

Dodgers off and running to prevent repeat by Giants

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers are off and running today in an attempt to prevent the San Francisco Giants from duplicating their stunt of last year when they tied the Dodgers at season's end and won the pennant in a playoff.

It was a big night all-around Thursday night when the Dodgers won the first game of a four-game series by an 11-1 score.

The league-leading Dodgers lengthened their edge over the second-place Giants to 6½ games

before a Dodger Stadium record crowd of 54,978.

Sandy Koufax became the Major League's first 20-game winner with a neat three-hitter, horse-collar-ing such Giant sluggers as the two Willies—Mays and McCovey—and Felipe Alou.

Orlando Cepeda got the line run off the Dodger southpaw on a 400-foot homer over the left field wall in the second inning. It was his 23rd.

This tied the score at 1-1 but the Dodgers batted around in the

third inning when they got five runs on six hits, and again in the fifth when they got three runs on four hits.

Big men at the plate for the Dodgers were Frank Howard, who batted in three runs with his 23rd homer and a single; Ron Fairly, who got three singles in five times at bat and knocked in four runs; Willie Davis, who got three hits including a pair of doubles and scored two runs; and Maury Wills, who batted in two runs on a pair of singles and

scored twice.

Billy Pierce who succeeded Giant starter Bob Bolin in the second inning, took his 10th loss against three victories. In the third, he got crushed under on a single by Wally Moon, Tommy Davis' double, a Fairly single, Howard's home run to the center-field pavilion, Willie Davis' first double—a blooper to left—and Wills' single.

In the fifth, it was somewhat the same story with relief pitcher Jack Fisher on the mound as Wills

opened the festivities by beating out a hit to shortstop. Jim Gilliam walked, and there followed three singles—by Moon, Tommy Davis and Fairly.

Fisher gave up a total of five runs during his 3 1-3 innings. Frank Linzy finished out the last two innings.

Koufax, now 20-5, meanwhile, was coasting along and he didn't walk a man until the eighth when he gave his only free pass to Cap Peterson.

Koufax is the first Dodger left-

hander to win 20 games since Preacher Roe won 22 and lost three in 1951. He's the first National Leaguer to win 20 since Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves had a 21-13 record in 1961.

Koufax said he wasn't exactly thrilled by winning 20 but "got a lot of satisfaction out of it."

He was asked what his next goal was and he said, "to win a World Series game."

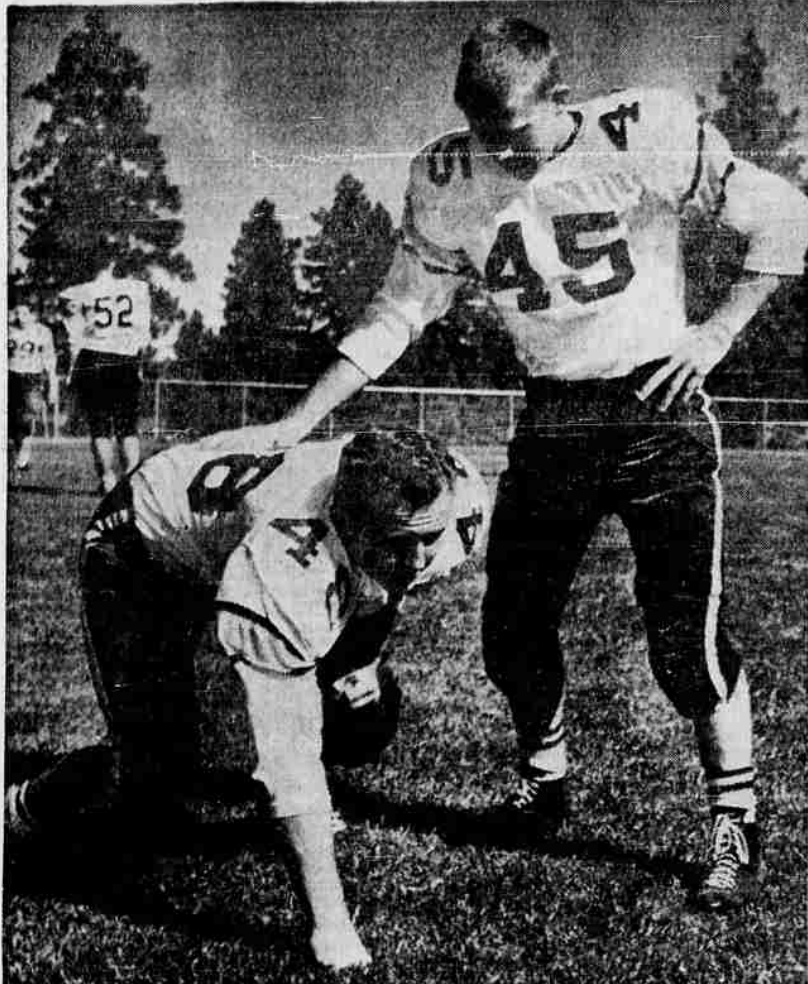
His only series decision is a 1-0 loss in 1959 to the Chicago White Sox.

