Thorough probe promised in abortive Brazil revolt

BRASILIA (UPI)—Military authorities today demanded "rigorous punishment" of the 600 enlisted Marines, soldiers and airmen who took part in Thursday's abortive revolt.

Air Minister Anisio Botelho promised a thorough investigation of the part his men played in the short-lived uprising. He said the air force was "completely calm" today.

There was no report of disorders in Brasilia or Rio de Janeiro, and a presidential spokesman said "absolute calm reigns throughout the nation."

War Minister Jair Dantas Ribeiro, whose troops crushed the revolt, ended the army-wide alert he ordered Thursday, but left five tanks in position outside the War Ministry in Rio as a "security measure."

Maj. Gen. Nicolau Fico, the military commander in Brasilia, issued a statement saying "many minors were caught carrying arms during the unsuccessful rebellion," and it appeared some of them might have taken part in the revolt.

President Joao Goulart conferred with top officials today about the reasons for and means of dealing with the abortive revolt.

Goulart flew in Thursday night from the southern provincial cap-

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New Fort Rock park drawing many visitors

FORT ROCK — Use of the new Fort Rock State Park is considerably greater than expected, according to Alva Zimmerman, State District Park Supervisor, Bend. This is the word brought to the Fort Rock Grange by Bud Parks, a member of the Outdoor Recreation Committee of the fraternal organization.

The increase is due to better signs at the Highway 31 junction and intersections along the way, Zimmerman noted. The park is still too new to be listed in the current state park descriptive brochure. The 190 acre park has as its attraction a semi-circular lava flow or crater remnant towering some 350 feet above the surrounding level plain.

Some Russian Olive trees have been set out recently and more will be put out when the season is more favorable for transplanting. This variety is hardy and drought resisting.

Harvey Heare and George Hayes of the State Parks staff in Bend planted the trees and make regular trips to the site for clean-up. Recent maintenance included removing a group of large yellow targets which someone had painted on the rocks. The park crew painted over the yellow with a shade that blended with the rock.

Providing water for campers and picnickers as well as for a limited amount of landscaping at the site is the prime need now, Grange members feel. Water from wells is available at a low lift in this area and electric power lines are close by. Fort Rock village does not now have water available at a store or service station and campers are reluctant to go to private homes to ask for water. Park crews have been hauling water for the trees from the Fort Rock School.

Plane reported down, carried Oregon man

MANILA (UPI)—A light plane lost with an American mining official and three Filipinos aboard was believed today to have crashed in Zambales province, about 100 miles northwest of here.

The American passenger of the two-engine Piper Aztec-B plane, owned by the Acoje Mining Co. of the Philippines, was Lynthon W. Shaner of Astoria, Ore. Shaner is Acoje's vice president of operations.

Farmers in Lawis Village, about 10 miles from the Acoje airstrip in Zambales, reported that they heard an explosion about 1 p.m. Wednesday.

The U.S. Coast Guard's Loran station in Naulo Point, also in Zambales, reported hearing an explosion at about the same time.

The plane, which had a capacity of six passengers and a maximum speed of 225 miles an hour, was on a flight from Manila to the Acoje mines to deliver an \$18,300 payroll.

With Shaner on the plane were Capt. Jose Salandanan, pilot; Attorney Roman Pacia, the mine's legal counsellor and personnel director, and Capt. Amada de Castro, the mine's security officer.

Benson gets time to make appeal

NEWPORT (UPI) — Former North Lincoln Justice of the Peace Lennart Benson Thursday won time to make his third appeal to the State Supreme Court from a two-count forgery conviction.

Lincoln County Circuit Judge Stewart Weiss postponed execution of the sentence against Benson, who received two concurrent three-year terms in the State Prison.

Weiss' decision came after Portland attorney Howard Lonergan entered the case. The stay was based on a statement that the third appeal would be on grounds not raised previously. Lonergan was not available for comment today.

Benson is free pending results of the appeal. He was convicted in July, 1962.
