

Highlights of the Week

Teddy was man of few words for ninety minutes this week

Sen. Edward (Ted) Kennedy of Massachusetts is known as a good talker but for 90 minutes this week he was a man of few words.

It's not that the President's youngest brother didn't have anything to say. He preferred to listen.

It happened in Belgrade, where Kennedy is attending a conference of the Inter-Parliamentary Union. Also attending was Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu, the first lady of South Viet Nam.

President Criticized
Shortly after her arrival in Belgrade, Mme. Nhu, who is the sister-in-law of South Viet Nam's president, criticized President Kennedy as an "appeaser" because of his role in trying to end the crisis between Buddhists and officials of her country.

During the week it was reported that Henry Cabot Lodge, ambassador to Saigon, has suggested to South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem that he remove his brother, Mme. Nhu's husband, from a place of power. Nhu has been blamed for the Diem regime's harsh action against the Buddhists, who claimed they were

victims of religious persecution. Because of the friction between the Kennedy Administration and the Diem Government, the President's brother had attempted to avoid what might have been an embarrassing encounter with Mme. Nhu in Belgrade.

But Rep. Kathryn St. George, a New York Republican also attending the Belgrade conference, had a woman-to-woman chat with Mme. Nhu. Then she brought Mme. Nhu and the senator together.

A Woman's Perspective
When they sat down to lunch, Mme. Nhu began talking in French-accented English, telling her side of the story. She spoke rapidly and Kennedy didn't get a chance to say much.

"She wanted to talk to me," Kennedy said afterward. "She wants to talk to anyone and everybody."

"She's quite a gal," Rep. St. George said. "She did not stop talking from one minute to the other."

In Saigon, the Diem regime began seizing several critics who might act against his government should a coup d'etat be attempted.

Around the world around the clock:
Washington—A hearing by the House Un-American Activities Committee of the unauthorized trip of American students to Cuba was punctuated with disorder. Supporters of the students were ejected from the hearing room for disorderly behavior and there was considerable scuffling between sympathizers and the police on the outside. Five persons were jailed.

Alabama—President Kennedy federalized the National Guard in Alabama to enforce court-ordered integration of schools in Birmingham, Tuskegee and Mobile. But many white students boycotted classes and there was some talk about setting up private schools for those who do not wish to attend classes with Negroes.

Moscow-Peking—In Moscow the Soviet Government ordered service stopped on a train from Peking because it was bringing anti-Khrushchev pamphlets into the Soviet Union. In Peking the Mao regime charged the Soviet Union with "hoiologism" for allegedly mistreating Chinese near the border. A bitter blast by Red China against Khrushchev all but cut diplomatic relations between the two Communist countries.

Washington—The Senate began debate on whether to ratify the partial nuclear test ban treaty. Sens. Barry Goldwater, John Stennis and Richard B. Russell said they would vote against it but Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen came out for it. On Friday the United States conducted underground tests in Nevada. One was so powerful it shook buildings in Las Vegas. Underground tests would be permitted by the treaty.

Ship's baggage master missing

VANCOUVER, B.C. (UPI)—The passenger ship Oronsky was scheduled to arrive here tonight minus its baggage master, Hugh H. Graham, who is believed to have fallen overboard while the ship was about 500 miles off the coast of Oregon.

Graham, from Aberdeen, Scotland, was last seen on the British ship, which is operated by the P and O Orient Line, at breakfast Friday about 8 a.m. He did not report for work an hour later.

When it was discovered he was missing, the ship reversed its course and searched until 1:30 p.m. Friday. Finding nothing, it resumed its course for Vancouver and was scheduled to arrive here at 10:30 p.m. tonight, five hours later than its original arrival time. The ship was due to sail on to Seattle Sunday night, arriving at 8 a.m. Monday.

Other ships in the area were alerted to search for Graham, who was unable to swim. Planes from the aircraft carrier USS Hornet joined in the search but found no trace.

Shepard takes COC position

Clay C. Shepard, assistant professor of speech at Portland State College who has been appointed to a similar position at Central Oregon College, is also to serve as news coordinator for the college, President Don P. Pence has announced.

"He will be charged with the responsibility of processing college news stories from the various departments and disseminating the information to the various news media, both locally and to the metropolitan papers," Pence said.

Shepard has been professor of speech at Portland State College for the past four years, and prior to that taught courses in speech, drama, English and journalism at Lake Oswego High School, Sutherlin and Seio Union High Schools. He has his bachelor of arts degree in speech and English from Linfield College and his master of arts in speech from the University of Oregon.

"In a sense, Mr. Shepard is just returning home to Central Oregon," Pence said, adding: "He is a graduate of Redmond Union High School, class of 1945, and was born and raised in the Tumalo area community. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Shepard, Bend."

Shepard will move his wife, Louise, daughters Margaret, 9; Gail, 4, and Jan, 3, and son Curtis, 7, to Bend as soon as housing can be found.

