

Dallas' defensive backs could bring eastern crown

DALLAS (UPI) — The Tom Landry shuffle has taken on new implications for the Dallas Cowboys this season.

The term "shuffle" originated with Landry's use of alternating quarterbacks on each play. But this season Landry, recognized around the National Football League as "a defensive genius," has had to broaden the scope of the shuffle in an effort to shore up one of the NFL's weakest defenses.

If Landry's prospecting among

a flock of promising defensive backs pans out, the Cowboys conceivably could make "geniuses" out of the daring pre-season observers who pick Dallas as successors to the New York Giants as Eastern Division champions.

There will be little or no change in the Cowboy attack, which generated enough momentum last season to rank No. 2 in the league in total yardage and scoring.

The offense again will rely heavily on the shuttling quarterbacks, Eddie LeBaron and Don Meredith, the ground galloping

of Don Perkins and Amos Marsh, the fine receiving of Bill Howton and Frank Clarke and the excellent kicking of Sam Baker.

While the offense isn't creating any new gray hairs on the 39-year-old Landry's head, the defense often makes him want to tear out big gaps in his thinning head cover.

For the first time, Landry feels he has as fine a linebacking corps as the club will need — now and for the future. But he still isn't sure who is going to play where — except that slower Jerry Tubbs will be the middle

man.

Chuck Howley played creditably at the weak-side post last year and seems a fixture along with Tubbs — except that he may wind up as the strong-side linebacker because of his experience, size and speed.

That would mean the Lee Roy Jordan, the Alabama rookie prize, would get the weak-side job, since he's lighter and also had the knack for coming across to meet a play.

Then, there is Harold Hays, a 1961 future from Mississippi Southern, who may be better

than any of the other three, as the swing man. If Jordan can't make it, Hays will go to the strong side, Howley back to the weak side.

The secondary is even more of a problem. That is where the opposition probed deeply for its big scores last year.

Two of last year's rookies, responsible for many of the lapses which cost deep-strike touchdowns, have impressed Landry so well in the pre-season games they have just about shunted a pair of veterans out of their jobs. They are Mike Gaechter at safe

ty and Cornell Green at the left halfback spot.

Green, particularly, has shown so much savvy he has veteran Jim Ridlon, obtained in a trade from San Francisco, running with the second unit, while teaming with veteran Don Bishop at the corners.

Jerry Norton, another veteran defensive man, also has dropped back to the second unit behind Gaechter and Warren Livingston, the latter a brilliant rookie in 1961 until he broke an arm.

The two front lines, however,

seem set. On defense, Bob Lilly and George Andrei at ends and John Meyers and Guy Reese at tackles will be back at their old stands. On offense, former Cleveland Browns all-star Jim Ray Smith will be at one guard and Dale Memmelaar at the other, with Bob Fry and Ed Nutting at the tackles and Mike Connelly at center.

And at every position there is a mixture of seasoned hands and a sprinkling of rookies to give Landry depth, an ingredient missing up to now.

Strong Minnesota Twins should be called 'Nagurskis'

The Minnesota Twins might be more appropriately named if they were called the Minnesota Nagurskis.

A symbol of power was the mighty Nagurski — former All-America fullback at the University of Minnesota — and that's precisely what the 1963 Twins are in major league baseball.

The muscular Twins reached the 200-mark in homers for the season Friday night when they belted four in a 9-8 victory over the Chicago White Sox that moved them into second place in the American League. The major league record of 240 homers in a season, held by the 1961 New York Yankees, is out of reach of the Twins but they stand a better than even chance to wind up as the second greatest homer-hitting team in big league history.

The Twins won the game on the strength of ninth-inning homers by Vic Power and Bob Allison. Earlier, Harmon Killebrew hit his 37th and Earl Battey his 24th. Power's homer was his ninth and Allison's his 32nd.

The Yankees rolled on toward a fourth straight pennant with a 2-1 victory over the Detroit Tigers, the Baltimore Orioles downed the Boston Red Sox, 6-4 and 4-2, the Washington Senators topped the Cleveland Indians, 7-2, and the Los Angeles Angels edged the Kansas City Athletics, 4-3, in other American League games.

