Group organizes drive to save state tax bill

PORTLAND (UPI) — A citizen's committee organized to oppose voter defeat of the 1963 legislative tax bill—which features a \$60 million revenue increase over the last biennium—began its campaign this week.

The measure was referred to the people by a successful drive of signatures started by Albany publisher J. Francyl Howard. The election will be held Oct. 15.

An audience of approximately 30 persons Wednesday night heard the mechanics of the referendum outlined by State Senator Richard Eymann, D-Marcola. Representatives of the three educational organizations spearheading the drive to save the tax package solicited audience support for the measure.

The organizations are the Oregon School Board Association, the Congress of Parents and Teachers and the Oregon Education Association.

At a news conference earlier Wednesday, Dr. Howard Cherry of the Portland school board said defeat of the tax program would mean the Portland school district would lose about \$3 million, or between 8 and 9 per cent of its budget.

He said the loss would run between 8 and 12 per cent in other parts of the state.
