

Kennedy studies Birmingham racial trouble

Three separate groups met with President Kennedy in Washington today to discuss racial strife in Birmingham, Ala.

The President's first conference will be this afternoon with five white Birmingham civic leaders who are to tell him their side of the situation. Kennedy met last week with seven Birmingham Negro leaders who told him their grievances.

Later in the evening Kennedy will talk with six clergymen from Birmingham before meeting with a two-man team he appointed as his personal representatives to Birmingham. The team, former Army Secretary Kenneth Royall and ex-Army football coach Earl Blaik, will leave for Birmingham this week in an attempt to restore racial peace to the troubled city.

About 30 segregationist pickets heckled the group of civic leaders at the Birmingham airport Sunday night and City Councilman Don Hawkins had to be restrained from fighting one of the pickets.

A federal grand jury resumes its meeting in Birmingham today and possibly will report its findings on an investigation of interference with federal court-ordered desegregation of Birmingham schools.

Elsewhere in the nation: Birmingham: West End Parents for Private Schools Inc., a group set up to prove segregated classrooms for students of newly integrated West End High School, announced Sunday it has started a fund drive.

Tuskegee, Ala.: The Macon County Private School Foundation ran advertisements Sunday in several leading Alabama newspapers calling for contributions to their program of setting up a private segregated school.

Montgomery, Ala.: A message condemning violence in the Alabama racial situation was read in all Methodist church pulpits in the Montgomery district at morning services Sunday.

Cincinnati, Ohio: Alabama civil rights leader Rev. Fred L. Shuttlesworth described as "inadequate and premature" Sunday a report that Birmingham, Ala., Negroes are arming themselves for a racial "showdown." The statement was made Saturday in Columbus, Ohio, by John Lewis of Atlanta, Ga., chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC).

Berkeley, Calif.: University of California officials plan to investigate charges that a Negro student was replaced as an honorary escort for a national football queen contestant by a white student.

Amityville, N. Y.: A cross was burned in front of the office of the New York State National Association for the Advancement of Colored People president early Sunday.

Washington: Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N. Y., Sunday proposed that the Senate Judiciary Committee hold a hearing on racially troubled Birmingham, Ala., as part of its study of civil rights legislation.

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Rescuers pluck 10-year-old from high ledge

AUGUSTA, Mont. (UPI) — Rescuers early today plucked a 10-year-old boy from a high ledge on a 1,500-foot rock cliff where he had perched about 18 hours.

The boy, Bruce Krummel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gill of Great Falls, was unharmed but cold, wet and scared as he was carried 125 feet down a ladder constructed at the base of the cliff.

Rescue came at 3:30 a.m. PDT. The boy had been on the cliff since about 9 a.m. Sunday. He had been camping with his parents near diversion dam in Home Gulch near Augusta.

He sat throughout the day and night 125 feet above the canyon floor on a ledge just wide enough to hold him while rescuers tried several methods of reaching him, including a helicopter, before deciding to build the ladder.

Lumber was hauled to the scene and fashioned into the ladder while searchlights beamed on the cliff and rescuers kept up a steady conversation with Bruce to keep his spirits up, especially during the frequent rain showers that fell during the night.

Bruce had thrown two jackets and a shirt from the cliff earlier yesterday to attract attention and was clad only in a t-shirt and jeans.

Solon urges action on lumber bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Maurice Neuberger, D-Ore., today urged the Senate Commerce Committee to approve legislation which would permit continued shipment of Northwest-produced lumber to Puerto Rico on foreign vessels.

Mrs. Neuberger said a total of 5,069,437 board feet of lumber was shipped to Puerto Rico after Congress last year accepted her amendment to allow suspension of Jones Act restrictions on lumber shipments there.

She said there would be such shiploads in the future only if Congress extended and made permanent the Puerto Rican amendment to the Jones act by acting favorably upon one of two bills, S. 1050 or S. 2100.

Mrs. Neuberger said S. 2100 would make permanent the Puerto Rican Jones Act amendment and that S. 1050 would do this as well as expand the exception to encompass all American ports.

She said that during the first seven months of this year, British Columbia lumber producers captured 70 per cent of United States cargo lumber markets.

"In short," she said, "the Puerto Rican amendment...has not plugged the dyke but it has helped. And if it is extended and made permanent the new Puerto Rican market for American lumber will continue to grow and flourish."

Parents of boys shipped off to Boys Town by bus located at North Bend on Saturday

NORTH BEND, Ore. (UPI) — Police Saturday located the parents of two young boys who were put on a bus for Boys Town, Neb., in Salem, Ore., last Tuesday because the family could no longer care for them.

Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Hackworth flagged down a city police car here and asked the officers' help in getting the matter straightened out.

The boys, Daniel Ray Presnell, 12, and Donald Presnell, 10, arrived in Omaha Thursday night with 90 cents, two suitcases containing their clothes, and a letter of introduction to Boys Town officials.

The mother, 32, said she went looking for the police after reading an article in a local paper. She told them she was unable to care for the boys because she had a heart condition and their stepfather was unemployed.

The couple was living in a trailer court at Charleston, near here, while Hackworth attempted to find work as a longshoreman.

He said he still was out of a job Saturday, although he had "a couple of leads."

North Bend police got in touch with Salem authorities and the mother talked with Detective Elwood Hewitt.

