to be a week or more in the making. But the veteran congressman who heads the group believes President Kennedy's civil rights proposal would safely clear the first hurdle.

The prediction came from Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., of a House judiciary subcommittee that has been considering the administration bill in closed sessions since Aug. 14. Celler told reporters that he expected the Kennedy bill to be practically intact.

Other congressional news: **Shelters:** Civil defense advocates won an important victory Tuesday when the House Armed Services Committee voted to spend more than \$190 million on a fallout shelter program. The measure would allow the federal government to provide 11 million spaces stocked with food and emergency supplies at a cost of \$190.6 million to be used during the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1964.

Director named for laboratory

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Curtis M. Everts Jr. will be director of the planned Pacific Northwest Water Laboratory at Oregon State University here.

The appointment was announced by Gordon E. McCallum, chief of the water supply and pollution control division for the U.S. Public Health Service.

Everts has been in charge of the sanitation and engineering division of the Oregon Board of Health since 1941.

Construction on the laboratory, which will have a 150-member staff, has not started. The facility is expected to be ready for use in 1965.

ACQUISITION BEGINS

PORTLAND (UPI)—The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has begun acquisition of land for the Foster Reservoir damsite area on the South Santiam River 30 miles southeast of Albany, Engineers' office here said today.

The dam will be a rock-fill embankment 3,500 feet long. Its power plant will have a capacity of 20,000 kilowatts. Estimated cost is \$28,200,000.



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Surfacing work well under way at Sisters

SISTERS — The work of surfacing the streets in Sisters is well under way, with a prime or binder shot of oil sprayed on and covered with rock on Monday and Tuesday. By Wednesday, if the weather is warm enough, the contractor will proceed with the next shot of oil. Residents are warned that they should move their cars to a safe distance from the edge of the street, to a garage, alley or vacant lot, to avoid having oil specks damage the surface. The primer shot has relatively little smoke compared to the later shots of oil which are sprayed on at a much higher temperature.

Foreign Relations Committee huddles with Rusk

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee arranged a closed session with Secretary of State Dean Rusk today before getting down to actual consideration of the nuclear test ban treaty.

Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., said the meeting was called to let members discuss with Rusk any points they wanted to clear up following two weeks of sometimes conflicting public testimony which ended Tuesday.

But Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, the top GOP member, served notice he would seek to have secret correspondence leading up to the actual treaty made available to the committee for study. Hickenlooper wrote each committee member in advance of his plans.

"The Senate has just as much a role in the treaty-making process as the President," Hickenlooper told reporters. "He can't

ratify a treaty without the Senate."

Therefore, he contended, the committee should have a look at correspondence that led up to final negotiations for the Three-Power pact which bans nuclear tests in the atmosphere, outer space or underwater.

Treaty supporters hoped to meet through language in the committee's report the request by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower for a reservation to the pact spelling out the clear U.S. right to use any weapons to repel aggression.

The Senate cannot change the treaty's language. A reservation—which it can add—might complicate the final ratification by other signers.

Route extension denied bus line

SALEM (UPI)—The state public utility commissioner today denied Pacific Trailways application for route extensions involving segments between Eugene and Corvallis, and Corvallis and Albany.

Commissioner Jonel C. Hill said there was no proof of a demand for the service which "to a considerable degree is an in between or on top service of that presently available from Western Greyhound Lines."

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
