

Clay committee to follow up on Kennedy plea

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — President Kennedy's advisory committee on foreign aid, headed by Gen. Lucius D. Clay, will undertake soon to follow through on the chief executive's appeal for public support of his fight to reinstate House slashes in funds.

Clay told United Press International he would be talking with several other committee members in New York next week to "see what help and support we can contribute."

He said it was too early to know how the committee would go about the task of stimulating "public understanding" to assist Kennedy's fight to have the Senate put back most of the \$1 billion knocked out of his foreign aid program by the house.

Clay Gives Opinion But, interviewed at his vacation home at Chatham, about 22 miles from here on Cape Cod, Clay told UPI:

"The main principle is to try to make the American people understand that while cuts are desirable, what the house did was to cut too fast and too far."

Kennedy met Friday at the summer White House on Squaw Island with Clay and Foreign Aid Director David Bell. The President, with Clay standing beside him, then held an outdoor news conference calling on Americans to back him on the issue.

Approves First Cut Kennedy had asked the House for a new aid authorization of \$4.5 billion, after voluntarily trimming the total from \$4.9 billion as a result of the Clay committee's report. The House Foreign Affairs Committee reduced the sum to \$4.1 billion and Clay said this measure met the standards of his group.

But then it was chopped by an additional \$585 million on the house floor, to a final total of \$3.5 billion. Clay said this went "to a point that I think is dangerous."

Clay repeated the warning he gave at Friday's news conference that the cuts would imperil the entire program but most particularly aid to Latin America and military assistance to countries that are face to face geographically with the Communists.

Foes of Dunes proposal speak

PORTLAND (UPI) — Opponents of the proposed Oregon Dunes National Seashore from Florence spoke at the Downtown Lions Club here Friday.

Norman Price Jr., executive secretary of the Siuslaw Port Commission; Howard Campbell, president of the Florence Chamber of Commerce, and Jim Neilson, a past-president of the chamber, voiced their disapproval of a park in the Florence area.

Price said existing state, federal and private agencies were "doing a good job" in providing recreational opportunities among the lakes, dunes and woods near Florence.

"The kind of facilities provided now are not the kind the U.S. Park Service would provide if the area became a national park," he said.

"Park employees would like to restore the area as much as possible to a wilderness, with little access except on foot or on horseback," Price declared.

He added the park service would "eliminate houses and most overnight facilities."

Hoover cracks at 'Cosa Nostra'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover Friday blamed organized crime for subverting business, unions, courts, city halls, legislative chambers and law enforcement agencies.

Hoover discussed the impact of recent disclosures about the crime syndicate, "Cosa Nostra," in his monthly "message to all law enforcement officials" in the September issue of the FBI Bulletin.

He said Cosa Nostra is "a strong arm of organized crime in America." He implied, however, that no one should lose sight of the fact that there is other organized crime in the nation too.

Information about Cosa Nostra provided by informer Joseph Valachi "has corroborated and embellished the facts developed by the FBI as early as 1961," Hoover said. He said the "make up of this gang land horde" was first disclosed by the FBI information.

Oregon's first electronic voting device gets tests

SALEM (UPI) — The first public testing of an electronic voting device in Oregon history got under way here Friday at the state fairgrounds.

The test could pave the way for a revision of balloting procedures throughout the state.

Jack Thompson, elections supervisor for the secretary of state's office, encouraged fairgoers to "come early and vote often." Two polling places were set up on the fairgrounds.

The small portable voting devices hold a special data processing machine card. Voters punch holes in the cards to register their choice.

The punched cards will be fed through data processing machines which will tabulate results electronically.

Hatfields go sight-seeing at state fair

SALEM (UPI) — Oregon's governor made short shift of his official duties Friday, and spent the afternoon hauling his two children around the state fair in a bright red wagon.

Gov. and Mrs. Mark Hatfield exclaimed over displays, looked at exhibits, and pampered their children, Marko, 3, and Elizabeth, 4, as did thousands of other families.

Noontime official ceremonies were held at the south entrance of the floral gardens. Speeches were followed by a ribbon cutting to symbolize the opening of the grounds for the nine-day 1963 extravaganza.

Hatfield told a crowd of several hundred on hand for the ceremonies that the fair represented "Oregon on review."