Shepard is a member of the Speech Association of America, the Oregon Speech Association, the American Association of University Professors, and Pi Kappa Delta, a national speech honorary. He was president of Pi Kappa Delta at Linfield.

Insurance code revision urged
PORTLAND (UPI)—Lewis Fox, a former president of the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents, said Friday that revisions were needed in the state's insurance code.

He testified at a hearing before the Legislative Interim Committee on Insurance.

"We are one state in the union that retains an archaic, costly and cumbersome system of rating and marketing property and casualty insurance," Fox said.

Rep. Shirley Field, R-Portland, also testified and called for strengthening of insurance laws and tighter enforcement of laws already on the books to avoid possible abuses.

Yturri planning sales tax bid
ONTARIO (UPI)—Oregon State Sen. Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario, says he will propose that Idaho and Oregon tax authorities and legislators meet to prepare sales tax legislation for introduction in 1965.

Yturri said he favored simultaneous introduction of such legislation at the next regular sessions of the legislatures. He said both states have high rate income taxes and that the subordinate units of government are "fighting like vultures" over property tax levies.

German sailor rescued after Atlantic ordeal

NEW YORK (UPI)—"Something white" in the waves, Frans Maria Starcharczyk's waving undershirt, caught the eye of a searcher on the Coast Guard cutter Absecon. The German sailor had spent 15 hours, most of them nude, in the stormy mid-Atlantic.

The survival was termed "miraculous" in itself, but the plucky 26-year-old seaman, third engineer of the freighter Freiburg, still had enough energy to clamber up a cargo net of the Absecon. Then he collapsed.

It was 10 p.m. EDT Thursday, and the Freiburg was 810 miles northeast of Bermuda, when Starcharczyk stroled on deck to take a breather from a poker game. He was clad only in the shirt and undershorts.

The ship suddenly pitched in heavy seas and Starcharczyk plummeted overboard in the darkness. No one knew he was gone, and his freighter steamed on.

Today he said: "I think the 12th was my unlucky day because I lost all my money playing poker and fell over the side, but Friday the 13th was my lucky day because you (the Coast Guard) picked me up."

Credits Stamina
Cmdr. Jack E. Forrester, commanding officer of the Absecon, discounted luck. Starcharczyk's "stamina and presence of mind" were mainly responsible, he said. The sailor had no life preserver.

The husky bachelor, an excellent swimmer, told his rescuers he conserved energy by doing "very little swimming." Aside from sunburn and salt exposure, his condition was described as "excellent."

But harrowing moments filled the 15-hour ordeal, lasting through Thursday night and part of Friday. Turbulent waves and 30-mile-an-hour winds lashed the man. He became frightened and, he told rescuers, prayed liberally.

"The pilot fish began to snap at my underwear," he said. "So I took it off. This gave them only bare skin to snap at." He kept the undershirt, to signal.

Thought Of Suicide
"I was afraid the pilot fish would bring sharks, and I thought about suicide. I thought about choking myself with the underwear but this would be too slow. Then I thought maybe I would bite my wrist vein . . . but then I just swam and swam . . .

"I thought the sharks would come any time."

Starcharczyk's absence was discovered on the Freiburg at midnight Thursday, when he was scheduled to go on a work shift. The "man overboard" signal went out on the radio and the freighter reversed its course to search for him.

About 2 a.m. the Freiburg passed Starcharczyk in the darkness. "I shouted and shouted but she went away," he said. The Absecon, 120 miles away, steamed to the scene and arrived at 7 a.m. The Freiburg then left.

It was 12:04 p.m. Friday when the Absecon sighted the frantically waving undershirt in the waves. Two minutes later Starcharczyk was aboard. Early today the Absecon rendezvoused with the Freiburg and returned his man.

The freighter, a Hamburg-American Line ship, then resumed its journey, from Tampico, Mexico to Antwerp, Belgium.

AMA president notes dangers from smoking

PORTLAND (UPI)—Dr. Edward R. Annis, president of the American Medical Association, was in Portland Friday, spoke at four meetings, made television and radio appearances and greeted incoming freshmen at the University of Oregon Medical School.

Dr. Annis, of Miami, Fla., told a labor meeting there is no successful method of filtering cigarette smoke, that 100 persons a day die needlessly of lung cancer, and that the body's healing power can diminish the danger for those who stop smoking.

He scored the controversial Medicare proposals recently considered by Congress and said the politicians had not once consulted the scientists and physicians who make good medicine possible.

Inspections due in Antarctica

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States, in an unprecedented move, will inspect the Antarctic bases of the Soviet Union and half a dozen other nations to make sure they are of a peaceful nature.

State Department officials here could recall no previous instance of U. S. inspection of a Russian installation. They declined to say whether any objections to the coming action had been received.

