NROTC tests to be offered

Applications are now available for the Navy's 18th annual NROTC qualification test, according to Larry Dale, counselor at Bend High School. All eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

Registrations will close November 22, and the nation-wide examination will be given December 14.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, physical examinations and other factors, over 2000 young men will be given college educations as midshipmen in NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the country. After successfully completing college degree requirements and naval science training, midshipmen become commissioned officers in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Jefferson flu outbreak noted

A noticeable outbreak of influenza in Jefferson county is indicated by the weekly communicable disease report of the Tri-County Health Department.

Jefferson county reported 25 cases of the flu, and one case of pneumonia. Reporting sources responded 100 per cent.

Deschutes county had one case of pneumonia, with 56 per cent of the sources reporting.

Crook county was disease-free, on the basis of 50 per cent reporting.

Dr. Orde Pinckney, dean of instruction at COC, will be master of ceremonies and will introduce the panel.

Anderson urges that all members of the Central Oregon Schoolmen's Association attend the meeting.

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Drastic cuts in services faced if tax bill beaten

SALEM (UPI) — Immediate drastic cuts in state service will have to be ordered if the legislature's tax bill is defeated at the Oct. 15 election, regardless of whether a special session of the legislature is called.

Freeman Holmer, director of finance and administration, told the legislative fiscal committee here today "reductions must be made if the vote on Oct. 15 is negative."

He said because part of the biennium already has passed, cutbacks would have to average about 27 per cent.

He said this means the "food for prisoners and hospital patients will be cut, the number of guards and hospital workers will be cut."

"A cut of this magnitude means dropping back to the barest minimums," he said.

He warned there could be no change in these cutbacks for as much as five months, even if a special legislative session were called and enacted new taxes, because of the possibility of any new tax bill being referred.

He said because of the attorney general's ruling that basic school could not be cut by the governor, and because certain other general fund monies cannot be slashed, only about \$244.5 million of the state's \$404 million general fund budget is subject to cuts.

He said tentative planning indicates these cutbacks would have to be made:

Grants to local schools \$1.2 million, community college support \$2 million, higher education, \$17.6 million from operations, and another \$7.4 million from construction.

Public welfare would be cut \$8.5 million, which could trigger a loss of an additional \$12 million in federal and county matching funds for a total loss of \$20 million.

Mental health institutions and clinics \$6.7 million, correctional institutions \$2.6 million, natural resource agencies \$1.9 million, and other general fund operating appropriations \$8 million.

The state provides the services of a consultant in alcohol education to schools in Oregon when ever requested, to give teenagers the opportunity to develop understanding attitudes toward problems of alcohol and alcoholism.

Hugh Hartman, superintendent of the Redmond elementary school district, made the John Tuck School facilities available for the meeting.

Freeway route draws protest
LAKE OSWEGO (UPI) — Local residents turned out Thursday night to protest a proposed freeway route through this community.

Some 850 persons jammed the cafeteria of the junior high school. Four persons, including a Chamber of Commerce spokesman, favored one of two proposed routes, while 31 opposed it.

Mayor George Thorans said the City Council will meet next week to make a decision. He said he had assurance of the highway commission that no freeway would enter Lake Oswego if the council opposes.

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Oregon Trail marker found

LA GRANDE (UPI) — Two surveyors have discovered an old carved stone which apparently marked a branch of the Oregon Trail 10 miles east of here.

Stovell Weimer and Ken Kelting, employees of the Boise Cascade Corp. forestry department, found the marker while surveying ownership boundaries.

The rock, located in the middle of a field, was about three-quarters below the ground. In a smooth strip about 18 inches long and six inches high had been chiseled the words "Oregon Trail" and "1839." In the center is a pyramid-shaped object and inside that, what appears to be the outline of a horse's head.

The rock was found about 100 yards from the state's official "Emigrant Trail" location. Two trails about the width of wagon tracks and still discernable despite a covering of grass were nearby.

The Oregon Historical Society is attempting to learn whether the marking actually occurred in 1839 or later, perhaps when pioneer Ezra Meeker retraced the trail.

Workshop set for teachers

Deschutes county teachers will have the opportunity of attending a workshop on alcohol education, to be held on October 1 from 7 to 10 p.m. at the John Tuck School in Redmond, it was announced from the office of David Potter, Deschutes County superintendent of schools, today.

He said the Alcohol Studies and Rehabilitation Section, Mental Health Division, will provide the services of Gordon Raney, a state consultant in alcohol education.

Raney will assist the teachers in providing an objective, scientific approach to education about alcohol problems, using the latest study guides, reference materials, and films.

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Fire danger still great, officials say

There were no fires in Central Oregon woods today, except those in areas where slashing is being burned, but Deschutes National Forest fire control officers refuse to agree that the 1963 fire season is history.

Danger still exists, they pointed out, and this will increase if mild, drying weather continues.

Greatest danger at present, the foresters said, is that from grass fires that might start at the desert edge and sweep into the woods. The 21,000-acre Aspen Flat fire of 1959, largest ever to occur on the Deschutes forest and adjacent lands, was in the marginal timber area.

Several lookouts are still on duty, despite the heavy rains of last week, and more will go up this weekend if the present weather continues. However, forecasts indicate a storm that is now hanging off the northwestern Oregon coast may bring some scattered showers to the area by Saturday.

Unless damp weather returns, the forests will face an increased fire hazard late this month when the 1963 deer season opens, foresters say.

Women flee at Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA (UPI) — Three women, one of them tattooed on both shoulders, threatened matrons with a baseball bat and escaped from the Washington State Penitentiary Thursday night.

Warden Bob Rhay identified the three as Vivian Violet Jimmy, 22, Toppenish; Frances Mae Rowton, 24, Aure, Minn., and Shirley Ann Robinson, 20, no address given.

Rhay said the three women captured one matron as she was locking the recreation room about 8:30 p.m., took her keys and locked her in a closet.

The keys did not include any to the outside door of the women's prison building, located outside the walls of the penitentiary.

Rhay said other women prisoners pushed the emergency buzzer and another matron, assuming a fight was in progress, rushed into the building from outside.

She was met by the three women, who threatened her with the bat, then rushed out.

Neither matron was hurt.
