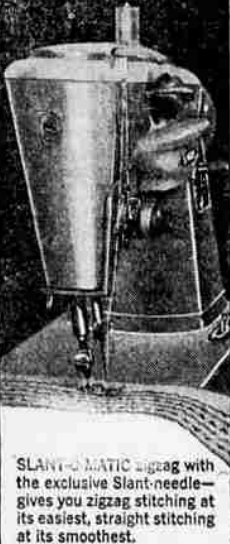

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## Man jailed on driving charge

PRINEVILLE — Royal Gupton was fined \$295.50 and \$4.50 court costs or 60 days for driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor in recent justice court action. Unable to post bail he was sent to jail.

Being drunk on a public highway cost Alden Nelson \$20.50 and costs and being drunk in public brought the same fine to Harry Johnson in justice court. Alden Nelson was also given 30 days in jail when unable to pay a \$145.50 fine for furnishing liquor to a minor. Obstructing rear view vision brought a suspended fine of \$10.50 and costs to James Bagley. The same offense cost John Taylor \$3 and costs.

In city court, Melvin Hayes was fined \$200 or 40 days for driving while intoxicated. Being drunk in public cost Amiel Rhoads, Fred Snedeker and William Loftus \$20 each, but cost Homer Coleman \$25 or five days. Reckless driving charge brought a fine of \$100 with \$50 suspended to Marvin George, who also was fined \$25 for violation of the basic rule.

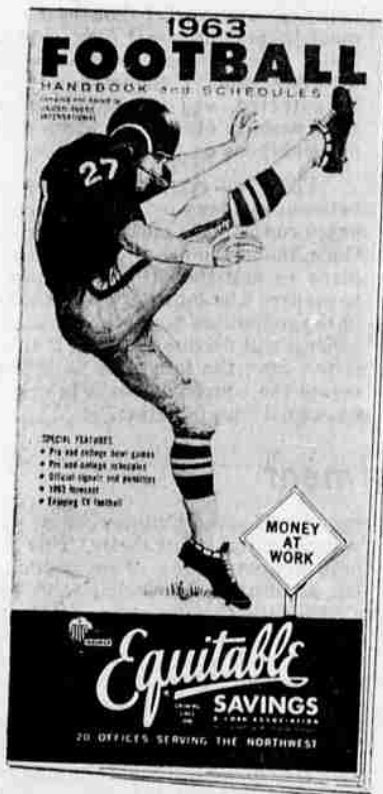

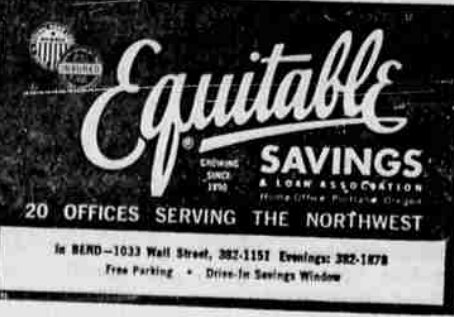
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