Officials said the inspection was not the result of any suspicion that the Russians, or any other nation maintaining an Antarctic base, had violated a treaty provision calling only for peaceful operations in the south polar region sometimes known as "Little America."

The inspection will be carried out under terms of an Antarctic treaty signed by 12 nations, including Russia and the United States, in 1959. The pact gives signatories the right to conduct such inspections if they see fit.

The treaty, which stipulates that Antarctica "shall be used for peaceful purposes only," was one of the first involving the United States and Russia since the start of the cold war. It was the first international treaty providing for inspection, which is the key stumbling block in disarmament negotiations.

The State Department said in announcing the inspection that the action was "not based on any anticipation that there have been treaty violations by a signatory power." Officials said the principal purpose was to exercise the right of inspection in order to establish a precedent for such action.

Special teams will conduct the inspections during the Antarctic summer season, from November through March, the State Department said.

Lusby hearing due next Friday

OREGON CITY (UPI)—Circuit Judge Howard Blanding Friday scheduled a juvenile court hearing for James Allen Lusby, 16, Oregon City, for next Friday.

Lusby and Thomas Leslie Brown, 16, Milwaukie, were arrested following a wild shooting spree and police chase in Clackamas County Tuesday.

Civil rights demonstrators stage housing march in Gary, Ind., hunger strike in Los Angeles

Civil rights demonstrators staged a mass "housing march" through the streets of Gary, Ind., and a hunger strike at Los Angeles, Calif., today to highlight integration activities across the North.

The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., whose president, Dr. J. H. Jackson, has been criticized by integrationists as an "Uncle Tom," issued a call for "new Christian militancy" in the struggle for equal opportunity.

Negro comedian Dick Gregory was scheduled to lead an estimated 10,000 marchers through Indiana's steel city in protest of the city council's "unreasonable" stand on proposed anti-discrimination ordinances, which have been defeated twice.

About 20 civil rights organizations were expected to participate.

Six members of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), including one Negro woman, continued a hunger strike, sit-in demonstration today at the Los Angeles school board administration building.

A CORE spokesman said the demonstration, which began Friday, would continue until the school board agreed to abolish alleged school segregation.

Most of the sit-inners were college and university students. The National Baptist Convention

vention, in an "official message" printed in newspapers across the North today, said the answer to the civil rights struggle was "more freedom."

The Baptists urged Negroes, however, "to keep the struggle in the framework of law and order" and to "make full use of the conference method in negotiating differences."

Integrationists, the message said, must "seek always to carry on the struggle for civil rights according to the highest laws of the land and in harmony with the

American ideals of freedom and democracy."

In other racial activity north of Dixie:
—Fourteen demonstrators were arrested at Syracuse, N.Y., for protesting alleged racial discrimination in housing at an urban renewal construction site Friday and six were kept overnight in jail.

—About 75 Negroes, led by a white paraplegic, staged business-disrupting marches at city hall and supermarkets at East St. Louis, Ill., in protest of alleged discriminatory hiring practices.

—The United Negro College Fund of Pittsburgh called off plans to picket Equitable Gas Company's Pittsburgh offices Monday following an agreement Friday night which committed the firm to "providing more job opportunities for qualified Negroes."

—The Teachers Union House of Representatives voted 190-1 Friday to support a white principal of a predominantly Negro school who has been under fire from integrationists for alleged brutality.

—The executive director of the National Catholic Conference for Interracial Justice warned Friday against "popular referendums" on civil rights issues. "Human rights cannot be made an issue of popular will," Matthew Ahmann said at Chicago.

—Mayors from several Michigan cities met in closed session at Lansing Friday to discuss racial problems confronting their communities.

—The Chamber of Commerce at Grand Rapids, Mich., attacked "unwarranted job discrimination" Friday and urged businessmen to hire qualified Negroes.

JFK to make two stops in Oregon

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy will make two stops in Oregon Sept. 27, the White House has announced.

The President will visit Astoria at 1:05 p.m. from Tacoma, Wash., and is expected to visit the abandoned Tongue Point Naval Base.

He will visit Portland, with arrival time scheduled at 1:55 p.m. A motor caravan is to conduct him to the city center from Portland International Airport. He is to dedicate Northwest Towers, a public housing project for the elderly.

The President is scheduled to leave Portland at 4 a.m. for San Francisco.

The chief executive's schedule for the Northwest indicated he will fly to Larson Air Force Base, Moses Lake, Wash., from Montana on Thursday, Sept. 26 and then by helicopter to the Hanford Atomic Energy Works near Richland, Wash., to dedicate the world's largest atomic power plant.

His party will arrive at Seattle-Tacoma Airport about noon Friday after a trip to Salt Lake City for an address.

Following his address in Tacoma he is to fly to Astoria.

Sens. Maurine Neuberger and Wayne Morse and Reps. Edith Green and Al Ullman, all of Oregon, are to join the presidential party during the Oregon visit.
