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Man declared dead 3rd time at La Grande

LA GRANDE (UPI) — A 58-year-old La Grande man was pronounced dead for the third time at the Grande Ronde Hospital here at 5:20 a.m. today.

Rice McHaley's breathing stopped twice after apparent heart attacks over the weekend and was restored by prompt use of a cardiac defibrillator.

Dr. William Kubler, McHaley's physician, said this morning that following a third attack, doctors were unable to record any heart movement, even with the aid of a cardiac monitor.

McHaley collapsed in downtown La Grande Friday and was given mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and external heart massage by local citizens until he was taken to the hospital where the defibrillator restored a steady beat.

McHaley had been pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital before the defibrillator was used. Union County Medical examiner Jay Randal Sloop said the patient had no blood pressure and had ceased to breathe. With the defibrillator 440 volts were injected into the man's body and steady breathing was restored.

At approximately 9 a.m. Sunday McHaley's heart began to flutter and again regular beating stopped. For the second time the defibrillator was able to restore his heart to a steady rhythmic beat.

Throughout the day his condition gradually worsened until this morning when he died.

Four die in collapse of ferris wheel

TIJUANA, Mexico (UPI) — A ferris wheel loaded to capacity collapsed Sunday night in the midst of a milling crowd of about 800 celebrating Mexico's Independence Day, claiming the lives of four persons including a pregnant woman and her unborn child.

At least 16 others were injured in the accident at the scene of a traveling carnival on a dirt lot near the bridge just across the international border from California. All of the dead were women and citizens of Mexico.

Doctors performed a Caesarian section on the seventh-months pregnant woman, but both she and the unborn baby died.

The district attorney's office here said about 60 persons were on the wheel when it collapsed while in operation.

One of the cars on the wheel apparently broke loose and fell, hitting another car below and unbalancing the wheel so that it tipped on its axle. The supports holding it collapsed and the wheel crumpled and fell on its side.

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Group makes 'dry camp' at cavern

Oregon Museum of Science and Industry members on a cave outing over the weekend made a "dry camp" at the Lavae Cavern which proved to be somewhat damp.

Heavy rain fell through most of the night.

Taking part in the trip were about 60 OMSI members, mostly in family units, with James O. Anderson, Jr., formerly of Bend and now OMSI naturalist, in charge. The stop at the cave had been listed as a "dry camp," because there are no springs or other water in the area.

Virtually all members of the big group had tents, and spent the camp night in comfort. Joe Stenkamp from the Fort Rock District Office, was guide on the trip to Lavae Cavern.

Because of the damp weather, Anderson changed his Sunday schedule and visits to other caves of the area were not made. However, the group stopped at the Reuben Long ranch to view artifacts, and looked over the Fort Rock formation and Hole-in-the-Ground.

Zone hearings set by planners

Public hearings for discussion of two proposed amendments to zoning ordinances will be conducted by the Bend Planning Commission during a 7:30 meeting tonight in the City Hall Commission room.

One amendment permits inclusion of printing, lithograph and publishing firms in C-1, 2, 3 and 4 (commercial) zones. The other allows construction of other multiple dwellings in any district from which they are prohibited, in cases where their existence is considered beneficial to the city.

ASSAULTS DE GAULLE

TARBES, France (UPI) — French Communist party chief Jacques Duclos said Sunday night that President Charles de Gaulle's resistance to lessening of East-West tensions is "unfortunately identical with that of China."

Addressing a crowd at a party fete, Duclos said great progress has been achieved toward forming a united front with French Socialists to overthrow the Gaullist regime.

Viet Nam lifts martial law

SAIGON (UPI) — President Ngo Dinh Diem lifted martial law throughout South Viet Nam today, but heavily armed troops and police continued to occupy strategic points in Saigon, including the streets around the American Embassy.

In addition to ending martial law regulations imposed last month at the time of the government crackdown on Buddhists, the president also ended press censorship.

Observers, however, expected that presidential action to have little effect on the tense international situation in Viet Nam. Heavy government security measures and the arrest of dissident elements in the country were expected to continue.

SAIGON remained a tense and uneasy city today although the surface situation appeared calm. Hundreds of heavily armed troops and police still occupied the central market and streets around government buildings and the American Embassy.

Fire engines also stood in the central market all day.

The heavy patrolling around the National Assembly and the American Embassy was thought to be an effort to prevent any further public anti-government demonstrations.

Prior to today's decree, press censorship had hampered the flow of news from South Viet Nam since Aug. 21, when Diem's forces raised Buddhist pagodas.

CONFERENCE ON EXPORTS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Commerce Department reports that more than 200 businessmen have accepted President Kennedy's invitation to attend a two-day White House conference on export expansion, beginning Tuesday.

The President will address the group along with Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon, Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges and Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

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