Hewitt said later no action would be taken against her unless an investigation by Omaha authorities warrants it. Omaha Juvenile Judge Seward Hart, who is looking into the case, dug into his own pocket Friday and bought the boys new pairs of cowboy boots.

And Msgr. Nicholas H. Wegner, director of Boys Town, said he was sure a place could be found for them.

Firemen answer six alarms

Bend firemen answered four alarms Saturday and two Sunday in one of the busiest weekends of the past year.

Largest fire was a rural blaze which burned about an acre of brush on Brooks-Scanlon property between Bend and Shevlin Park, east of the park road. Two engines with two firemen responded and the State Forest Service was notified.

Crews from Brooks-Scanlon and the Forest Service fought the blaze with booster hose, axes and shovels. It was believed caused by a careless smoker.

Two other Saturday brush fires were on property at the north end of W. Third Street, and at E. Second and Xerxes. Neither caused damage.

At 6 p.m. Saturday firemen were called to the residence of James A. Burleigh, 543 E. Norton, where a mattress caught fire. It was out when crews arrived. They used smoke ejectors and deodorant to clear the air.

Sunday at 5:17 p.m. firemen were summoned to a brush fire burning on the property of M. F. Griffin, 834 E. 12th. The burning of trash in a barrel started the fire. No damage occurred.

At 5:19 p.m. a grass fire brought crews to a tract at Florida and Bond, which caused no damage. An unattended trash fire was blamed.

Blaze damages Prineville home

PRINEVILLE — Fire caused extensive loss Sunday morning at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Bond, 306 E. First Street, Prineville.

Mrs. Bond was outside when she saw smoke coming from under the shingles of the roof, and called the fire department. Firemen, family and neighbors were able to remove possessions from the first floor of the building, but nothing was retrieved from the second floor. The building was badly damaged. The loss was estimated at approximately \$3,000.

The fire was believed to have started from faulty wiring in the old building. The house is one of the oldest frame structures in Prineville, dating back some 75 years.

Firemen were called at 11:30 a.m. and were at the fire about an hour. They were recalled later in the afternoon, to put out a smoldering fire discovered in sawdust over an old cellar under the house. The sawdust was apparently ignited by falling sparks.

Mr. and Mrs. Bond have five children. The house is owned by Mrs. Varina Austin, member of a pioneer Prineville family. It was not known immediately whether there is insurance coverage. Mrs. Austin is ill in a nursing home.

Governor notes new industry

SALEM (UPI) — Nine new manufacturing plants and three major auto distribution facilities highlighted Oregon's industrial expansion in August, the governor's office announced today.

The nine new plants represent a combined investment of \$4 million, and created 245 new jobs in basic industry. Largest of the plants was the new Boise Cascade plywood mill at Elgin, to cost \$2.5 million.

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Morse lashes policy toward South Viet Nam

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Sunday night lashed out at U.S. foreign and military policy in South Viet Nam, calling it "a historic disgrace."

The senator said, "there we are, supporting perhaps the most tyrannical, dictatorial and atrocious regime on the face of the earth outside of the Communist world. I don't believe that we cannot otherwise or South Viet Nam go Communist."

"I'm for calling the dare of Mrs. (Ngo Dinh) Nhu when she said we dare not stop our aid." He cited his support of a statement by 21 senators who withdrew backing of aid to Viet Nam until there was a change in the policy of the Diem government.

Morse spoke at a Bonds for Israel dinner attended by about 250 persons.

He said the most effective weapon against the spread of communism was economic freedom. "You cannot export a political ideology. You can export economic freedom," Morse commented.

Morse praised the state of Israel as a symbol of the spread of economic freedom in what he called the feudal areas of the Middle East, and also cited the efforts of the Israeli Youth Corps in spreading technical knowledge in Africa.

He said America was doing the best job of "squaring its actions with its professions in Latin America under the Alliance for Progress." But he warned that the Alliance is a quarter-century undertaking and would not be completed in a mere 10 years. He lauded American businessmen, he said, were doing a better job than the U.S. government in spreading economic freedom south of the border.

Shaner resting after ordeal

MANILA (UPI) — Linton W. Shaner, 58, an American mining official from Astoria, Ore., rested in a clinic today and told how he survived a plane crash and nine-day jungle ordeal.

Shaner, vice president for operations of Acero Mines of the Philippines, was rescued Saturday by attorney Ramon Pacia, 47, assistant personnel officer of the firm. They were brought to Manila by a Philippine Air Force helicopter.

Shaner said the twin-engine light plane in which he and Pacia and two others were flying crashed Sept. 11 during a rainstorm in mountainous terrain about 250 miles northwest of Manila.

He said they decided to split into pairs to attempt to make it to civilization. The other pair, Capt. Jose Salandana, the pilot, and Capt. Amado Castro, Acero security chief, have not been found. Pensant resin gatherers reported finding one body in the region, however.

Name suggested for new bridge

SOUTH BEND, Wash. (UPI) — The Joint Legislative Committee on Highways has suggested to the state highway commissions of Oregon and Washington that the new Astoria-Megler bridge at the mouth of the Columbia River be named for Capt. Robert Gray who discovered the river.

Sen. Robert Bailey, D-South Bend, said a resolution calling on the commission to name the span "Capt. Robert Gray Memorial Bridge."

Bailey, who was the prime legislative supporter of the bridge in Washington, said the name was first suggested by the Daughters of the American Revolution last year.
