## Municipal court cases reported

## Klamath man is exonerated

A Klamath Falls man was exonerated, when a criminal case was dismissed by Circuit Judge Robert H. Foley Monday afternoon, on motion of the defendant's attorney.

William J. Easter, Klamath Falls, had been charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, by making a claim for fire loss of a davenport which it was alleged he did not own. In granting the motion for dismissal, Judge Foley concurred with the defendant that the State failed to prove Easter had no ownership.

The case was transferred here from Klamath county by change of venue. The jury of eight women and four men, which was drawn Monday morning, was dismissed.

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## Willamette Valley storm leaves trail of fires, power outages, minor damage

Thunderstorms preceded by high winds moved up the Willamette Valley and through the Portland area Monday night and early today, leaving a trail of fires, scattered power outages and some other minor damage.

The storm hit at Eugene about 6 p.m. and reached Portland an hour later. Heavy showers continued through the night.

Wind gusts reached 51 miles an hour at the Portland airport and unofficially registered as high as 62 in downtown areas.

Power outages were reported around Eugene, Albany and Portland. Lightning knocked out several Pacific Power and Light Co. lines in the Albany area and Pacific Northwest Telephone Co. reported about 1,000 customers in that area were without phone service Monday night. Service was expected to be restored today.

**Portland Lines Down**

Portland General Electric Co. called out all its emergency crews in Portland and numerous small outages were called in. About 3,300 customers were without power but most lines were repaired by midnight.

The 7,334-ton freighter Lisa B. broke loose from her moorings at Swan Island in Portland and ran aground on a mud flat. She was pulled free by tugs and held offshore through the night before being returned to her moorings this morning.

A log station, composed of about 10 log rafts also broke loose and drifted out into the Willamette River channel in Portland. Shaver Transportation Co. tugs and harbor patrol craft rounded them up.

The wind also capsized two sailboats near Ross Island in Portland.

**State Reports 88 Fires**

State forestry officials reported 88 fires burning on state-protected lands by 7 p.m. Monday. They estimated "many more" would be discovered today. Most of the lightning-caused blazes were small and were put out quickly.

There was no immediate estimate from U.S. Forest Service officials, but they had warned earlier in the day that soaring temperatures, the threat of lightning and the presence of hunters in the forests posed an extreme danger.

Winds preceding the storm were blamed for a fire which burned two homes and about 12 acres of grass and brush near Medford. The winds apparently scattered sparks from a trash fire.

Destroyed were the homes of Albert C. Garrison and Lottay Fellows, just east of the Medford city limits.

Portland firemen battled a sawdust fire at the Portland Lumber Co. and several smaller blazes touched off by falling power lines and blowing sparks.

**Airline Flights Disrupted**

Several airline flight to Portland International Airport were routed to Seattle or delayed. One Portland to San Francisco flight was delayed 45 minutes.

Temperatures Monday ranged from Portland's 89 to Medford's 102 in interior Western Oregon. The weather bureau said the heat, combined with moist upper level air brought in a low pressure area off the California coast, caused the storm.

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## Bibeau receives 12-year term

MEDFORD (UPI) — Harold James Bibeau, a 21-year-old soldier stationed at Ft. Gordon, Ga., Monday was sentenced to 12 years in the Oregon Penitentiary for voluntary manslaughter.

Bibeau pleaded guilty last month to the charge, which was reduced from first degree murder. He was accused of the slaying of Ashland theater manager Russell Waldon Osborn, 49, who was strangled and shot at his Ashland home April 27.

Circuit Judge Edward C. Kelly sentenced the soldier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Bibeau of Empire, after hearing 16 witnesses testify for the defendant and one for the state in the sentencing procedure.

Bibeau was arrested in Portland by state police the same day as the slaying. He was driving Osborn's car.

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## Job openings noted by Price

Fifty-one non farm job openings await applicants at the Bend office of the Oregon Employment Service, Clark A. Price, manager, reported today.

Jobs listed with the OES but unfilled at the end of August covered a wide field, ranging from a receptionist to fry cooks. Two secretaries are needed, and an unfilled teller's job pays \$75 a week. Also on the list of unfilled positions are cooks, collectors and salesmen. A dietitian is needed, and so are four waitresses.

Also sought are two teachers, a "cat skinner," a hotel manager and several housekeepers. A routeman, a rodmann and a yardman are also needed.

Price said the job openings cover much of Central Oregon, but most are in Bend. An electrical repairman is needed at Gilchrist, a service station attendant at Riley.

"Men and women living in Central Oregon are needed at once to fill these jobs," Price said. He suggested that interested persons get in touch with the Bend OES office, on Bond Street, as soon as possible.

Price said Central Oregon employees are now waiting to pay a total of \$2,490 a week to 51 persons capable of filling the jobs—but the jobs go begging.

A full list of job openings is available for inspection at the OES office.

Despite these job openings, there are an estimated 1,000 persons unemployed in the Central Oregon area as compared with 1,200 a month ago and 1,000 a year ago.

August, Price said, was an excellent non-farm employment month.

## Man in street wants state to live within its income

(Editors Note: State officials warn referral of the legislature's \$40 million tax bill will lead to fiscal disaster. Many voters feel the state should live within its present income. This is the first of a series on the issues involved.)

SALEM (UPI) —The taxpayers are in revolt. They've referred the 1963 legislature's \$40 million revenue increase measure to a special election.

The man on the street seems to feel it's time the state government lived within its income.

The average taxpayer has been plucked by federal taxes, rubbed raw by property taxes, and now he's annoyed at state taxes.

State officials were astounded at the speed with which signatures were obtained on petitions to refer the tax bill to a special election Oct. 15.

**Signature Come Rapidly**

More than 35,000 valid signatures were obtained in a couple of weeks—twice as many as were needed to call the special election. The spectacular success of the referendum drive is all the more astounding because there was no real organized effort to get the signatures.

J. Francis Howard, the weekly newspaper editor who spearheaded the effort, candidly admitted "we had the most unorganized organization you ever heard of."

State officials were stunned at Howard's success.

They knew a tax increase measure would not be popular, but they were not prepared for such an emphatic public reaction.

Sen. Ward Cook, D-Portland, co-chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, termed it a "tax revolt."

**Teachers Signed**

When one official checked some of the petitions and found they had been signed by school teachers and school district officials, he commented "I had no idea how serious the situation had become. I think a lot of state officials have to take a hard look at this whole issue."

The fact is, a lot of the state's responsible leaders are scared. They predict privately that the tax measure will go down to defeat.

## Consolidation plan discussed

**SISTERS — Proposed consolidation of the Sisters School District with the Bend Administrative District was discussed again at a meeting of the Sisters School Board Monday night.**

Seven men and six women, representing opposition to the proposal, attended. Five children also were present. All members of the school board, except one, attended.

Arguments similar to those presented at an earlier public meeting, by persons opposed to the consolidation, were given. From that consolidation with any other district would cause Sisters to lose its high school was the principal objection. The belief that the tax picture for Sisters might show additional improvement in the future was also cited.

The school board went on record some time ago as favoring consolidation. Petitions to the Boundary Board, requesting consolidation, are still in circulation and now have 42 signatures, it was reported.

It was indicated that petition will not be presented until adequate time is given for all aspects of the problem to be examined.

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