Giant Manager Alvin Dark didn't seem too downcast about the loss to the Dodgers.

"Before the game, I said we'd have to win five out of our last seven games against the Dodgers—now it's five out of six. This loss won't have any effect on our club."

Dark reported Cepeda may not play this evening in the second game of the series because of a thigh injury.

Dark will start his ace, Juan Marichal, (19-7), against Don Drysdale, 16-16.

Area west of Bend closed to hunters

Harry Pearson of the State Forestry office in Prineville has announced the forest closures north and west of Bend are still in force. It is a big area. These lands are not under U.S. Forest Service protection. The area encompasses mostly Brooks-Seaton lands which are state protected.

This area reaches north from Tumalo Creek along the eastern Cascades to the Sisters area. It is closed to all entry except by permit. Pearson said that there is a great fire danger in this area because of slashings.

MORE ABOUT FOOTBALL

We took a look yesterday afternoon at the Redmond High School football pre-season training camp. And we were impressed. The Panther charges showed in a brief scrimmage in the Spud Bowl that they were in good condition. Especially on offense, the Panthers

displayed surprising pre-season agility. The defense appeared to react well, too.

New head coach Doc Savage said today that his 1963 Panthers are even a better bunch to coach than last year's edition. Savage, not new to Redmond but new as head grid mentor, is getting plenty of help from his assistant coaches. Among them is Bud Lewis, who the past few years was chief at Union. His Union Bobcats were known for hustle and conditioning, speed and good blocking. Though it is really too early to tell much of anything, Redmond appears to be coming along with the same thing.

Savage's biggest problem is the lack of a good, top flight break-away back like last year's explosive Don Watrous.

Redmond, like all other Central Oregon prep teams, has been going at it twice a day this week. The Panthers will not practice on Sunday or Monday, Bond Coach Tom Winbiger has indicated the same.

Substitution rule may do away with platoon ball

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—The new college football substitution rule will "just about do away with platoon football" and reverse a trend toward getting more players into the game, the president of the American Football Coaches Association said today.

"A rules committee spokesman has described the new rule as liberalizing substitutions," Ohio State football coach Woody Hayes said, "but actually it does not, repeat, does not."

The Buckeye mentor, starting his 13th season here, said the rules were "considerably more intricate than the rules committee anticipated."

He predicted confusion on the part of coaches, officials and fans, but said commissioners of the major conferences have promised the coaches that officials will cooperate in handling the new rule.

He also said that the number of substitutes which can be sent in at one time depends on the situation.



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Pro golf pair off to races in Denver Open

DENVER (UPI)—It has been a long drought for veteran professional golfers Ken Venturi and Bill Johnston, but they were off and running today at the head of the pack in the \$35,000 Denver Open.

Each carded a 66 in Thursday's first round of the 72-hole tourney over the 6,774-yard Denver Country Club layout, good enough for a one-stroke lead. Neither has won a tourney since 1960 and each has pocketed only about \$3,000 in winnings this year.

For the 32-year-old Venturi of Crystal River, Fla., who has been hampered for two years by various ailments, his physical condition pleased him as much as his hot, four-under-par round.

