

Oregon State picks Bruce Williams as team captain

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—Fullback Bruce Williams of Auburn, Calif., who has the distinction of having lost only one yard in two years of varsity play, was rewarded by his teammates Thursday when they named him captain of the Oregon State squad.

Williams has carried the ball 146 times during the past two seasons and gained 533 yards.

Senior guard Joe Bonilla of Selma, Calif., was named alternate captain.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—Two workouts are scheduled for today and a full game scrimmage Saturday for the University of Oregon football team.

The squad concentrated on punting formation Thursday morning and held a running drill in the afternoon.

Quarterbacks Doug Post and Jack Soverign and halfback Hal Hoffman handled the kicking

chores, while halfbacks Mel Renfro and Larry Hill stood out in the running drills.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—Craig Morton, who shows continued improvement in each workout, was named the No. 2 quarterback today by University of California coach Mary Levy.

Morton directed the second team during Thursday's workout and, according to Levy, showed all the signs of a seasoned performer.

First-string halfback Tom Blanchfield was another player who caught Levy's eye in Thursday's practice session.

The Golden Bears open their 1963 season in 15 days against Iowa State. They hold their first major scrimmage in Memorial Stadium Saturday.

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—Coach John Ralston of Stanford is worried about the feet of his No. 1 fullback.

Ken Babajian, who has had foot trouble before, is on the sidelines once again. Because of some unusual bone structure, football shoes hurt Ken's feet. They have flared up again, causing Ralston to look elsewhere for a possible substitute.

Behind Babajian he has the veteran Tony DeLellis; two non-lettermen, Frank Bunch and Dan Conaway, and soph Glenn Myers. At the moment, Bunch and Myers

look like possible replacements.

SEATTLE (UPI)—Coach Jim Owens of Washington still is looking for a fullback.

With regular fullback Junior Coffey on the sidelines with injuries, the battle continues for a replacement. Glenn Reece, senior non-lettermen from Los Angeles, continues to show improvement and, as a result, has been moved up to the No. 2 spot be-

hind Charlie Browning.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UPI)—Coach Dee Andres' grading system has resulted in the promotion of only one player to the first team at the University of Idaho.

He is veteran tackle Jim Moran. Two fifth string backs—Gary Peters and Bob Bartlett—also moved up. Peters to No. 2 quarterback and Bartlett to No. 3 wingback.

A full scale scrimmage on Saturday is expected to result in further changes.

New scoreboard will add to action

Adorning new Bruin Field is a new facility that should make watching Bend football games all the more enjoyable.

Hung this week at the south end of the field was a new scoreboard. Athletic Director Dick Gesser explained, "It's the latest thing in scoreboards." The new board is not particularly fancy, but it's plenty adequate.

It is the same make of score facility that Bend High School has in the school gymnasium for basketball games. The football board is relay controlled. The lighted numbers (for the game time remaining) change every second as the seconds click by.

Bend's facility is equipped with 24 inch numbers for time, score, yards to go, and the down number. Upon the construction of a grandstand at new Bruin Field, the controls for the board will be in the press box atop the stadium. Temporary arrangements for this year will see the controls operated from some scaffolding behind the temporary bleachers on the west side of the field.

Purchase of this facility was made possible through cooperation and joint efforts of the school district and local interest. The school district budgeted \$1000 toward the board, and another \$1000 was raised through the sale of programs (and the advertising in them) for the State Class B Basketball Tournament, as well as the sales of the program at the State B Track Meet. Both were held in Bend last year. The board's total cost was \$1900.

"Personal contact relative to the sale of season tickets has been started," Gesser has announced. The season tickets are available at Stover-LeBlanc and at the senior high school. They will sell for \$4.50 for the five home games, which is a 50c savings over what it would cost a person purchasing \$1 general admission tickets for each game.

U.S., Canada down to wire

Americas Cup wars narrow

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Possession of the Americas Cup,

the biennial prize for amateur golf stars from the United States, Canada and Mexico and always won by the U. S. previously, shaped up today as a down-to-the-wire struggle between the Americans and Canadians.

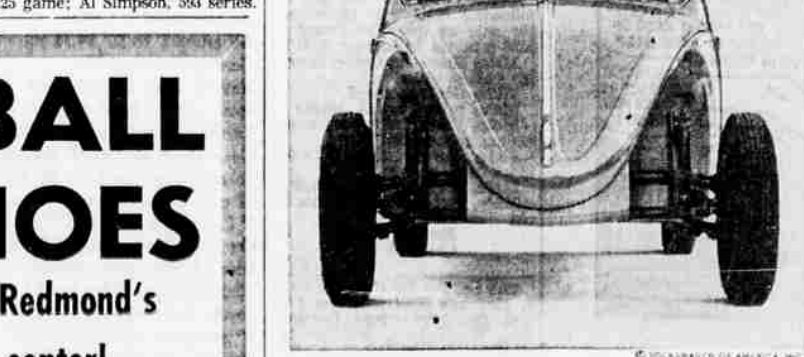
The 7th chase for the trophy, over the 6,896-yard, par-72 Wakonda Club, site of next week's U.S. Amateur championship, will end today after three three-ball matches and six singles matches, making 18 more points available to each team.

The U.S. held a narrow margin heading into the final round with 12 1/2 points compared with 11 for Canada and 3 1/2 for Mexico, but the Canadians showed no signs of faltering Thursday in

earning the maximum possible two points in three of six singles matches.

Bert Ticehurst whipped Deane Beman, the 1960 U.S. Amateur champion, 3 and 2, and Tomas Lehman of Mexico, 6 and 5, for one sweep. Douglas Silverberg downed Jose Ortega of Mexico and Richard Davies of the U.S., both 4 and 2, for another. Bill Pidlaski trimmed Dr. Ed Updegraff of the U.S., 1 up, and Augustin Silveira of Mexico, 4 and 3, for the third.

The U.S. had only two who swept the board, Charlie Coe, twice the National Amateur champion, and Dick Sikes, the national collegiate titleholder and former national public champion.