In the National League, Los Angeles defeated San Francisco, 5-2, Pittsburgh beat St. Louis, 5-0, after a 5-1 loss, Milwaukee shut out Philadelphia, 5-0; New York nipped Cincinnati, 5-4, and Chicago beat Houston, 3-0.

U.S. captures Americas Cup

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI) — It wasn't a comeback victory because they never trailed, but United States golf stars showed stretch speed to win the Americas Cup from Canada and Mexico for the seventh time without defeat.

Led by captain Billy Joe Patton, the U.S. players won 14 of a possible 18 points on the final day of play to tally 26½ points of a possible 36 in the biennial international tournament, pulling away from Canada, totaling 19½, and Mexico, with 8.

Canada, trailing by 1½ points midway through the two-day event, could pick up only 8½ points in the final team and singles matches, and Mexico knocked out the Canadians by winning 3 points in team play and 4½ for the day.

Patton, who did not play in the singles matches on the first day, took charge Friday, defeating both of his rivals, Bert Ticehurst of Canada, 3 and 2, and Jose Ortega of Mexico, 6 and 5, to run his Americas Cup record to 12 wins and no losses.

But youthful Dick Sikes was equally impressive, defeating Agustín Silveira of Mexico, 7 and 6, and R. Keith Alexander of Canada, 6 and 5, to make his Americas Cup record four wins and no losses in his first appearance on the team.

The third double winner for the U.S. was Dr. Ed Updegraff, who sat out the team matches but came through in the singles with a 4 and 2 decision over Tomas Lehman of Mexico and 3 and 2 over Bill Wakeham of Canada.

CROW SIDELINED

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Halfback John David Crow will miss at least the first three games of the National Football League season after being placed on the injured list by the St. Louis Cardinals.

\$50,000 for first

Four giants of golf converge at Akron

AKRON, Ohio (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus, Julius Boros and Bob Charles, who have won all of the major golf titles, and an aching and worried Arnold Palmer who has won the most money, meet today in the first of two 18-hole rounds for golf's biggest payoff of the year.

It's the \$50,000 first-place money in the World Series of Golf, with Nicklaus an even-money favorite to repeat his triumph of last year.

Palmer, whom Nicklaus contends "doesn't belong here," was the choice until he disclosed Thursday night that his right shoulder "is hurting like hell."

That dropped him to second choice at 3-2 followed by Boros at 3-1 and the left-handed Charles at 5-1.

"With such odds, I like Charles," said Boros, the U. S. Open champion. "But you can't ever sell Palmer short, and it doesn't pay either to discount Nicklaus."

Likes The Odds Nicklaus liked the odds and "hope they will stand up." But outspoken as he is, Nicklaus said, "Of course, Arnold shouldn't be here at all. And I don't mean because of his ailing shoulder."

"After all, he was an also-ran, and this is supposed to be a contest for champions only. I think Arnie will agree with me that if this is for champions only, then he doesn't belong."

Under the format of the World Series of Golf, the winners of the Masters, U. S. and British Opens and the PGA qualify. Nicklaus upset the format when he won both the Masters and the PGA. That left the fourth spot open, and it was decided in a playoff among Palmer, Jack Cupit and Phil Rodgers.

Palmer and Cupit had finished in a tie with Boros for the U. S. Open title and lost in a playoff; Rodgers and Charles tied for the British Open crown and Rodgers lost in a playoff.

Nicklaus Explains "Of course, Arnie belongs with the best," Nicklaus said. "But I don't think an also-ran belongs

here. In cases where you have one golfer winning two or more of the major titles, they should pick the winner of some other major tournament — like the Thunderbird, the Cleveland Open or the American Golf Classic. In other words, this was set up to be for winners only and here we have Arnie, who has won a lot but not a major tournament."

"I guess Jackie is right," said Palmer, who last year had won the Masters and the British Open, cutting the field for the first World Series of Golf to three. Gary Player, the little South African, who won the PGA, was the third golfer. He and Palmer finished four strokes behind Nicklaus last year in this event.

"My only consideration now is my shoulder," said Palmer, adding that "it hurts like the dickens when I drive."

"I just wish I knew exactly what the trouble is. My doctor believes it is bursitis. He has been giving me pain-killing pills. I hope they will help. I've been eating them like popcorn but yesterday they didn't help too much."

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