"I feel fine," he beamed after burning up the course with a five-under-par 30 on the front nine. "I've had two real bad years physically with a back ailment and tendonitis. Then, two months ago in Cleveland I was bruised in a car accident."

Venturi said he had not mentioned his physical trouble before because "I didn't want to say anything when I was losing." But he feels his 66 entitled him to explain what his problem has been for the past two years.

"It's tough not feeling really strong enough to play my shots," he said. "I was winning my share of tournaments in 1957-58-59. I don't think I was king, but I was winning my share."

Venturi's hot putter gave him five birdies on the front nine and two on the back nine.

The 38-year-old Johnston, of Phoenix, Ariz., who doesn't play the pro circuit continuously, missed only one green, never missed a fairway and used only 31 putting strokes all day.

"I played better than I know how," he commented.

U.S. Olympic skiers offer show Sunday

Bachelor Butte will zoom into the international spotlight this weekend when Coach Bob Beattie puts his 1964 U.S. Olympic ski team on public exhibition.

Sunday is the big day. It is called Olympic Fund Day.

TV cameras will whirl as newsmen of the other media gather for a preview of the United States' 1964 alpine crew. Ski enthusiasts, fans and even tourists are expected to ascend the slopes of Bachelor Butte Sunday.

ABC television will have a crew at the area, filming the practices on Saturday, Sunday and Monday of the Labor Day weekend.

Normally, the Olympians practice on Bachelor's permanent snow fields in the morning and finishing just before noon. Sunday, however, will see Coach Beattie's charges working out all day.

Viewers may reach the practice site by taking a short walk from the end of a double chair lift that will be operating this weekend on a special schedule. The chair lift has been operating this summer on \$1 per adult basis, but Sunday will see it raised to \$2 per ride, and \$1 for children. This is for the Olympic Fund.

Bend's Bachelor Butte ski organization has offered to turn over all receipts from the sale of chair lift rides this Sunday to the Olympic Fund raising committee. For those who do not want to ride the lift, Olympic Fund Day buttons will be available for \$1.

Sunday completes one week of training here for the Olympians. Coach Beattie has had the Olympic team, 17 strong with coaches, lodged in a restful camp at Elk Lake. Mornings has seen the Olympians drilling on fundamentals on Bachelor Butte's north slope. They usually have been back in camp for noon chow. After lunch the Olympians have been viewing films from the morning workout from the day

before.

Olympians' afternoons are left free for them to train in their own mode. Most of them take hikes along the Cascade mountain trails. By early evening or late afternoon the Olympians are back in the Elk Lake camp area. Their evening hours are spent relaxing and talking over the day's workout.

After Sunday's Olympic Fund Day, the U.S. alpine team will remain another week in the Cascades for more training. After completion of their summer workouts here, the Olympic skiers will move to Boulder, Colo., and those that are students (most of them) will register for the fall term at the University of Colorado. Beattie was the Colorado coach. Beattie wants them to get familiar with the foreign atmosphere.

Barrel of sentiment tonight for Lane

They're going to roll out a barrel of sentiment in Detroit tonight to honor one of the most hard-nosed competitors the game of football has ever seen.

Bobby Layne, the tough Texan who ruled the huddles of the Detroit Lions and the Pittsburgh Steelers with an iron hand, will be honored during halftime festivities when these two clubs clash in a pre-season game.

One of the greatest quarterbacks in National Football League annals, Layne established NFL records for career passing yardage and touchdown passes

before he retired after the 1962 season. The highlight of "Bobby Layne Night" will be the official announcement of a scholarship fund in his name at the University of Texas, his alma mater.

The only other scheduled exhibition game tonight pits the San Francisco Forty Niners' "walking wounded" against the Dallas Cowboys at Bakersfield, Calif. The action, may be hard pressed to find 11 men to man their positions. The Cowboys have compiled a 1-2 slate to date.

In other NFL developments, middle linebacker Ray Nitschke of the Green Bay Packers

brushed off criticism of New York's Sam Huff for his violent tackling of teammate Jim Taylor in last year's championship game as part of "his job." The Packers were preparing for a Labor Day rematch with the Giants whom they have now beaten in consecutive times.

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
