Warner has met skiers from all over the world in his Olympic sojourns. Among them is an old friend of mine, Rudi Mueller, a German alpine star.

Mueller is even older than Warner, but has the competitive spirit of a fresh rookie. He loves skiing. As a matter of fact, every chance he gets he spends a day on skis. I ran across him when he and myself found ourselves in the same U.S. Army Military Intelligence unit.

Mueller was one of those Germans that got into the American army, but never picked up U.S. citizenship. Mueller has been a U.S. Army ski coach, and spent much of his time away from the unit teaching U.S. soldiers in alpine maneuvers.

When his second hitch was up, he decided to remain in Germany... approximately in the same area where he was stationed. It seems (I'm not sure) he was born and raised in the same general area.

In the 1964 Olympics, Mueller will probably be competing for the Germans. A fine fellow and a real fan of the United States, Mueller has made it a point of being friends with most of the American alpine Olympians.

Rodeo show in Paulina for weekend

PRINEVILLE — A rodeo that is generally known in Crook County as the "biggest little rodeo around" will go into the chutes at Paulina August 31 to highlight the Labor Day weekend.

For the past 13 years, an amateur rodeo has climaxed the summer season for ranchers of the Paulina area and for many others from Prineville and other Central Oregon points.

The rodeo will begin at about 1 p.m., but visitors are urged to arrive early for good locations on the unusual "car - bleachers" developed by the Paulina Rodeo Association.

A special feature of the Paulina rodeo this year is a "pig race," when cowboys will be expected to select a small pig at one end of the arena and carry it, on horseback, to the other end of the arena. Other special features are also planned in addition to the riding and roping which has provided some spectacular entertainment for rodeo fans in the past.

A lunch stand and a refreshment stand will be managed by women of the Paulina area, adjacent to the grounds.

To end the day's program, there will be a rodeo dance at the Paulina hall, and a supper will be served.

Reserve grand champion was shown by Ed Bales, Prineville, who also entered the champion mare. Reserve champion mare was shown by Elzie Lara, Bend, and the reserve stallion was shown by Cliff Williams, Redmond.

In the quarter horse competition, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Smith received a first for a mare with colt entry and Yvonne Rickard took a first place in mares over three years old.

A stallion entered by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Moore, Prineville, took grand champion of breed among the handsome Arabians at the show. Mr. and Mrs. Bob Lilienthal, Bend, showed the reserve grand champion. The Lilienthals also showed the champion mare

with the Moores showing the reserve champion mare, and the champion Arabian stallion. The reserve champion stallion was shown by Hudson Arabians, Redmond.

In the Appaloosa breed, now growing in popularity, the grand champion of breed and the champion and reserve champion mares were shown by Delbert Beal, Prineville. Clarence and Mary O'Leary, Bend, showed the reserve champion stallion, with Ben Grant's stallion taking reserve grand champion and champion stallion.

Unregistered light breeds were also shown. Among these, the grand champion and the champion gelding were shown by Frank McCullough, Post, Cole Station, Prineville, showed the reserve grand champion and the champion mare.

Walston, Shaw join 'army of unemployed' this week

Bobby Walston and George Shaw, two former stars who were attempting comeback careers, today joined pro football's growing "army of the unemployed."

Walston, 34, the second highest scorer in National League history, asked for and received his release from the Boston Patriots of the American League.

Shaw, considered over the hill as a pro quarterback at the age of 30, was placed on the waiver list by the Denver Broncos of the AFL.

Walston retired last year after a brilliant 12-year career with the Philadelphia Eagles during which he served as a standout passer, field goal kicker and point-after specialist. He reconsidered in June and was signed as a free agent by the Patriots.

This time, though, Walston is planning to retire for good. "If I thought I could help the Patriots, I would play the season," he said. "But the way the team shapes up now I wouldn't figure prominently in their plans."

With Three Teams
Shaw played with three NFL teams—the Baltimore Colts, the New York Giants and the Minnesota Vikings—before joining the Broncos last year. The former Oregon star enjoyed a great rookie year with the Colts in 1955 and later wound up playing second-fiddle behind Johnny Unitas.

He was traded to the Giants in 1959 and again served as an understudy—this time to Charley Conerly. After two seasons at New York, Shaw moved on to Minnesota and thence to Denver, where he was the No. 2 man behind Frank Tripucka, another former NFL signal caller.

The Giants reduced their squad to 42 men Wednesday by releasing comebackers Charlie Janerette and offensive end Jim Collier. Collier scored the Giants' only touchdown in last season's 16-7 playoff defeat at the hands of the Green Bay Packers when he recovered a blocked kick in the end zone.

Takes Medical Tests

Bobby Mitchell, the Washington Redskins' star pass-catcher, underwent medical tests to determine the origin of persistent arm and leg pains. The Pittsburgh Steelers pulled out of their training camp at West Liberty, W.Va., four days ahead of schedule because of a water shortage. Elijah Pitts, the Packers' kickoff and punt return specialist, took part in his first extended work-out since recovering from a shoulder injury. The New York Jets hope to have their injured trio of halfback Dick Christy, center Mike Hudock and safetyman Billy Atkins ready for Sunday's exhibition against the Patriots.

'Whiz Kids' successors may cause Dodgers grief

Remember the Whiz Kids? They're gone now although their successors could cause the Dodgers the same grief they suffered in 1950.

That was the year the fighting Philadelphia Phillies finally untracked themselves right at the wire to overcome the Dodgers and win the National League pennant by two games.

It could happen again and the hepped-up Phils, who have finished in the second division the last seven years, actually believe they can win.

"My ball players won't fall over in a dead shock if they come on to win," says manager Gene Mauch. "They honestly feel the equal of any club in this league."

The Phillies certainly are entitled to feel that way with 12 victories in their last 15 games, a record that has moved them within a half-game of third place and within seven games of the faltering first-place Dodgers.

The Phils unloosed a hailstorm of home runs in beating the Cubs, 8-7, Wednesday with Ryne Duren tossing in an eye-popping relief job for good measure.

Wes Covington's first-inning homer off loser Paul Toth actually put Philadelphia in front for keeps and Clay Dalrymple and Johnny Callison also reached the seats later in the contest.

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The Cubs narrowed the gap when they chased winner Dallas Green with a three-run burst in the eighth and that's when Duren came on to do his stuff.

He got Andre Rodgers to hit an infield grounder which forced Lou Brock at the plate, then struck out Nelson Mathews to end that threat and went on to pitch hitless ball in the ninth.

Sudden thought: Wouldn't that be a sight to see Duren pitch in the World Series against his old Yankee club and his old buddy, Ralph Houk?

The Dodgers' lead was cut to 5½ games when they were beaten by the Reds, 9-5, while the second-place Giants downed the third-place Cardinals, 3-3. The Braves tripped the Colts, 9-1, and the Pirates defeated the Mets, 7-2.
