

### New facilities to be ready for start of school

PRINEVILLE — Completing touches were being put on new class rooms and facilities at the Prineville Junior High School this week, in preparation for the opening of schools in Crook county, September 3. Equipment was also being moved in.

The junior high school has been undergoing expansion and remodeling throughout the summer in preparation for the ninth grade which is to be combined this year for the first time in the junior high building with the seventh and eighth grades.

Included in the expansion of the building south of Prineville are four special rooms, two for science, one for shop and one for home economics, and two general classrooms. Junior high school students will continue to eat lunches at the high school cafeteria about a block distant from the junior high building.

A spokesman for the county superintendent's office reported that one teacher vacancy remains, that of Latin and Spanish, at Crook county high school.

This week teachers are on the job, a week before school children return, beginning the week with three days of in-service training. Thursday and Friday are to be spent at the various schools, preparing the rooms for classes and holding departmental meetings, mostly the same as last year is expected when school opens.

### Teacher group to give up Monday holiday

A group of Bend teachers assigned to honors or advanced placement classes during this school year will give up their Labor Day holiday to attend a special in-service meeting. The meeting will be held at Bend Junior High starting at 9 a.m. and continuing through to 3:30 p.m.

As a special treat a picnic lunch will be served at noon by members of the Special Education staff.

Resource person for the meeting will be Dr. Leon Lessinger, assistant superintendent of Grossmont Union High School District, Grossmont, Calif. For the last two summers Dr. Lessinger has conducted workshops on the education of gifted children at the University of Oregon and at Southern Oregon College at Ashland.

He was research director for a state-wide study on education of gifted children for the state of California which resulted in legislation for the program.

### Delegates turn to resolutions

SEATTLE (UPI)—With the annual military parade over, delegates to the 64th annual convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars today turned to resolutions on civil right and religious matters.

A civil rights resolution adopted Tuesday by two committees called for full freedom and opportunity for all citizens, but cautioned members against being involved in actions "which might be construed as being contrary to American ideals."

Edward Papantonio, a New York city lawyer who is chairman of the VFW's Americanism committee, said the resolution was aimed in part at civil rights demonstrations such as have occurred in his home city.

A resolution concerned with "Faith in God" also was adopted by committees. It is a combination of two earlier resolutions, one of which supported amending the U.S. constitution to allow Bible reading in public schools and one which would have opposed court action brought by the American Civil Liberties Union to have the words "Under God" deleted from the pledge of allegiance.

### Man's widow takes stand

THE DALLES (UPI)—The widow of a man who was shot to death last April testified Tuesday she fled from him to the garage of Dolphus Baker, who is on trial for second degree murder.

Baker, 53, is charged in the shooting death of Richard Bisig, 31, at Rufus 39 miles east of here.

Bisig's widow, Janice, 22, was the state's first witness. She said her husband, who had been gone three weeks on a court order, arrived back to try to persuade her to return to him. She said her glasses were broken and she received a black eye.

Mrs. Bisig said she left on the pretext of telling a babysitter she need not come that night and that her husband kept her son, Brian, 2. She said she drove to the home of a deputy sheriff who was gone, so went to Baker's garage.

### Judge blocks first voluntary school desegregation in Georgia

A federal judge, citing racial tension, Tuesday blocked the first voluntary school desegregation in the Deep South state of Georgia.

The ruling, which stopped the enrollment of six Negroes at a Brunswick, Ga., high school, was handed down while Negroes from throughout the nation traveled to Washington for today's historic freedom march on the nation's capital.

Although the Brunswick integration was blocked, the school board at nearby Savannah, Ga., announced Tuesday that 21 Negroes will be admitted to two white high schools.

The Savannah board acted under an order of the same judge who halted the Brunswick desegregation.

At Buras, La., Archbishop John P. Cody called for citizens to overthrow "hateful influences" which he blamed for an explosion and fire at a once-integrated Catholic school.

The bishop Tuesday closed Our Lady of Good Harbor No. 2 School after a gasoline blast and fire ripped the building Monday night.

Racial developments elsewhere in the nation:

**Ocala, Fla.:** Thirty-one Negroes were to be arraigned in county court here today on charges stemming from recent racial demonstrations.

**Montgomery, Ala.:** Suit was filed in federal court here Tuesday by a Negro student seeking entrance to Auburn University Graduate School. Harold A. Franklin, a 1962 graduate of Alabama State College, named William V. Parker, dean of the school, and Charles W. Edwards, university registrar, as defendants.

**Birmingham, Ala.:** A school board spokesman said Gov. George Wallace has promised not to interfere with desegregation of Birmingham schools next Wednesday.

### WIN DAMAGES SUIT

**ROME (UPI) —** A Rome hotel was ordered Tuesday to pay damages to singer Abbe Lane and her husband, orchestra leader Xavier Cugat, as the result of a 1957 accident.

Miss Lane told a court that as she opened a hotel window a plank of wood fell from the venetian blind rigging and injured her face. The court decided damages would be settled at a later hearing.

**Jacksonville, Fla.:** Duval County school officials said Tuesday that several previously segregated schools here will be opened to Negroes Sept. 3.

**Sevierville, Tenn.:** Sevier County High School began its first year of desegregation Tuesday when seven Negro students attended classes. There were no incidents reported.

**Greensboro, N. C.:** A Guilford County Superior Court jury convicted five Negro demonstrators Tuesday of obstructing a street, but defense attorneys served immediate notice of appeal.

**Atlanta:** Pickets marched in front of three local liquor stores Tuesday carrying signs protesting job discrimination against Negroes by the firms. The pickets, six Negroes and one white, were dispatched by the Ghandi Youth Council.

**Orangeburg, S. C.:** About 25 young Negroes continued picketing Main Street merchants Tuesday in protest against segregation policies.
