



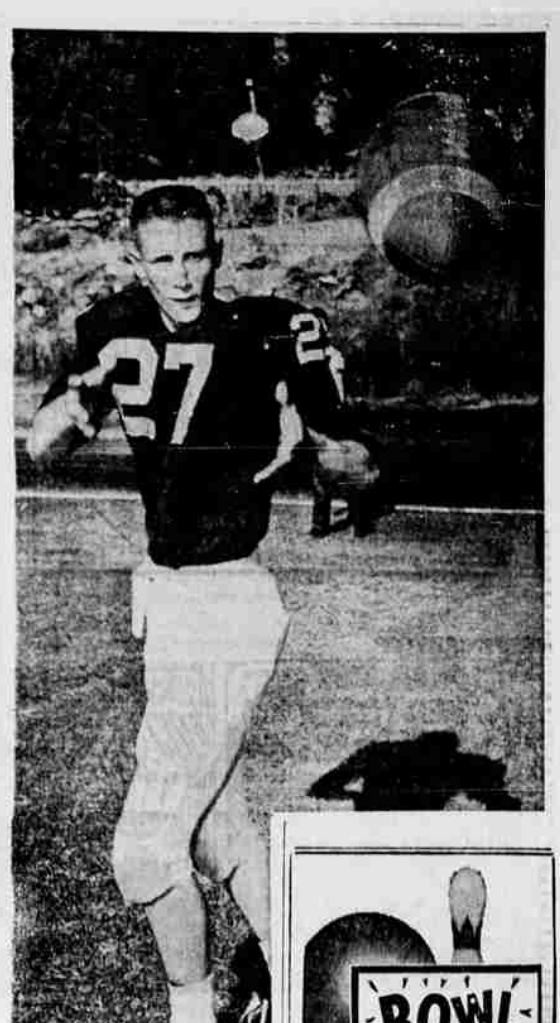

Open season with Mac Hi

Redmond Hi's gridgers look 'green but game' for 1963

REDMOND — They'll give it both barrels and just hope the bottom doesn't fall out.

That's the situation at Redmond Union High School's grid plant this season. The Panthers are now working hard with a new head mentor, Doc Savage.

"It's much too early to tell what kind of a season we are going to have," Savage said today, "but one thing looks for sure... we're a little stronger on defense than offense."

Redmond's 1963 Panthers are not loaded. They don't pretend to be. But the enthusiasm is tops and the 'Cat charges are picking up fundamentals fast.

Graduation cut a swath in the Redmond ranks last spring, leaving a void in experience in the backfield. "We definitely are not going to be an explosive team,"

Savage pointed out, "we just don't have that element in the backfield." Savage, however, does not plan to go "on the wild side" to make up for it. He explained that success this year will depend on how the breaks go.

Redmond's line is forming, and the picture looks a little better. At tackles the Panthers feel some strength. There are some gaps. The forward wall is thin, however, especially at the ends and at center.

Perhaps the biggest horse looming in the 'Cat camp is a junior fullback by the name of Mike Roach, who has shown the past two weeks that when he runs hard he is a veritable battering ram. Although he is not exceptionally large (5'10", 176 pounds) he shows no fear and runs both over and around his opponents.

Kerry Parkinson, a 6'0" 180 pound halfback, has also shown

the same running spirit. Dennis Moore, a 145 pound half, has shown well in drills and appears as the Panthers' best man for moving outside. He has the ability to turn the corner.

Though in his first year in varsity ball, Paul Harvey has been developing rapidly as a quarterback. He saw considerable experience last year at the field general's position on the JV's, but is shy of varsity-calibre experience. Savage said of Harvey, "he's a real comer... he does especially well in his fakes in our belly series."

Unfortunately for perhaps fortunately the Panthers are not commencing their 1963 campaign with a patcy. Coming to town for Redmond's initial encounter is potent Mac Hi of Milton-Freewater. Most of the efforts in the Panther camp from this point on will be pointed specifically towards

that game. Savage disclosed that the 'Cats will taper off slightly on heavy contact in efforts to sharpen the team's movements.

It could be a building year for the Panthers. There looms on the horizon a good ninth grade crop of footballers. They were undefeated last year as eighth graders.

As to the Mac Hi game, Savage said that he and his coaches feel some advantage playing the opener at home. Mac Hi has a spirited bunch and they were second last year in the eastern division.
