Blast in Butte still mystery

BUTTE, Mont. (UPI) — The Aug. 24 explosion of 3,500 pounds of stolen dynamite at a slag dump here remained almost as much a mystery today as it was the night it happened.

All that has been established for certain is that the one known victim of the mammoth blast was Emil Guay, 34-year-old Butte cement worker and father of nine children. The FBI identified Guay by fingerprints.

It is now assumed there was only the one victim and that others at the scene fled immediately before the blast.

A coroner's jury early this week came only to the conclusion that Guay was killed in the explosion. It had no ideas as to what caused the dynamite to blow up just as officers were moving in on the scene.

Police and sheriff's officers were tipped there was to be a sale of the dynamite which was stolen early in August from a Butte powder firm. It came out during the inquiry that the sale was actually a set up as a buy-back by the powder firm from the thieves.

Sunday night Butte had another dynamite explosion, this one an undetermined quantity in front of a Great Northern freight train just north of Butte.

Madras counts 49 more pupils

MADRAS — Madras school enrollment increases over the past several years continued this year when a total of 2135 students reported for class in the various schools of the recently unified district.

New registration figures listed 49 students more in the district than on opening day of the component school districts last year and further jumps in enrollment are expected as late registrations come in.

Madras Union High School registration this week hit 624 students, crowding facilities of the 25-year-old building which was designed for about 400 students.

The grade and junior high enrollment totaled 1668 with a total of 237 first graders; 217, second; 199, third; 200, fourth; 201, fifth; 172, sixth; 177, seventh and 165, eighth.

Accident blamed on slick street

A shower-slickened street was responsible for a three-car accident on South Third Street in Bend late this morning in which a local resident, Clifford Smith, 1472 Elgin, suffered a neck injury.

One of the three cars had slowed to make a turn into a motel. A car behind also slowed, and was in turn struck by a car in the rear. The middle car was shoved ahead by the impact, and bumped the lead car.

Youth arrested after scuffle

A 20-year-old Bend youth who police say fought with officers to avoid being arrested in city jail this morning, held on \$150 bail.

Charged with attempting to flee from police is Frederick Henderson Raymond, 1107 W. 15th. According to police report, he was brought to jail in handcuffs this morning following a scuffle in which he delivered blows to the chin of one officer and the eye of another.

Police said they first spotted the youth from their patrol car, about 3 o'clock this morning. He was driving his car up on a residential lawn at the W. Louisiana-Broadway intersection. According to officers, he was spinning his wheels crazily and tearing up the lawn.

As Raymond drove from the scene the police gave chase, stopping his car two blocks away. On questioning, Raymond claimed he was tearing up the lawn because his girl lived there, and he was "mad at her."

The officers put Raymond in the patrol car and returned to the scene to inspect damage. Left alone, the youth fled from the patrol car and darted up the street toward his own car. An officer sprinted after him but Raymond reached his car first and drove off, reportedly in an "erratic manner," westbound. Pursuing his car the second time, police stopped it at W. 15th near Galveston. They said the youth refused to step out of his vehicle, and fought their efforts to remove him. He also kicked an officer and broke the car's dome-light lens, they said.

Round Butte Dam 70 per cent done

MADRAS — Construction of Portland General Electric's Round Butte dam on the Deschutes river eight miles west of Madras is approaching the 70 per cent complete mark, PGE spokesmen said this week.

With a construction force of 1200 men on the job, the main activity centers on placement of 10 million cubic yards of fill material required for the 440 foot high dam.

To date some three million cubic yards have been placed, averaging 45,000 yards daily. The rock and earth required are taken from the canyon walls and from deposits located near the dam-site.

PGE's electrical maintenance and construction crews have finished their work on the 230,000 volt Round Butte switchyard located downstream from the dam on the east bank of the canyon. The line will extend to the utility's Bethel substation in Salem, 100 miles westward.

Filling of Lake Chinook, the reservoir to be formed behind the dam, is expected to start in September. The reservoir will extend 12 miles up the Metolius, 9 miles up the Deschutes and 6 miles up the Crooked Rivers.

An in-service teacher - training instruction held in Salem is advancing Miss Williams in her field, and she will begin her student teaching Monday, September 9 at the Baker Elementary School in South Salem.