Glancing at the overcast skies, the governor commented: "I hope we will have need for the sunshades erected to replace the trees blown down by last October's storm."

Relief carried into Southland by cold front

By United Press International A cool front which carried relief to the sweltering Southland and a tornado to Texas triggered thunderstorms along the Gulf Coast today.

Mobile, Ala., collected 1.83 inches of rain in six hours. Pine Bluff, Ark., measured 2.47 inches of rain in six hours. Ardmore, Okla., had more than an inch in a few minutes.

A tornado chewed through Texas City, Tex., unroofed five homes, lifted a boat from a trailer and hurled it against a house. Three funnel clouds were sighted near Hereford, Tex., but apparently failed to touch down.

The U.S. Weather Bureau reported a tornado near Albuquerque, N.M.

Thunderstorms dropped heavy rain in North Texas. Brownfield reported streets flooded. Abilene, Tex., had 2.87 inches of rain in a few hours.

Another belt of thunderstorms was reported around a low pressure area in the northeast states today. During the night a thunderstorm with 50 mile winds hit Williamsport, Pa.

Friday Charlotte, N.C., had 1.34 inches of rain and Lubbock, Tex., 1.13 inches.

The U.S. Weather Bureau's hurricane hunters at Miami, Fla., were watching a low pressure area 500 miles northeast of Puerto Rico for signs that it might develop into a tropical storm.

In Washington the Weather Bureau released a 30-day outlook calling for cooler than normal conditions in the east half of the country during September. It will be warmer than usual in the western half. Above normal rain was expected in much of the east two-thirds of the nation.

Howard says tax petitions contain 55,048 signatures

By Zan Stark UPI Staff Writer SALEM (UPI) — Petitions to refer the 1963 legislature's \$60 million tax increase measure to a special election Oct. 15 were turned over to the secretary of state at 2:40 p.m. Friday.

J. Francly Howard, who spearheaded the referral drive, said the petitions contained 55,048 valid signatures.

Only 23,185 valid signatures were needed to refer the tax bill to a special election.

Secretary of State Howell Apppling Jr. told Howard he expected the check of petitions would be finished and the measure formally referred to the ballot on Tuesday.

Work Involved Applying said circulators' affidavits would be checked, certification by county clerks would be confirmed, and a count made of valid signatures.

Earlier Friday, state officials and education leaders met here to map plans to salvage the tax increase measure. The meeting was called at Gov. Mark Hatfield's request with a full scale planning session scheduled Sept. 6.

Delivery of the petitions took place in a near carnival-like atmosphere.

About 20 of Howard's co-workers joined in a car caravan to the Capitol building.

The autos were decorated with small American flags, and carried signs proclaiming "Howard's petitions."

After posing for photographers and television cameramen, Howard and his supporters marched to the secretary of state's office.

Howard said "I wasn't supposed to get here, you know. I received telephone threats on my life, and threats that I would never be able to deliver the petitions."

Howard said thousands of dollars would be spent by groups opposed to defeat of the tax bill. "I don't know if we can combat the attempt that will be made to brainwash the people of Oregon."

He said he was opposed to a special legislative session if the bill is defeated.

The legislature enacted the tax increase measure to help finance a \$404 million general fund budget for the 1963-65 biennium.

Republicans set all-out drive

PORTLAND (UPI) — Republican Party leaders said Friday they have begun an all-out drive to gain control of the Oregon House of Representatives in 1965 and the Senate two years later.

The campaign is bolstered by a recently-subscribed \$25,000 fund and the efforts of State Rep. Robert Packwood, a Portland attorney.

State Chairman Phil Roth said the money will be earmarked for the legislative campaign, even though it goes into the State Central Committee's general fund.

Packwood will spend most of his time after the 1965 primaries in the field helping Republican candidates organize their campaigns Roth said.

The state chairman said the new campaign is based on the success of one he and Secretary of State Howell Apppling Jr. organized in 1962 with only \$4,500. The present \$25,000 fund was raised by donations from individual party members.

AID FOR SKOPJE GENEVA (UPI) — The American Red Cross announced today it is donating \$60,000 to aid victims of the Skopje, Yugoslavia, earthquake. Earlier, the organization sent \$102,360 in cash, drugs, clothing and food supplies to the city.
