

## Hatfield tells Commission to end fence-straddling

SALEM (UPI)—An angry Gov. Mark Hatfield Wednesday ordered the State Game Commission to quit straddling the fence and announce its stand on the controversial proposal to close the state's inland waters to commercial salmon and steelhead fishing.

The blast came at the end of a 50-minute meeting of the Governor's Committee on Natural Resources.

The meeting had been called by Hatfield to get committee reaction to the initiative filed by Save Our Salmon and Steelhead, Inc., to close the state's inland waters—including the Columbia River.

Hatfield had asked Game Commission chairman J. W. Smith if the commission favored closing the waters.

Smith evaded answering. Earlier Fish Commission biologist Dr. Don Chapman had closed his testimony by stating he recommended keeping the state's waterways open to commercial fishing. Chapman's comments were joy-

fully received by two busloads of commercial fishermen from Astoria who were among the 200 who attended the meeting.

Chapman said closure of the Columbia to commercial fishing would mean the fish would be caught elsewhere, there would be a substantial increase in spawning, and an increased death rate among juvenile fish.

He said an increase in the spawn would not necessarily increase the fish harvest substantially because of the condition of the spawning grounds.

Hatfield told Smith, "I think it's time you restudy the individual agency positions and responsibilities, there is a great interest in this issue. I want an answer from the (game) commission."

Meanwhile, an appeal was filed in the Oregon Supreme Court Wednesday protesting Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton's ballot title for the proposal to close inland waters.

The appeal was filed by William E. Westerholm, secretary of the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union, James C. Cellars, secretary of the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union, James C. Cellars, secretary of the Columbia River Salmon and Tuna Packers Assn., and by the association.

The title reads: "Purpose: Prohibits commercial fishing for salmon and steelhead in all Oregon inland waters, including boundary rivers. Prohibits all commercial dealings in fish taken illegally."

The appeal asks that the last sentence read: "Prohibits all commercial dealings in such fish taken in prohibited areas."

## Plea declined by McBride

Jack McBride, 25, of Bend, facing a charge of failing to contribute to the support of minor children, declined to enter a plea today in District Court, as scheduled. His attorney asked for additional time.

McBride is held at the Deschutes County jail, with bail set at \$10,000. Following his arrest, he was inadvertently stated in The Bulletin that he was charged with contributing to the delinquency of minor children. The charge of contributing to dependency is a misdemeanor.

## Visitor takes keen interest in fire control techniques

A forest officer from West Pakistan who is very much interested in the overall management of the Deschutes National Forest, especially fire control, is a visitor in the Bend pine country this week.

He is Syed Abdur Rahman Shah, a graduate from Punjab University who took advanced training at Pakistan Forest Institute. He is spending a year in the United States under the Agency for International Development program.

Serving as liaison officer for the visiting official from West Pakistan is Phil Shoemaker, of the Deschutes National Forest staff. Not only are fire control methods being studied, but trespass controls on forests are being reviewed, and the forest's communication system is being examined.

The visiting official is observing many fire control techniques used in pine lands — but so far he has not observed control of an actual fire in this season of high hazard, but few fires so far.

If applicable in his homeland, the West Pakistan official may recommend adoption of some of the local fire control techniques. He has been told of the great value of borate bombers in initial fire control.

Forests of various types cover some 6,500,000 acres in West Pakistan, with conifers on the upper slopes and scrub forests at lower levels. There are also irrigated forest plantations in the lowlands.

West Pakistan is a land of rugged mountains and river valleys. Irrigation is extensively practiced. Fire danger, the visitor noted, is quite high seasonally, in the zone of the long-needle pine — the Pinus roxburghii, the official said.

## Commissioners handle business in jig time

Bend City Commissioners last night used less than a half hour in which to dispose of current business items during their regular bi-monthly meetings.

Two zoning ordinances received first reading. One allows the insertion of drive-in restaurants in the C-2 (commercial) zone classification. Businesses in a C-2 district cater primarily to tourist patronage. The other ordinance changes from C-3 to C-4 (commercial) a one-block area between E. Fifth and Sixth streets and Alden and Burnside.

In other business the board authorized a proposed agreement between the Deschutes County Sheriff's office and the Bend and Redmond police departments to hook up on the same radio frequency. Use of the sheriff's frequency would add power and facilitate communication between the various law agencies.

Commissioners also accepted a \$1,366.50 bid submitted by the J. C. Penney Company for sale of new City Police uniforms.

It was announced by City Manager Hal Puddy that contracts have been signed and work was to be underway today on the first of four paving operations on city roadways. Workmen of the Bend Aggregate & Paving Company expect to complete the laying of asphalt by Friday on W. 11th, between Newport and Quincy avenues. Three other city roadways and an alleyway will follow, and should be completed in from one to two weeks. Total paving costs for the roadways and resurfacing of Bond Street, Greenwood to Franklin, are \$19,355.80.
