

Japan, Canada, U.S. discuss fish problems

TOKYO (UPI)—Japan discussed with Canada and the United States today the problem of fishing in waters of the North Pacific.

The long dispute took up where negotiations in Washington broke off in disagreement last spring. The North Americans aim to retain an abstinence-principle clause of a three-party North Pacific fisheries convention which expired last June.

The United States, seconded by Canada, maintains the clause is essential for conservation of fishery resources.

Japan holds that the clause is merely a guise, without scientific support, to give exclusive fishing rights in certain North Pacific waters to the North Americans.

Canada and the U.S. pushed by their fishermen's unions and private fishing firms, show no signs of giving in.

Neither does Japan, whose fishing fleets roam the world to help feed its island people. Politicians and influential journals have closed ranks to urge Japan to stick to its guns.

The fishery dispute threatens to hurt relations between the North American neighbors and their trading ally in the Far East.

The bogeyman is Russia, which, fishing the North Pacific and the North Atlantic at will with huge fleets and mass-production methods, does not recognize fishing pacts.

Canadian Fisheries Minister H. J. Robichau said Canada could not meet Japan's wish to kill the abstinence principle because of "realities" at home.

A nine-member U.S. delegation, headed by former U.S. Senator Benjamin A. Smith was here.

They are backed by President Kennedy's statement last week that he favored retention of the abstinence principle in the fishing pact.

National Guard officers named

PORTLAND (UPI)—Col. Staryl C. Austin Jr. of Salem was elected president of the National Guard Association of Oregon at the organization's 36th general conference here Saturday.

He succeeds Col. Laurence M. Blaisdell of Salem. Col. William B. Foster of McMinnville and Lt. Col. James C. Wilson of Portland were elected first and second vice presidents, respectively.

Maj. Gen. William H. Harrison Jr. of Boston, president of the National Guard Association of the U.S., was the featured speaker at the one-day meeting.

He said the National Guard should maintain a force of 400,000 men in order to achieve its mission as designed by the Defense Department.

Oregon AFL-CIO session opens

EUGENE (UPI)—Taxes and workmen's compensation benefits were two of the principal items on the agenda when the Oregon AFL-CIO opened its annual convention here today.

A move was expected favoring an initiative measure increasing workmen's compensation benefits on the November, 1964, election ballot. An amendment to ban private insurance firms from participating in the program also was under consideration.

The 1963 legislature's tax program and the Oct. 15 referendum also were certain to come up for discussion. Some labor leaders have said they do not like the tax program, but are afraid a special session would result in a worse bill.

A resolution that would move the AFL-CIO state headquarters from Portland to Salem also has been prepared for introduction.

The convention runs through Friday.

More hearings set at Seaside

SEASIDE (UPI)—Municipal Judge John Black Friday scheduled more hearings for next Wednesday and Friday for youths involved in Labor Day holiday weekend rioting here.

He also set trials to start Sept. 23.

Judge Black was scheduled to hold hearings for several youths Friday but postponed them due to the difficulty of some of the defendants to get to Seaside.

3rd pachyderm birth recorded at Portland zoo

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Portland Zoo's prolific elephant herd produced its third baby pachyderm in the past year and a half Sunday afternoon.

Pet unceremoniously gave birth to a bouncing boy—alone and unattended except for Belle, another female elephant, who hovered around helpfully.

It was a sharp contrast to the birth of Packy to Belle April 14 last year when reporters and photographers lived in the elephant house and Zoo Director Jack Marks fainted when it was all over.

Packy, a boy, was the first elephant born in the nation in more than 43 years.

Rosy delivered a girl named Me Tu last Oct. 3.

Born At 4:50 P.M.

The birth to Pet, an 8-year-old Asian elephant and the youngest of four mates to Thonglaw, occurred in the glassed-in display room of the zoo's elephant house at about 4:50 p.m.

Marks was at the zoo but veterinarian Matthew Maberry was at home. They immediately rushed to the new mother's side.

Morgan Berry of Seattle, an animal dealer who formerly owned Pet and Belle, had been at the zoo earlier in the day. However, he left less than two hours earlier to return to his home.

Marks called the infant "awfully small" but a "beautiful baby."

He estimated his weight at between 100 and 135 pounds. Packy weighed 225 pounds at birth and Me Tu was 182.

Pet's delivery leaves only Tui Hoo (pronounced Tee-Wah) expecting at the zoo.

Verdict goes against Oden

GRANTS PASS (UPI)—A Circuit Court jury here late Saturday night found Gerald Richard Oden, 25, Wolf Creek, guilty of voluntary manslaughter.

Oden and Norman Stewart Thomas, 22, Grants Pass, were indicted on charges of first degree murder in connection with the fatal beating of Lloyd Miles Harper, 48, Grants Pass, near Grants Pass July 12.

The jury in the week-long trial deliberated about five hours before returning its verdict.

Circuit Judge Orval Millard scheduled sentencing for next Monday.

Thomas' trial will begin Tuesday.
