Landis' attorney, William Warren, said Landis had come to court from a neurological institution where he had voluntarily confined himself for the past several days. The judge said Landis must have medical attention and hospitalization and spoke of Landis' "long record" of psychiatric treatment.

Landis pleaded guilty Aug. 2 to five counts of filing false federal income tax returns on five years of income totalling \$369,927. He could have received a maximum sentence of one year in prison on each count and a total of \$50,000 in fines.

Landis was charged with not having filed income tax returns for the years 1956 through 1960 until recently. He filed them all at one time, according to authorities, and paid \$94,492.36 in back taxes and civil penalties.

Landis was a personal adviser to Kennedy during his campaign and took a special assignment two years ago to survey federal regulatory agencies for the administration and offer suggestions for improvement.

He was brought into government service by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1933 and became the principal architect of the new securities law. He was a member of the Federal Trade Commission and from 1935 to 1937 was head of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

He headed the Civil Aeronautics Board in the Truman administration, but President Truman unceremoniously dumped him in 1947.

Landis then went to work for Joseph P. Kennedy, the President's father, in helping run the far-flung Kennedy enterprises.

Lawyer named for Brazier

PORTLAND (UPI) — Multnomah County Circuit Judge Charles Crookham Thursday appointed an attorney to represent Arthur Roy Brazier, 38, of Fairview, accused of slaying a fishing companion Monday.

Brazier, who filed a petition stating he had no money to hire a lawyer, will be represented by James M. Hafey, Portland. The defendant is scheduled to appear for a hearing in municipal court Tuesday.

Brazier is accused of murdering Fred S. Parker, 33, Portland, following an argument. Parker died of a chest wound from a rifle fired at close range.

Matzner named by pine group

PORTLAND — Fred Matzner, Idaho and Montana forester, has been named Western Pine Association district forest engineer for Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington, association offices announced here today. He succeeds Gail Thomas, Bend, who resigned recently to go into forestry consulting work.

A graduate of University of Idaho in 1954, Matzner served with the U.S. Forest Service on the Nez Perce and Flathead forests, rising to the position of ranger for the Condon district on the Flathead, in Montana. Since early this year he has been with the Boise Cascade Corp. timber management staff at Winchester, Idaho.

E. L. Kolbe, Western Pine's chief forester, said Matzner will be working out of Bend, in serving association member companies on forest conservation matters. His "territory" will include all of the pine producing counties from Klamath and Jackson in Oregon to Okanogan in Washington.

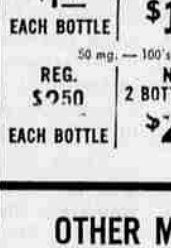
