

Zone ordinance readings given at meeting of City Commission

Two zone ordinance readings and two decisions on requests for property purchases comprised official business during last night's Bend City Commission meeting.

Given second reading was an amendment to an ordinance changing from single to multiple-family dwelling zone a tract lying between Burnside and Alden avenues, and E. Fifth and Sixth streets. Also read for the second time was an amendment that permits inclusion of drive-in restaurants in a C-2 (commercial catering to tourists) zone.

Concerning requests for purchase of city-owned property, the board put a price on one lot and elected to retain the other. Priced at \$750 is a lot lying between Sissone Street and a canal, north of Roosevelt. Another lot, between Lytle and E. Second streets and Quimby and Revere avenues, is in an industrial zone and was considered of potential value by commissioners.

In other business, the board heard a letter stating reasons why West Coast Airline schedules have been sporadic in recent months. Rupert Parks, West Coast vice president, explained his company has been forced to give priority to maintenance of aircraft in order to sustain maximum safety standards. Parks, in his reply to

a complaint from Redmond City Attorney Thomas Crossen, stressed that West Coast's service problems are not by design, and that the airlines hopes to continue and expand its service here. A visitor, David Niskanen, asked commission help in cleaning up the "hobo jungle" area which abuts the Oregon Trail Box factory. Niskanen, company superintendent, said that transients who inhabit the area present dangerous hazards to fire and health safety.

Job placement office opened at Redmond

The Bend office of the Oregon State Employment Service has established a job placement office for the potato harvest in Redmond, to operate until Nov. 1. An office at Madras was put into operation earlier.

Farmers wanting workers, and persons wanting jobs in the harvest, are to make their requests to the office in their zone as far ahead as possible, to facilitate planning. Farmers having housing available are also asked to indicate capacity of the facilities.

The zone plan has been worked out to avoid duplication of orders for workers, eliminate unnecessary dispatching and wasted wandering manpower, and save farmers and others unnecessary long distance phone calls in their area, according to Clark A. Price, manager of the Bend office.

Farmers living within a seven-mile radius of Bend, and in the Alfalfa, Tumalo and Millican districts, Deschutes county south of Bend and points intermediate, are to place their orders for workers with the Bend office of the Oregon State Employment Service, 952 Bond Street, phone 382-3611.

The Redmond office serves all farmers living in Deschutes and Crook counties (except in the Bend zone named above) and all farmers immediately north of the Crooked River Bridge. Chester W. Olson is in charge of the Redmond office; the phone number is 548-2354.

All farmers living in Jefferson County (except those immediately north of Crooked River Bridge) are to place their orders with C. Duff Young at the Madras office, phone 475-3949.
